Now fox-hunting can be carried on only by the toleration of agriculturists, and their toleration can only be secured by the preservation of their good will to the pursuit; and that not only must this good will exist with the majority, but bractically with the entirety of the farmers of the land in the hunt before sport can be assured, every man who follows hounds should realize. An isolated farmer can upset all calculations of sport for miles around him. He can lock his gates, shewe up barb wire around his farm, and further should he come across stray members of the pusk they may very possibly come to an unnatural death at his hands. Many of those who hunt take it for granted that because a farmer is a farmer in the district over which hounds run, that they may gallop where they like, leave all the gates open although they find them shut, break the fences, and generally

for damages.

Now some farmers, instead of going at once to the proper authorities and putting in their plaint, barricades his farm and warns of the hunt. It is to be hoped that for the sake of the sport riders will be more careful and thus sevent trouble.



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

EARLY CLOSING OF STORES.

To be Applied to the Grocery, Bry Goods Boot and Shoe and Furniture Trades. The special committee of the City Council re early closing met yesterday afternoon. Aid. Baxter presided over Aid. Boustead, Ritchie, Macdonald and Verral. Representatives of the various lines of business interested in the movement were on hand to the number of 50. The chairman read the act passed at the last ession of the Local Legislature dealing with

President Mara of the Grocers' Association stated there were 434 grocers petitioning for the passing of the Early Closing Bylaw out of the 500 members of the trade in the city. This statement the chairman held was sufficient evidence that the clause in the Act calling for the petition to be signed by a three-fourths of each business demanding the advantages of the act had been fulfilled. Grocer J. A. Mutter thought that an adjournment should be given to allow grocers opposed to the bylaw time to get up a counter-petition. The committee decided to recommend to the Council the desirability of passing a bylaw in favor of early closing on the part of the grocers.

The dry goods deputation was then allowed to talk. After considerable discussion the dry goods, gents' furnishings and merchant tailoring lines were bulked under the head of dry goods, giving the necessary three-fourths required by the Act.
