ROOT CHOSEN CHAIRMAN BY 558 TO 502 ROOSEVELT MEN LEAVE HALL AFTER TUMULT HAS REIGNED FOR HOURS

Both Factions at Chicago Convention Claim Ultimate Victory as Result of First Test of Strength, But Talk of a "Dark Horse" is Significantly Frequent—Bitter Charges of "Fraud" and Counter Accusations Make Coliseum Walls Resound—"Purge" Motion Up To-Day.

CHICAGO, June 18.—(Can. Press).—Against the threats, charges and bitter invective of Roosevelt forces, Taft supporters in the Republican National Convention put thru the first portion of their program by electing Senator Elihu Root of New York as temporary chairman. It required more than five hours to reach a vote on the chairmanship.

The calling of the roll was beset with difficulty from the very first name on the list of delegates, but in the end, when the tumult had died away, Senator Root was found to have won by a vote of 558 to 502 for Governor Francis E. McGovern of Wisconsin, with 14 scattering votes and four not voting.

To-night both the Taft and Roosevelt forces are claiming that this vote indicates that their candidate is absolutely sure to win. The advantage appears to be with the president, however, for while he is sure to lose some of the votes that were cast for Senator Root, it is claimed that he will gain, if instructions are lived up to, some of the votes independently cast for McGovern.

Those leaders who have been urging a compromise candidate ever since they arrived in Chicago, are pointing to another angle in the figures and claim that they show that it is essential to name a so-called "dark horse" to save the day for the Republican party.

Battle to Unseat Delegates. The fighting is to be renewed at 11 o'clock to-morrow, when the motion of the Roosevelt leaders to substitute a new list of delegates for those seated in some of the contested cases heard before the national committee is to be taken up as the unfinished business. No committees were named to-night and none will be until this motion to "purge" the convention of "fraudulent delegates" is disposed of. To-day it was defeated on a point of order, but the Roosevelt forces declare that parliamentary practice will not be permitted to stand in the way to-morrow.

There was one promise of real trouble, when State Senator Flynn compelled the repetition of the call of the Pennsylvania delegates, fighting the vote of one of the alternates who, he said, was being called out of proper order. The point was that the man called and who voted for Root was the second on the list, whereas the man first on the list of alternates from that district would have voted for McGovern.

Steam Roller Again. "If you steal that vote," shouted Flynn, "there will be no roll called in this convention to-day."

That was all there was to it: The chairman overruled him, and the gruffing voice of Secretary Gleason was heard calling out the vote.

With few exceptions the negro delegates from the south, about whose steadfastness there has been so much speculation during the last few days, stood fast for the Taft candidate.

Made It Hot for Bradley. Senator Bradley of Kentucky, who proposed Senator Root's nomination, was subjected to a constant storm of interruptions when he defended the action of the national committee.

"I warn you that if you overturn the report of the committee you unseat lawfully elected delegates. And I say, coming from the great State of Kentucky, that that commowealth will never sink so low as to accept moral advice from Francis J. Heney," he declaimed.

"But you voted for Lorimer," came back a Rhode Island delegate and Senator Bradley shot back: "If one could get under your outside I guess that it would be found you were much meaner than Lorimer. You assail the south for not giving you electoral votes. We couldn't give you votes because you are too cowardly to give the south any aid you wive wavering northern states."

Bradley then reviewed Republican success in Kentucky and said that if the party would help, that state would always be in the Republican column. "Liar, Liar, Liar"

Here the Pennsylvania delegates started a chorus of "Lorimer," and Bradley, held with rage shaking his finger directly at Senator Flynn, shouted: "Lorimer—Lorimer—Lorimer—let me say something back to you—liar—liar—liar."

"We don't want any of this rough-riding business," shouted Bradley, and was cheered again and again by the Roosevelt forces.

"Steam roller," shouted a Pennsylvania delegate.

"Steam roller, did I hear you say?" yelled Bradley. "Why, Teddy Roosevelt ran the steam roller over me eight times, and still I voted the ticket."

When Cheers Broke Loose. The final vote that gave Senator Root a majority for temporary chairman was cast by Patrick H. Moran of the first district of Washington at

Can the System Stand the Strain?

Will the United States system of government be able to withstand the shock and tumult to which it is subjected by the presidential elections? The present struggle at Chicago closes a furious contest, which has raged for three months all over the Union, but the Chicago convention, after all, merely nominates a candidate for one of the great political parties.

Within a fortnight, the struggle and excitement will be nearly as intense, but the theatre of action will be transferred to Baltimore, where the Democratic convention will assemble to select a rival candidate for president. It is too early now to predict the probable outcome of the struggle between Mr. Taft and Colonel Roosevelt, but there may be yet a third convention.

These conventions pave the way to a national struggle which almost paralyzes business, excites the people everywhere and creates tumult and confusion until the popular election in November. But even this does not necessarily close the struggle. Should there be three candidates, it may happen that no one of them will have an absolute majority over all the others combined in the electoral college, and this will mean that the election will be thrown into the house of representatives.

The house has already been compelled to elect on two occasions, and on each occasion the contest was unseemly and prolonged for weeks.

The presidential office is becoming so important—for the president combines in himself all those powers which in British countries are divided between the crown and the prime minister—that the struggle for its attainment becomes every term more violent. Thus the people of the United States are thrown into a state of nervous excitement, bordering at times and in places on frenzy, only for the purpose of electing a chief magistrate who will serve the short period of four years.

And the most sinister side of this situation is the undue prominence and power attained by undesirable elements in the community. Many of the delegates at Chicago from the rotten boroughs of the black belt, representing in reality no constituency, would not be entrusted with any responsibility by private business men, and yet they may be entrusted with the responsibility of naming the chief executive officer of ninety million people.

President Taft has lowered the dignity of his office by his unseemly scramble for another term, and Ex-President Roosevelt may in a way be criticized for lack of decorum in his efforts to succeed Mr. Taft. But the conditions in the United States are such and the crisis at hand so momentous, that Theodore Roosevelt as a patriot is justified in taking measures and extraordinary action to bring about his own election to the presidency, since there is no one else who will undertake, or promise to undertake, the great work which he is able and willing to perform.

GOVERNMENT SELLS LAND UP IN NORTHERN ONTARIO TO HELP IN SETTLEMENT

Buffalo Lumber Merchant Purchased 99,364 Acres, and Agrees to Build Saw Mill, and Settle at Least 2,400 Acres Within Two Years.

Wills K. Jackson, a wealthy lumber merchant of Buffalo, has purchased two townships in Northern Ontario from the Ontario Government for \$98,364, at one dollar an acre. Acting upon a plan to secure private capital and private enterprise in the work of colonizing the unsettled portion of the province, the government has entered into an agreement with Mr. Jackson whereby the Townships of Haggart and Kendry are sold on the understanding that the land will be immediately cleared, sawmills costing over \$100,000 erected and settlers brought in to the district. Undoubtedly this is the most important step thus far in connection with the government's colonization scheme.

It is also provided in the agreement that Hon. W. H. Hearst, minister of lands, forests and mines, will be able to sell farms at the government's own figure which are to be prepared by the Jackson concern when the land is cleared.

Mills Cost \$70,000. The purchasers must commence within ninety days from the date of the agreement and complete with reasonable despatch a permanent saw-mill, planing mill, and door factory, all of which will cost something more than \$70,000. "This will accomplish a two-fold object," said Hon. Mr. Hearst. "It will furnish the settlers with all the finished building material they need to erect their own buildings and will furnish a market to settlers in nearby locations for their timber."

The two townships are situated about 60 miles west of Cochrane, and are tapped by the National Transcontinental Railway. Their total area is about 103,000 acres. The crown reserves all water power, and also a townsite on the banks of the Mattagami River, consisting of 404 acres. Without consent of the government, the purchasers will not be able to lay out any townsite.

Several Carloads of Strawberries Arrived and Price Dropped From 17 to 10 Cents.

Toronto wholesale fruit dealers were surprised yesterday by the arrival here of several carloads of Canadian strawberries. Their surprise was even greater when several more cars arrived during the afternoon.

As a result of the sudden large shipment Canadian berries dropped from 17 cents, at which they had been selling, to as low as 10 cents. Extra choice berries, however, sold at 15 cents. Only one car of the American berries arrived from the south. These sold at 15 cents.

The unexpectedly large shipment is due to the rainy spell of a few days ago being followed by the warm weather required. The berries, while slightly green at the tips, are of fairly good quality.

Fruit prices are as follows: Canadian strawberries, 10 to 15c a box; American strawberries, 12c a box; choice berries, 17c to 20c a bushel; grapes, 33 to 45c a bunch; pineapples, 25c crate.

Ex-Inspector and Present Chief at Calgary and Ex-Constable Reburn Will Benefit by Police Fund.

The board of police commissioners at their meeting held yesterday afternoon in the city hall, decided to grant Ex-Inspector Cuddy a pension of \$1000 a year, and Constable Reburn, who retired some time ago, was also given a yearly pension of \$655.64. All express tariff vehicles in class A, that is 1876 and three horse vans, moving wagons, etc., will be entitled to an extra 25 cents an hour. One horse vehicle was given a raise of 10 cents an hour. The city solicitor reported that the commissioners have not the power to prohibit minors from attending theatres unless accompanied by adults.

BIG INDUSTRIES COMING TO TORONTO

Three Manufacturing Concerns Looking For Factories Already Built as Time Would Be Lost in Erecting New Buildings—\$2,000,000 Iron Works For Port Colborne.

A large iron works corporation, with a capitalization of \$2,000,000, is to be established at Port Colborne, Ont., and three manufacturing concerns are to be located in central Ontario, if satisfactory arrangements can be made in Toronto.

Wm. P. Fitzsimons, commissioner of industries for the Grand Trunk Railway System, who is accompanying the British manufacturers' Canadian tour, made this statement to The World yesterday afternoon.

The establishing of the \$2,000,000 plant in Ontario is considered as a triumph due to the Borden anti-reciprocity policy. It will be headed by Frank B. Baird, president of the Buffalo Union Furnace Company, and will be known as the Canadian Union Furnace Co. The new plant, while affiliated with the Buffalo concern, is restricted to a great extent by Canadian capital. The \$2,000,000 capitalization is not something to be obtained, but has already been subscribed.

To Make All Lines. This concern will not cut into the already established pig iron plants, as instead of going in for the manufacture of one particular line, it will manufacture all lines. "A sort of a prescription plant," remarked Mr. Fitzsimons. The plant will have a capacity of 100 tons daily to start, and this will be increased to a 300-ton capacity. To begin with about two hundred men will be employed.

The plant will be built at the end of the Port Colborne pier and will extend out into the lake. Construction of the plant is to be commenced immediately.

Three Big Industries. This will give Port Colborne three monster industries, the government freight elevator and the Maple Leaf Milling Co., which is alongside the government elevator, already being located there.

To accommodate the great increase in business to be brought about by the erection of the new plant, the Grand Trunk Railway will at once commence work on enlarging its freight yards there and a greatly increased freight service is now being planned.

Other Big Plants. The three other industries, which will locate either in Toronto or in this section of the province, consist of two embryonic manufacturing plants, and a concern for the handling of coarse seed. It is the desire of these firms to obtain already constructed modern factory buildings, as they wish to avoid the delay of having to wait for the erection of buildings.

Mr. Fitzsimons said that although it is causing him trouble trying to locate firms desiring buildings, it is a fact that this section of Ontario can at the present time boast of not having a modern factory building lying vacant.

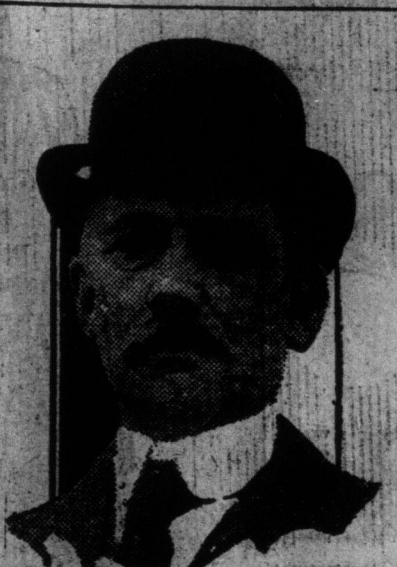

MORE CRITICISM OF RAILWAY BOARD

General Censure By Ontario Municipal Association, Whose Members Are of Opinion That Board Lacks Thoro Grasp of Municipal Affairs.

The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board was liberally censured at the dinner given to the Ontario Municipal Association by the city at McConkey's last night. No reference was made to the recent decision regarding the Metropolitan Railway Co.'s tracks. The censure was of a general nature, and to the effect that the board lacked a thoro grasp of municipal conditions.

Acting as chairman in the absence of Mayor Geary, Controller Hocken said that the board was capable of improvement. The members of it did not appreciate the great problems which confronted a large city. As City Solicitor Mickle of Belleville put it, the Ontario Railway Board simply did not grasp the situation and it was discouraging to appear before them.

Lack of Ideas. They had not shown a warm and enthusiastic interest in civic affairs, he said, and had shown a lack of municipal ideals which could only be remedied by changing the personnel of the board.

Mr. Mickle also found fault with the present municipal government system. The councils, he said, did not produce the same results as were obtained 10 years ago and the board of control idea had not been as successful as was expected.

He suggested that something might be gained by introducing some of the features of the German system, where the mayors were of a professional character.

Not Unfair. Hon. Thomas Crawford dealt with the criticisms of the Ontario Railway Board, which he admitted were not unfair. He thought, however, that the municipalities had been unreasonable in many of their requests and considerable dissatisfaction had resulted when these were not complied with.

He thought, however, that the greatest danger a municipality had to face was the monopoly mania which was taking hold of this country.

Speakers also were made by ex-Controller Spence, Mayor Lees of Hamilton and J. E. Atkinson.

The Nursery

When the diarrhoea has been a little checked add mutton broth or chicken broth to the gruel. At first give one ounce of broth to four of gruel, and gradually increase to half and half. Again, milk may be added to the gruel. At first use a tablespoonful of milk in each feeding of gruel, then gradually increase until the amount of gruel reached. For a nursing baby give two or three ounces of gruel, then nurse for a few days, reducing the amount of gruel and lengthening the time of nursing until back to the regular feedings. If the baby is very ill, he will be given the child all thru the bottles, stop at every hour, or often if the baby seems thirsty. Sometimes albumin water, that is the white of egg in water, is easier for the stomach to retain than plain water.

When a very case of diarrhoea may not have been prevented, a great many cases can be kept in the attention given bottles, nipples and food. The nipples should be well sterilized, and preserved in old milk bottles, nipples and utensils used in the preparation of the food. Never allow milk to stand in a bottle after the meal is over. Rinse the bottle at once with cold water, leave it full of cold water in which dissolve a pinch of borax. Every morning wash the bottles, teacup, and boil them. Rinse the nipples with cold water, leave them all day in borax solution, and sterilize by dipping them with scalding water.

If you would keep your baby well through the trying weather we may expect during the coming months, it is absolutely necessary that you follow these simple rules.

Children's Hospital Nurses' Graduation
