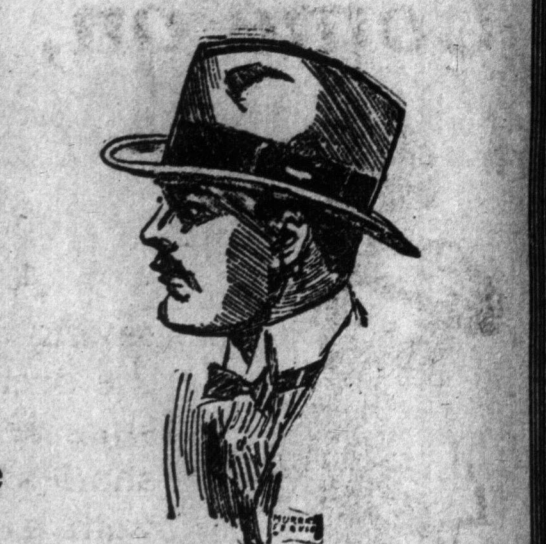

## RUNNING BATTLE IN AUTOMOBILE

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 13.—A running battle with both in automobile occurred this evening about twenty miles from Vancouver, between the police and two men, both of them believed to be the murderers of Dr. C. C. Barnes, of Victoria. The driver of the car in which George Layton, alias George Lees, a Finland murder suspect, was believed to be, is reported shot. The automobile pursuing the suspect overturned in the chase and Layton, or Lees, is reported to have made his escape into the woods. Blood hounds are on the trail.

## WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

In Lorraine yesterday the American attack succeeded in flattening out the St. Mihiel salient to a point twelve miles northeast of its former apex at St. Mihiel. By nightfall the Americans had established a straight front between the Meuse and the Moselle Rivers. Their new line yesterday afternoon ran above the following villages: Herbeville, Thillet, Hattonville, St. Benoit, Xammes, Jaulny, Thiaucourt and Vieville. They have thrust the enemy back upon the Hindenburg line, constructed in the winter of 1917 in expectation of a general allied offensive last year. In the St. Mihiel salient the enemy had expected an attack and had planned a strong resistance, but the American stroke was too powerful for him to withstand. Up till now yesterday the Americans had taken 13,300 prisoners. They had also reached a point within four miles of the outer fortifications of Metz.

## GERMAN PEACE TERMS ACCORDING TO PAYER

Amsterdam, Sept. 13.—The German imperial vice-chancellor, Von Payer, in his address yesterday at Stuttgart, said: "We cannot hand over Poland to Russia, nor can we assist in having Finland again placed under the Russian yoke. We cannot let the fate of the border states which lie on the German frontier and the Baltic be subjected against their will to Russian imperialism, or throw into the perils of civil war and anarchy. We can never permit anyone to meet with us in this matter from the standpoint of the present European balance of power, or rather British predominance."

### CASUALTIES INCLUDE MORE TORONTO MEN

Capt. Binns, M.C., and Lieut. H. J. Goodyear Killed, and Others Wounded.

Toronto city men in the casualty lists since the start of the big drive in France now total over 1800. Over 1400 of these have been wounded, about 300 killed or died of wounds, and 84 gassed.

Capt. Percy V. Binns, M.C., graduate of Woodstock College and the School of Science, Toronto University, was killed in action on Aug. 28. His wife, Mrs. J. B. Bartram, resides at West St. Clair avenue. He was serving at the front in France with the Canadian Engineers. He had won both the Military Cross and promotion in the field. It is nearly three years since he reached the firing line.

Lieut. Basil W. Minard, son of Capt. A. R. Minard, Toronto, formerly of the 97th American Legion, is reported to have been wounded. He was wounded before at Passchendaele, but returned to the front again after convalescing. A brother, Lieut. A. Raymond Minard, died from wounds received during the capture of La Coulette.

Corp. Wm. Lindsay, of 11 Morley avenue, who went overseas in 1916 with the 124th "Pais" Battalion, has been killed in action. He leaves a widow and baby girl. His services at the front included duty with the Princess Patricia's.

### TO PROTECT PROPERTY ON THE LAKE FRONT

A conference will be held on Monday between the city, board of trade, and harbor commission, with a view to taking some action to fix the responsibility for the protection of property along the lake shore at Kew Beach. R. C. Harris, works commissioner, has written the board of control, suggesting the matter be brought to the attention of the Dominion Government. The mayor accuses the government of trying to place the responsibility on the harbor commission, but it is pointed out that it has gone on record as having accepted responsibility for certain protection work, although it may now be trying to evade it.

### REPORT OF AUDITOR SHOWS FINE SURPLUS

The city auditor, in a report of his audit of the books of the Toronto Harbor Commissioners for 1917, places the assets of the commission at \$15,827,997, and it is expected that these will be increased this year by \$2,000,000.

The surplus of assets over liabilities in 1917 was \$297,466. The auditor also reports that a sale of bonds was made to W. A. Read and Co. at \$83.07. Bonds with a face value of \$1,500,000 were sold, realizing \$1,246,050.

### STORMS BREAK AT BOARD OF CONTROL

Toronto's Executive Body is Scene of Disturbance and Hasty Words.

Toronto's works commissioner will stand no interference with the conduct of his department, as Controllers Maguire and Robbins learned yesterday morning at the board of control when the recommendation came up for the appointment of W. Scott as assistant at the island filtration plant. R. C. Harris, usually suave and conciliating, took a strong stand against his recommendations being interfered with, and he was upheld and Mr. Scott got the position.

Controllers Maguire and Robbins opposed the commissioner, while the mayor and Controller O'Neill and McBride backed him. There was also a stormy passage at arms between Controllers McBride and Robbins over the award of the arbitrators in the civic employes case. The former said it was not acceptable to all of the men, while the latter said everyone accepted it at a mass meeting.

Convicted on a charge of picking pockets in the Exhibition grounds, Sam Fogler and Laron Hockoart were sentenced to two years in the Kingston penitentiary, when they appeared in the police court yesterday morning. Goldie Goldstein, who worked in company with the two men, was sentenced to six months in the women's municipal farm. All of the prisoners were natives of New York, where they had several convictions for grand larceny.

### Soldier Takes His Life Body Found in Barracks

Pte. H. C. Fallows, attached to the Royal Air Force and stationed at Jesse Ketchum Barracks, committed suicide yesterday by cutting his throat with a razor. The discovery of the body was made shortly after seven o'clock in the morning in the lavatory of the barracks. No motive can be given for the action of the man, and the body is being held at the city morgue pending the decision of the chief coroner as to whether an inquest is necessary.

### MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO GET COAL HERE

Assurance Given After Private Meeting of Dealers and Others Yesterday.

A more equitable system for the distribution of coal and frequent meetings between the civic authorities and the dealers, will result from the conference held in the city hall yesterday afternoon. Nearly every coal firm in the city was represented and the whole situation considered. The meeting was private and Daniel Chisholm, property commissioner, who has resigned his position as local fuel controller, announced afterwards that there was nothing to be made public other than that everything possible would be done to see that a coal famine was averted.

The board of control in the morning also discussed the question when J. A. Gunn and Wm. Varley, on behalf of the Trades and Labor Council, headed a deputation which asked for the appointment of a fuel controller who would give his entire time to the position and also that the supply of coal to each household be limited to 30 per cent. until everybody had been able to get that proportion of his winter supply. The spokesman for the deputation, after repeated interruptions, at last succeeded in making known what their requests were. They experienced what all other deputations experience before the board of control—trouble in getting a few words in edgewise once two of the controllers get a line on the subject under discussion.

The city dealers, on the other hand, say there is an abundance of milk in the country, that pasture costs no more than it ever did, and that the low price of cheese fixed by the government is not likely to divert much of the milk into that channel.

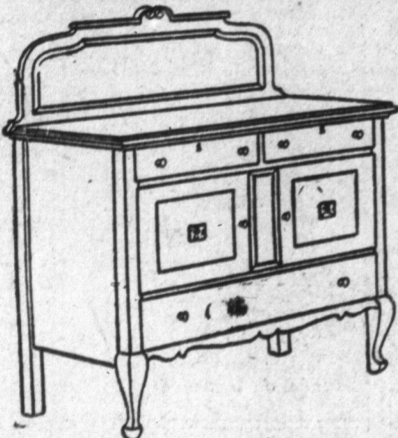

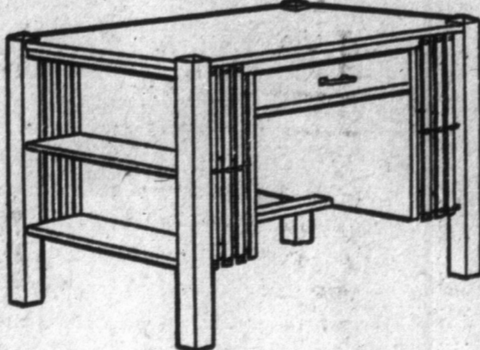

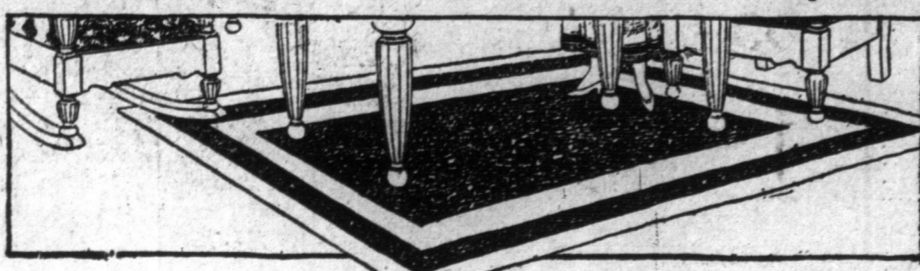
