Osogood's Hall, Dec. 27, 1895. With respect to pending appeals the new procedure (subject to special order) is to be as follows: When the time for appealing has not expired and the appeal has not been set down the time is to be reckoned as if judgment, etc., had been given on the day of the coming into force of the act and rules, and the new procedure is to govern, and where such appeal has been set down it is to be transferred without order, and heard as if set cases, if there is no appeal under the act and rules, such appeal to proceed with under the old practice.

The office of the Clerk of the Peace and Records and Writs and Registrars of the Q.B., C.P., and Chancery Divisions are to be under the control of the veteran Mr. P. Jackson, Q.C., the present Registrar of the C.P. Div., who is henceforth to be designated "Clerk of the Crown and Pleas."
