ernment's Ideas.

Superintendent Porter Discharges Him Because of the Inopportune Discovery.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Superintendent of Census Robert N. Porter, this afternoon discharged Ivan Petroff, the special agent who prepared the reports on Alaska of the 10th and 11th censuses. In his letter to the Secretary of the Interior, Mr. Porter says: "Having acquainted myself with all the facts in relation to this matter, I regret to say that I see no extenuating circumstances, and therefore ask your approval of my action." Mr. Porter further said: "A complete explanation of Petroff's in regard tion." Mr. Porter further said: "A complete explanation of Petroff's in regard to the transaction precludes the supposition which I had entertained before making a

thorough examination of the case, that Petroff was suffering from mental depres-sion or insanity." Prof. James H. Blodgett, of the Census office, has been placed in charge of the Alaska work, and will verify charge of the Alaska werk, and will verify it in every particular, superintending the final publication. The accuracy of this report does not depend on Petroff, as many other expert special agents and enumerators were employed. Secretary Noble has approved Superintendent Porter's action. In regard to the alleged charges against Mr. Howard Sutherland, Superintendent Porter says he has heard nothing save newspaper rumors. He pronounced the alleged confession of Sutherland as most likely a "fake," and believes that the whole story has been greatly exaggrated. The charge against Petroff is that nearly the entire information furnished by him had been falsified, and in a manner which left been falsified, and in a manner which left no doubt of a wilful intent to deceive. This no doubt of a wirth intent to deceive. This information had been incorporated in the American case as sent to London and formed part of the arch upon which the United States' claim rested, although it is claimed not to have been the keystone. The British Government was at once notified that the United States had been led into errors of statement, and was informed that corrections would be made when the supplementary papers are submitted. No explanation has, it is said, been given for the offence, however, and the most charitable conviction was that Petroff, thinking he knew the character of the information

that the Department wanted, had manufac-tured it so as to make a strong case for the tured it so as to make a strong case for the American Government.




