THE WORST STORM OTTAWA HAS

HAD IN 25 YEARS.

22 INCHES OF SNOW IN A DAY.

Joilette Wants the Great Northern Railway-Premier's Address to the Macdonald Club Postponed-West Indies Dissatisfied With the Reciprocity

OTTAWA, Jan. 30 .- Last night's storm was the worst known in this section for over a quarter of a century. Indeed, there is no record of any storm when so much snow fell in so short a time. The record of the snowfall kept at the Experimental Farm shows that the record for yesterday was 22 inches in the 24 hours. The next highest record is 10 inches on Dec. 16 last year, and in the three previous winters, during which these figures have been kept at the farm, the greatest fall at one time did not exceed eight inches. The last "great" storm here was in 1885, when the snowfall was about 18 inches, but it was snowing almost continually for three days. Train service has been thoroughly demoralized both east and west, and for the first time in its history the electric car service in the city was knocked out for a while; not for long, however, for the company had over five hundred men at work with four sweepers and nine plows, with the result that to night the entire line is open again, with cars running on time, and the streets through which the lines run and the streets through which the lines run scarcely show any trace of the immense downfall, nearly all the snow having been carted away. Gangs were working all night last night and every man who wanted a day's work to day had it. There are not many men in Ottawa just now out of work, but to those who are the two or three days' shoveling which the storm will cause is a positive godsend.







considerable liquidation of long wheat, most of it bought yesterday. It was sold out through commission houses so as to attract as little attention as possible. The weather continues favorable and will be warmer to-morrow. The feature to-day was the disappointing tone of foreign markets, which yesterday gave every indication of becoming better.

Corn opened firm. Receipts to-day were 512, estimated for to-morrow 310 cars. The cables were steady and export clearances over 250,000 bushels. Cash market was unchanged. There was some selling for country account, but advices, as a rule, indicate light receipts. New York was the most liberal buyer.

Provisions opened lower under increased receipts of hogs. Good local buying of pork checked the decline for a time, but the market finally became dull and heavy and gradually declined to the close under selling by packers and local operators for both long and short account. Pork was the weakest article because of scattering small holders and stop loss of orders and was easily hammered by bearish traders. The closing was weak at the bottom prices and probabilities favor still lower prices to-morrow, but the volume of business is so small that the market is unusually uncertain.
