Leslie Shaw, Former Secretary of the U. S. Treasury, Makes an Important Deliverance as to American Feeling for Us of the Northern Zone.

WOULD HELP AGRICULTURE BUT HIT MANUFACTURERS

NEW YORK, May 16.-(Special.)-Predicting closer and more friendly relations with Canada than ever before, both commercially and otherwise, Leslie M. Shaw, former secretary of the treasury, went farther in his address to-night before the Canadian Club, in the ball room of the Fotel Astor, and declared his belief that Canada and the United States will eventually stand shoulder to shoulder in the matter of tariff upon imported

After pointing out the fact that Great Eritain consumes one-third of all American exports without imposing one penny more of taxation than upon internal revenue taxes on her own domestic articles, Mr. Shaw declared that it would be an outrage to admit the products of Germany, France or Italy on more favorable terms than those of England.

"I have often thought." he said,
"of what England would say if Canada
were to admit our manufactured articles upon a lower taxation than she imposes upon those of the mother country. If England will consent, ther I am in favor of commercial union with Canada, coupled with the same tariff laws, and the same immigration laws for both countries."

"I am disposed to think that such an agreement would be mutually advantageous. I grant it might, at first, slightly affect our food-producing states, but it would very soon result in an increased market for American labor sufficient to effect it. It would work to the very great advantage of Canadiam agriculture, althout would Canadian agriculture, altho it would probably retard the development of

A. W. Wright was elected the first president. J. W. Curry, K. C., of Tobnto, and Jesse Wright of Toronto Junction were selected vice-presidents. Four other vice-presidencies were left open in order that local leagues that may be organized elsewhere in Canada may be represented.

The rivers are of less importance since tee swamps have gone; the disappearance of the bush has taken with it all of its wild denizens; and the freer circulation of air corrents nearer the ground has changed many other things.

birds and animals and to attribute to them the lisappearance of birds, beasts and fish. But if man s to blame it is not always directly. Let me illus rate: Thave a neld, a big field not far from the city. It was eleared twenty years ago, partially tumped and used as pasture for forty years. It was full of fire holes and hollews of all kinds, and all of ess water-soaked. Rushes grew in some and in ach of these rush beds was at least one family of blackbirds; quite a number of snipe made their nomes and raised their young about these ponds and thousands and thousands of frogs and singing lizards made the spring nights melodious from their shallow depths. I decided to clear the field in the up-to-date way for a crop. I wanted corn and roots and oats. So I grubbed out every stump, picked up every stone and set the tile diggers at work. They ran a tile branch into every hole, and all the t to brances into a master tile. Each pond emptied or rushes or water weeds. The frogs ceased to sing from the pond; they disappeared down the tile or died in the earth; the blackbirds forsoek their quarters and the the snipe made the nightleng deleful with their cries. I watched one hollow empty the other day. Round its margin were little mounds four or five inches high, like little bechives as large as a small teacup. ' I dug them'us ; a foot or less down every one had a crab at the bottom of his well. It had to go. So that my drain meant destruction to the army of frogs and crabs, the blackbirds and saips had to go elsewhere and all the rich and numerous uegetable life of the pend folded ts tents like the crab and silently passes from sight. The rushes, willows and adders and a hundred different varieties of plant life that required water and damp earth.



Favorite Sauce.—Cream one-fourth of a cupful of butter, add gradually one-half cupful of powdered sugar, and the yolks of two eggs, beating to a cream; next add one-half cupful of cream, and cook over hot water until the mixture thickens. Then add a dessertspoonful of lemon juice, some nutmeg and the whites of the eggs beaten to a froth, blend thoroly.

Kentucky Sauce.—Cream together two cupfuls of well-flavored brown sugar, one-half cupful of butter and three egg yolks until very light; then add one-half cupful of oream, and heat over hot water, stirring all the time, adding the beaten whites of two eggs, beating to a dessertspoonful of lemon juice, some nutmeg and the whites of the eggs beaten to a froth, blend thoroly.

Kentucky Sauce.—Cream together two cupfuls of well-flavored brown sugar in a spider, stirring it all the brown; add three-fourths of a cupful of hot water, blending till smooth, and a tablespoonful each of butter and flour rubbed together. Cook together four mimutes.

Fresh Fruit Sauce.—Beat together to a light cream one-half cupful of butter, one cupful of powdered sugar and the white of one egg. Mash a cupful of ripe berries, cherries or other fruit, and sweeten, allowing it to stand an hour. Heat the beaten mixture over hot water until it becomes foamy when strain into it the fruit juice. If preferred, the fruit pulp may be added, but if possible strain out even the smallest seeds.

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

CONDUCTOR THOMPSON AND THE GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY.

In sentencing Conductor Thompson to three years in the penitentiary, Mr. Justice Riddell said:

"If this were the fault of the rules or regulations of the railway company then terrible were the guilt of those responsible for such rules and regulations, president, director, general manager or

ploye or his widow brings a suit to recover damages for personal injury ary intelligence. or wrongful death. Then some "rule" worthy of being embroidered; framed, and hung on the parlor wall, is offered in evidence. "Employes must take no chances. A train must not be moved unless the conductor and engineer know that it can be done with absolute safety." Some smug platitude like this is found in every book of rules ever printed.

Any practical railway trainmar knows that if he obeyed the printed "rules" he would not hold his job for 24 hours. The engineer who who makes time, is the man who is marked for promotion. So notorious is it that the written rules are not the real rules of the company, that in nearly every jurisdiction in the United States and Canada, the employe is allowed to show to the jury that the "rule" invoked against him has been so habitually disregarded as to imply acquiescence on the part of the

Another thing. It was claimed by the crown that Thompson never complained to the company that he was not getting sufficient sleep. Was it necessary? If, as has been stated, his run involved 20 hours a day, for five days hand running every week, could there be any doubt among those in authority that the man was being deprived of requisite rest?

In addition to the run itself, much time is required from the conductor in getting out with his train. He must examine and compare his orders and his watch with the engineer's. He must verify his manifests and examine the seals of the cars, in case of freight. He must at least casually inspect the train before it starts. Some time is lost by every trainman coming from and going to his home. When and where did the company suppose that Thompson slept unless it was upon

Stress was laid by the learned judge in sentencing Thompson on the fact that he did not notify the engineer of the danger from the approaching passenger train. Perhaps he should have done this, but it is difficult to understand what orders could have been received by the conductor, which were not also received by the engineer. As we understand it, the operator always writes out the message in triplicate; one copy is preserved; one is for the conductor; the third is for the engin-

Mr. Justice Riddell is entirely right in his position that gross negligence in operating a train is tantamount to a crime. He by no means intended that the conductor should be made the

'To my mind the persons who even permitted you to work nine-teen to twenty hours per day, day after day five days in the week, were guilty of a gross wrong; the persons who made rules or regula-lations under which this was possible, are themselves almost or quite

For the first time we have in Can ada statistical data of value, and the system, if-continued, will soon furnish most valuable schedules for comparison, not only as to Canadian railways from year to year, but as to Canadian rallways compared to railways in the United States, the system in use being the one adopted by the inter-state commerce commission at Washington.

It is interesting to note that the proportion of operating expenses to gross earnings has decreased from 76.8 per cent, to 69.1 per cent., and that, as respects passenger traffic, the gain has been much greater. In 1896 the earnings from passengers averaged about 92 cents per head. In 1906 they averaged \$1.23. The number of passengers increased by 88 per cent; the earnings from passengers increased 142 per cent. The railway commission, for the first time, presents a report to parliament

This includes, among other things, a report from the inspector of accidents. This report briefly schedules the tragedy of the rail, from Feb. 1, 1904, to March 31, 1906. During that time the ghastly record totals 784 persons killed and 386 injured. The inspector reports that he investigated a number of these accidents, but strange to say, he neglects to make any findings, to criticize anybody or to suggest any remedy. 





A visit to Latchford to-day shows that great excitement prevails, and before the last of the week hundreds of prospectors will have paddled their way up the river to the new silver camp at Elk Lake.





NEED OF PLAYGROUNDS CLAIMED TO BE URGEN

However, the Proposed Horse Market on Stanley Park Strip Meets With Favor.

The argument that the city has not ufficient park land, and that the children suffer thru lack of playgrounds, was made generous use of before the property committee and the parks and exhibition committee yesterday in an effort to defeat the application for power to erect a horse exchange on the strip of land at the southwest extremity of Stanley Park. But the opposition failed to convince, each committee forwarding a recommendation to city council favoring the

Under the terms as drafted by the essment commissioner, the company must agree to pay \$600 a year and taxes in return for a 21 years' lease. The building is to cost from \$35,000 to \$50,000. It will be 100 feet square and 60 feet high, with capacity for 1000 spectators and stable accommodation for 300 horses. It will have a stone front on the King-street side, and will be a metal covered steel frame or brick structure.

The persuasive eloquence of ex-Ald Dunn appeared to carry considerable weight with the property committee.
E. King Dodds submitted a petition claimed to be signed by 1673 property owners in the neighborhood opposing

the exchange.

J. Kelso, superintendent of the department for neglected children, said that Toronto hadn't enough play-grounds, and advocated that, as in United States cities, a trained instruc-tor should be in charge of the play-J. Lunness challenged the reliabil-

ity of the petition.

The committee lost little time in declaring in favor of the undertaking. At the suggestion of Alid. R. H. Graham it was agreed that the company should be bound to pay a maximum fee per day for entries and that there should be a public sale at least once
