THE FINDING OF THE COMMISSION.

The University trouble can clearly be traced back to three or four students, who, as might be expected, undertook to sow the seeds of dissension in the institution, and to excite the students as a whole against the college authorities.

It is not at all improbable that these ringleaders were investigated, or at least encouraged, by certain individuals officially connected with the University, who are antagonistic to the present administration.

As far as the commission went, however, the trouble was not treated to its fountain head. We get no further back than the three or four students who, as we have said, started the agitation.

No time in the development of the agitation had these students any serious cause of complaint. How exceedingly little had they to complain of we can infer from the grievances they actually did make.

In order to excite the students, the agitators tried to inflame public opinion against the faculty, the agitators stated that the college authorities had unjustly prevented Messrs. Jury and Thompson from lecturing to the Political Science Club in the University.

It now turns out, and it is so found by the commission, that the authorities were justified by the University statutes in refusing to allow these gentlemen to speak within the University walls.

And furthermore, public opinion is almost unanimous in sustaining the authorities in their action in this respect. Again, the students raised a hubbub because they were not given full control of the gymnasium, towards which they had contributed but a small proportion of the total cost.

The commission finds that the College Council was quite justified in retaining control of the building, as otherwise there would be a lack of harmony in its management.

That they could bring forward nothing more than these and a few other unreasonable charges show us how desperate the ringleaders were to secure a case of some kind against the authorities.

Of all the insinuations and charges that were made by the students, not a single one has been sustained. If the charges brought against the authorities were true in fact, it would have been had enough for the institution and for the professors to have gone through the abuse that was showered upon them by variety and at least one of the city evening papers.

It is not to be supposed that these troubles such as those which are alluded to have existed in the college, in the spirit in which they were discussed by the students, was certainly not the proper way to effect a remedy or to alter the institution.

But what would be the effect of such a vacation upon the workmen of the city whose lives are almost altogether passed within doors? The workmen cannot, of course, expect to receive any vacation pay.

Even the gentlemen of leisure, even the clergyman who is subject to less unfavorable conditions than any other class, feels the stimulating influence of country life and pure air. Their summer outing is a most enjoyable one.

For them, but if a month's vacation in the summer has such a wonderful effect upon those who live under the most favorable sanitary conditions that the city permits, it is a reasonable expectation that such a vacation upon the workmen of the city whose lives are almost altogether passed within doors?

The workmen cannot, of course, expect to receive any vacation pay. No one ever heard of such a thing as a carpenter or a bricklayer being informed that his holidays had arrived, that he had his freedom for a month, and that he would be allowed to take his vacation on his own terms.

It is only the workmen, school teachers and men occupying the better positions of life, who are blessed with holidays, and with the means of enjoying them. While it is not reasonable to expect, under present conditions, that the workman will get a month's holiday in the year, we can at least hope that the time will soon arrive when he will be allowed to use his holidays on Sunday which ought to be his own.

Thirty Sundays during the summer passed in open air would have just as beneficial an effect upon the system as a provincial commandery of the Roman Catholic Union of the Knights of St. John took place yesterday in St. Paul's Hall, Power-street.

The convention settled to work with a will immediately upon being called to order by Provincial President W. H. Cahill, enabling them to finish the business before them in one day's sitting.

Various amendments to the constitution took up the greater part of the day, discussion upon them being at times spirited and at all times of interest.
