Engineer Toop, who had been sent for, here reported that a bridge such as sug-gested by Mr. Sorby, would cost about \$20,000, or stripped as bare as possible. \$190,000 at least. A concrete-steel bridge would, on a rough estimate, cost \$160,000. This would entail more money being spent in the city for labor than the stone bridge. The steel would cost about \$16,000. In case of a stone bridge, the cutting of the blocks would be done at the query and thus this item of the cost would not be all spent in the city itself. The Mayor then produced and read Mr. Mohm's letter regarding a concrete-steel structure. From this it appeared that the whole would cost \$122,000, of which the cost of the steel was \$30,000, leaving to be spent in the city on ordinary labor, about \$00,000. Mr. Mohum further stated that the iffe of a steel truss had been estimated at 50 years, but that was very uncertain, and would entail regular and carefoi cleaning off of rust and regaining every three years.
