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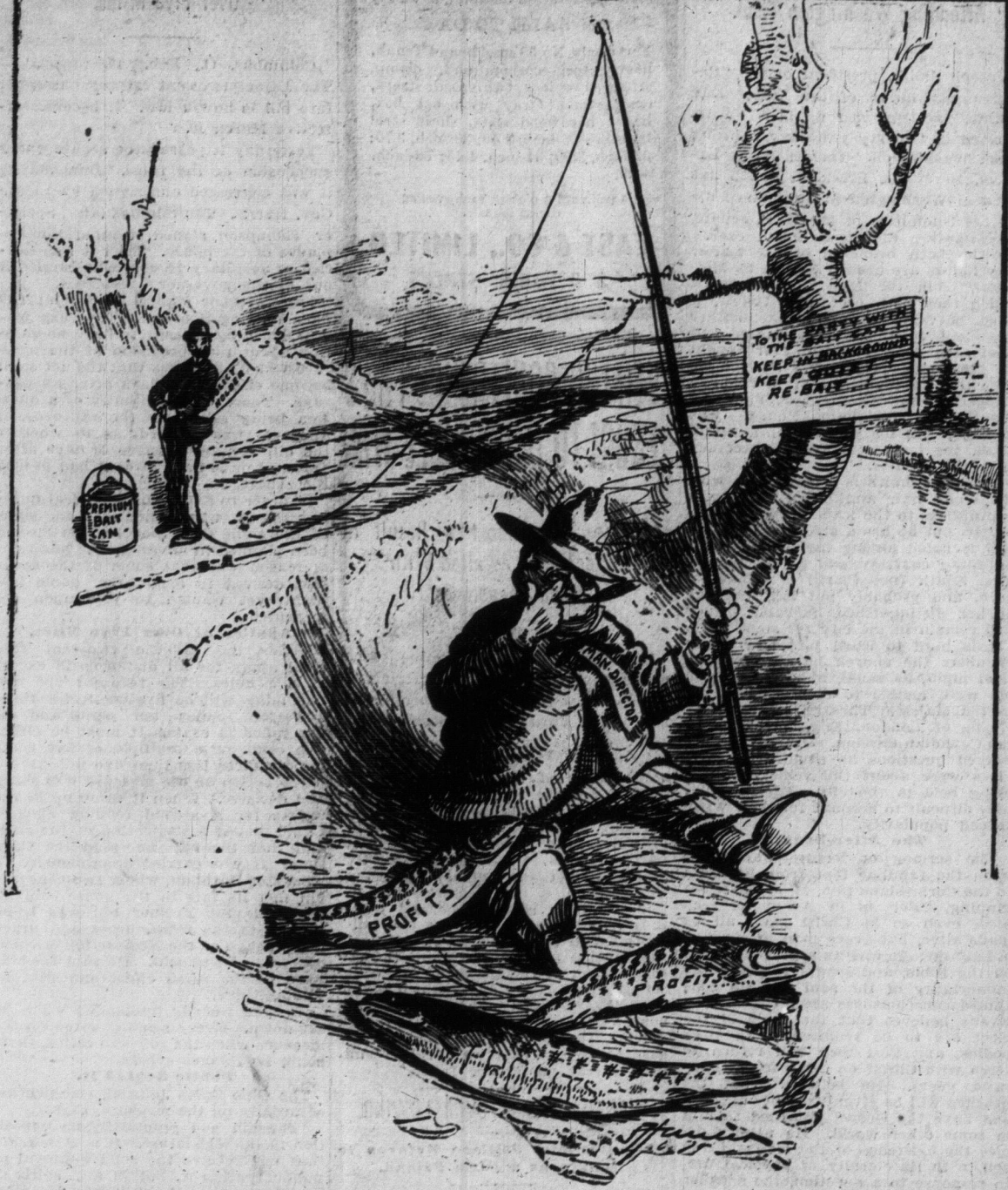

### INAUGURAL SIMPLICITY WISH OF NEW PRESIDENT

Program of Installation of Fallieres as Head of French Republic.

Paris, Feb. 10.—The ministry for the last three weeks has been discussing the details of the ceremonial to be observed at the inauguration Feb. 13 of President Fallieres. The first program drawn up was rejected by President Loubet and President-elect Fallieres, because it was lacking in the simplicity they both had desired. With the exception of certain details yet to be agreed upon, the program will be as follows:

### WITH DRAWN REVOLVERS THIEVES ESCAPE CAPTORS

Inoffensive Italian Shot Five Times in Back by French-Canadian Burglars.

Exeter, N. H., Feb. 10.—Two burglars who robbed a shoe factory in Dover at midnight, and who murdered an Italian laborer in the smoking car of the Sunnyside express train, at Rockingham Junction, on the Boston and Maine Railroad, early this morning, were captured this afternoon after an exciting chase of five miles through Rockingham County, in which deputy sheriffs, police and citizens participated. The officers and one of the burglars exchanged shots while the man hunted was in progress, but no person was injured.

### POLICEMEN FORM SQUAD ROUND PROSTRATE NEGRO

Squad With Drawn Revolvers Beset by a Thousand Who Want Murderer's Blood.

New York, Feb. 10.—One thousand men and boys to-day beset a squad of policemen, who, with drawn revolvers, protected Clarence Brooks, a negro, from the crowd, which threatened to lynch him. The negro had been purloined from one of the city's busiest centers, after a sensational shooting affray in which another negro was killed.

Thief Throws Brick Thru Window and Snatches Two Trays Worth \$15,000 to \$20,000.



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HOW VENEZUELA IS FIXED CASTRO GOING IT ALONE

Vice-Presidents and Population Said to Be Favorable to French Interference.

Willemslad, Caracas, Friday, Feb. 10.—Conditions in Venezuela are unchanged at the date of the latest advices from that country. The censorship is rigid. One report is that the attitude of the vice-president, Vincente Gomez, who is said to be plotting a revolution against President Castro, is in case of a French blockade, is causing some anxiety.

It is reported, also, that General Antonio Velutini, second vice-president, has a secret understanding with France, and that he expects to take the presidency. All the turmoil over the French cable company's concession is attributed to general Velutini, and it is said he will soon abandon President Castro.

The total strength of the Venezuelan army is reported to be 8000 men, and that 25,000, as the army accounts state. The total armament is 50,000 Mauser rifles and 200,000,000 ball cartridges, 30 pieces of small artillery of old-fashioned types and 10 modern guns in position at the ports.

The treasury shows a balance of \$200,000. President Castro is said to be boasting that he will test the Monroe doctrine.

The reports say that the best information in Venezuela shows that France or any other power can rely upon almost the entire population to fight President Castro, and that any effort is everywhere expressed for the French to solve the problem of the Venezuelans.

Money will be decidedly scarce if a war should break out, and the Venezuelan government has made no provision whatever for the commissariat.

TO TORONTO'S SUNDAY WEATHER. Not as Cold as Was Expected and Skaters Enjoyed Themselves.

This is an unusual winter, most unusual, and apparently it is too much for the weather men in the Park. The trouble with the winter is that it is unable to do what it would like to do in the way of weather, tho it manages to show all the symptoms. But it can't get beyond the symptoms. For instance, Saturday Old Probs gave out on Sunday, and the weather was so cold and Saturday afternoon incipient blizzards sprang up for a few moments, the mercury dropping to the hyperborean. But Sunday was a beautiful day, never colder than 10 degrees above zero, and at times up to 20.

When questioned last night, the Weather Man said: "The decided cold did not strike this end of the province as it did the eastern part. In the Ottawa Valley it varied from 10 to 20 below zero. These figures were sustained by the mean temperature of the Toronto, the mean temperature of the city, was 10 degrees above, and it is getting milder out west, and it is likely we will have a warm spell."

Several hundreds of people amused themselves on the bay yesterday. The skating was good and about 2000 skaters, it is reported, were on the ice. One said his record for the day had totalled \$30.

About thirty young fellows started a game of indoor baseball in front of the skating rink. When a try was knocked up there was a general scramble to get under it. Perhaps half of those who tried to get under the net when the ball struck the ice. If a grounder was struck it went to the outside fielders, who traveled around their territory on skates.

One man skated across the bay, pushing his child in a sleigh. Over a dozen went over to Hanlan's Point on bicycles. There was an excellent skating party, and the boys kept on going in good style. The Reinder and Beaver, two of the fastest boats on the bay, both owned by members of the Toronto Rowing Club, had a race around the island. The bay has about 10 inches of ice covering it and is perfectly safe.

LABOR TEMPLE DIRECTORS. Annual Meeting of Shareholders Was Held Saturday Night.

A great deal of interest was taken by the labor union men Saturday night in the annual meeting and election of directors of the Labor Temple Company, Limited. 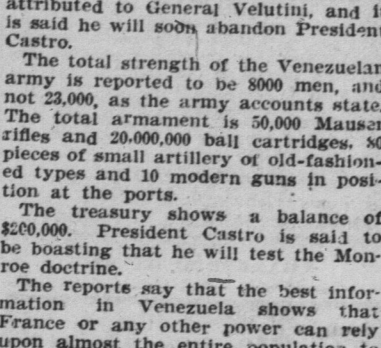

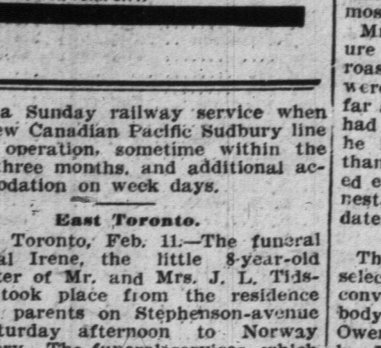

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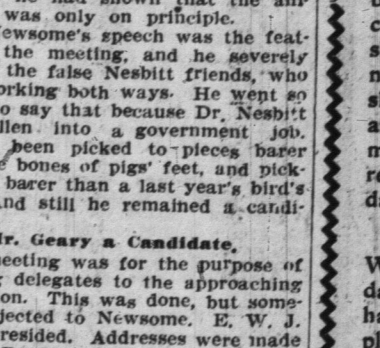

The company has addressed a circular to the Morrisstown and Brockville authorities, offering to sell them jointly a steamer to cost not less than \$100,000, upon the payment of \$1000 annually at 6 per cent. The matter will come up for discussion at the first meeting of the council.

Premier McBride's Brother Dead. Victoria, B. C., Feb. 11.—William Leonard McBride, of Port Guichen, brother of Premier McBride, died at St. Joseph's Hospital here this afternoon. He was 37 years of age and leaves a wife and four children.
