Mr. Gladstone said: "You had better wait Mr. John Morley's amendment to the cen' sure motion favoring the evacuation of the Soudan was rejected by 455 to 112.

Lord Hamilton's amendment to Mr. Morley's motion, to the effect that the government had failed to indicate a policy justifying the confidence of parliament or the country, was rejected by 29 to 277. All the Irish members voted against the government.

Lord Hartington said whether the government was defected or not defeated on the pending motion, the expedition for the suppression of the mahdi would be continued. It was due to India to show the vast mohammedan population of that country that England could not be made to retire before the mahdi's fanatical hordes. The government adhered to its pledges, and would not leave the Soudan until its objects had been accomplished. The railroad from Suakim to Berber, he said, would be used for commercial as well as military purposes. He believed the house would not support a policy undertaking the government of a new India in the heart of Africa. All confidence between the government ment and its military advisers would end if the government were compelled to inform the house of the precise measures adopted for the Egyptian campaign.

Earl Granville maintained that the preceding government had sown the seeds of the present troubles. He was not surprised that Hismarck had disapproved the present government's policy because neither the preceding nor the present government had adopted Bismarck's advice to annex Egypt. He regretted the fate of Gordon, but declined to accept the odium the opposition sought to cast upon the government. He assured the house of lords that the government was auxious to proceed with vigor in its present policy and to deal with the slave trade in the most effectual way possible. He regarded England's honor as pledged to defend Egypt proper. He said if the Marquis of Salisbury became the head of the government he much doubted whether he (Lord Salisbury) would propose and execute the policy he had propounded. If he did, the country would force him to wriggle out of it at the carliest opportunity.

THE SHOEBURYNESS EXPLOSION.

Little Extra Force.
London, Feb. 27.—The explosion at Shoe buryness yesterday was caused in a singular manner. Col. Lyon had invented some fuse experiments with them. Gunner Allen undertook to make the attachments between the shells and fuses. He found his first attempt to insert the fuse into the shell very difficult. to insert the fuse into the shell very difficult, and imprudently used too much force and exploded the shell. The explosion knocked seventeen officers and men, who were present to witness the experiment, off their feet. Allen was killed. His arm was torn off and his head nearly severed. The surgeons hoped to save the lives of Col. Strangeways, commandant of the royal school of gunnery, and Col. Lyon, head official of the government laboratory at Woolwich, each of whom appeared strong enough to survive the loss of both legs, but neither proved able to with stand the double amputations, and both expired after the doctors had completed the operations.

SOME PECULIAR FEATURES OF DO-MINION PATRONAGE. Letter Carrier Superintendents and Civil

Service Examiners—The Member for East Toronto's Compensation Bill. OTTAWA, Feb. 27.-The house sat till 10 spent in committee of the whole on governent business. The committee reported that ment of letter carrier superintendents at a salary not to exceed \$800 per annum. This will enable the postmaster-general to appoint such officers where he thinks necessary in any or all of the ten cities in the dominion where the free delivery system is in vogue.

The committee also reported favorably several resolutions introduced by the secretary of state respecting the civil service board of examiners. The salaries of the board are fixed at \$600 per annum each and traveling expenses with allowance for a clerk and secretary There was a long discussion on these salaries Mr. Decelles, the assistant librarian, with salary of \$2400 per annum is one of the eximiners, and Mr. Leseur, a super-annuated civil servant with \$1200 per annum, is also on the board and acts as secretary. A SAD END.


