## THE DEFEAT IN MONTREAL

CONSERVATIVES BLAME IT ON THE GOVERNMENT'S INDIFFERENCE.

The French-Canadians Evidently Not Greatly Concerned About the Grievances of Manitoba Catholics-The Montreal Gazette Speaks Out-What Other Conservative Papers Say-Where The Mail-Empire is Laughed at.

Montreal, Dec. 29 .-- It would be indeed passing strange if such an important political event as the election in Montreal Centre did not cause a great deal of comment amongst classes in the commercial metropolis. There is, in fact, more excitement amongst the politicians since the people have come to realize the true meaning of Friday's verdict than at any time during the whole campaign. The absurdity of the whole campaign. The absuroity of the situation becomes more apparent as the votes of the respective wards are considered. Here the Government of Sir Mackenzie Bowell stakes its very existence to satisfy an appeal coming from a few newspapers of both parties, and yet when an election takes place it is found that neither Ministers, members nor newspapers have ties, and yet when an election takes place it is found that neither Ministers, members nor newspapers have properly gauged public sentiment in the Province of Quebec; but on the contrary, as stated time and again in this column, the overwhelming masses of the French-Canadian people are no more interested in the quarrel between Mgr. Langevin and the Greenway Government than the man in the moon. In the East Ward during the last three weeks, Hon. Mr. Oulmet, Sir William Hingston, Deputy Speaker Bergeron, Dr. Lachapelle, M.P., and scores of other orators have constituted the Manitoba school mafter the stock-intrade of their many excellent addresses, yet when the ballots were counted the result proved, as it did in Vercheres, that the school question was not a factor in the contest, and that no interest whatever is taken in the efforts made by the Government to give the Manitoba minority separate schools. The Gazette, in a leading article, gives the causes which brought about Sir William Hingston's defeat, and the big Conservative newspaper arrives at exactly the same conclusion as The World of Saturday—Montreal interests neglected, the merchants of the greatest city in Canada treated as if they were children, and a halting policy pursued all round. THE SMELTING WORKS TO BE STARTED UP TO-DAY.

Hamilton, Dec. 29.—In the wake of the opening of the T., H. & B. Railway comes the blowing in of the smelting works on Monday afternoon.
