Nothing Else is Talked of in the Town—A Pen Picture of Evidence at the Trial—Curiosity as to What is Coming.

Napanee, Aug. 6.—(Special).—Among all the myriad towns of 4000 population or more in Ontario Napanee stands out conspicuous. When the Napanee lands today in the hands of a few of grey-headed and snow-white grandfathers on their knees, they will recount with all the added fondness of age the history of the famous bank robbery. If it is well to grow famous, no matter how, then it is exceedingly well with Napanee. For fame has nestled down upon this town, like a mother hen gathering her brood under her wing. Not once, but twice, has it happened to Napanee to be the centre of the mental vision of Ontario—last year when the robbery occurred and the trial went off at half-past-eight, now when one of the most famous trials in the annals of criminality is in active progress.

It makes Business Brisk. It is an evil wind that blows no one good, and the full force of this maxim is felt among the merchants of this town. What with the lawyers, reporters, witnesses and interested parties in the case, and what with the supplying the wants and needs of the influx of transients, business is as brisk as in any city. The hotels are doing a land-office business, while the barbers, photographers, galleries, telegraph offices, stationery stores and clothing establishments are laying by a snug penny for a rainstorm. One merchant said to the World, "With a robbery case on the boards the year round, I could retire from business in a twelve month."

Interest Never Flags. The interest in the trial day by day never flags. From early morning till late evening, the streets are thronged with people who sit the whole court through. Looking at the sea of female faces in the courtroom one is bound to wonder how many of them are bona fide admirers of the good-man-of-the-house who has enough fortitude to work within the trial in progress, submits to the inevitable, and in solitude takes a cold bite, complacent with the fact that his better half will remain his at evening with the startling incidents of a trial in court.

The Fair Sex Agitated. There is no need to disguise the fact, the mothers and daughters of this town are greatly agitated by the trial. It is no uncommon thing to see in the crown of a pretty girl the picture of prisoner Holden as taken from the Toronto Standard. The eyes cast at the prisoner from a hundred flashing eyes speak hope and cheer and faith.

The court-room itself is of the present day sort. The seats are on the theatre plan. You enter by folding doors. Before him is the bar, and the witness sits to his right, and the dock to his left, while beyond and around are the staring spectators. Whenever the magistrate enters with the reporter and his gear, as well as de his position, the whole court stands while he takes his place.

The Bench and Bar. Judicial in his bearing, wise in his rulings, and thoroughly bent on doing his duty, Magistrate Daly is the personification of British justice. Conspicuous at the bar is E. B. Osher, Q.C., whose ability as a criminal lawyer is granted without a murmur in all Canada. Mr. E. Osher Porter bears a remarkable resemblance to his learned friend, and though as yet but little known outside of Belleville and its immediate vicinity, he has a reputation of capability to reach the top niche in his profession.

His associate, Mr. B. Northrup, Q.C., M.P., is a big man in all but physique, but what he may lack in the latter respect is amply made up in energy and enthusiasm. Mr. E. Preston, Q.C., is a slender lawyer, keen to grasp a point, and incisive in pressing it home. With his aid, prisoner Holden may be expected to present a bold front.

Lawyer W. G. Wilson is modest and never speaks unless he feels he has to. When he does speak, he does so in a terse, pointed style that carries conviction. The Colonel's Position. Colonel Ponton has not raised his voice in court as yet, but gives the good effect that he is the man at the helm. Not a point escapes his notice, and as a counsel he is a very weighty man. Both he and Mr. Northrup are honored graduates of old Varsity.

Lawyer Deroche, solicitor for the Dominion Bank, looks like a southern belle, and is a lot of vim and go in him, and is withal a general man. The Police End. LONDON OLD BOYS. They Gathered in Thousands, Made Speeches, Played Ball and Had a High Old Time.

London, Aug. 6.—(Special).—The London "Old Boys" excursion would to-day complete its success. About two thousand came from Toronto and half that number from intermediate towns and west as far as Detroit.

BRITAIN GETS INTO SHAPE. Aggressiveness of Russia Induces John Bull to Man His Fleet for Any Emergency.

London, Aug. 6.—That extensive diplomatic tension exists between Great Britain and Russia is generally admitted to-day, though the officials deprecate the alarmist reports which were current yesterday. It is hoped that the firm stand adopted by the Marquis of Salisbury during the last week, which seems to have already created some misgiving at St. Petersburg, will have the desired effect of arresting Russian aggressiveness. It is felt both here and on the continent that the outcome of the dispute in regard to the new Chwang railroad extension is the crucial point of the success or failure of Great Britain's policy of the "open door."

An evidence of the fact that Great Britain appreciates the gravity of the situation, the Associated Press learns that the Admiralty is preparing for all emergencies, and that it will soon be ready to mobilize the entire fleet at the shortest notice. Submarine mines are being laid out on half-day and have been assigned to a ship and instructed to be in readiness to join at the call of the Admiralty.

According to Paris advices, Admiral Bédouin, commanding the French-Chinese squadron, has called a demand for reinforcements and for a large credit to be applied for by the Chinese government. The reason given for these demands is that the natives of the Kwang-Chow Wang region, who are in the possession of the French-Chinese squadron, have been very restless. There is some suspicion here that the action of the French officer may be a ruse with a desire to back up Russian designs.

Dumble will have charge of the operations and command of the detachment of Royal Engineers who will conduct them.
