



DETAILS OF SATURDAY'S BATTLE. It Was a Hard Fight, as the Boers Held Their Own in a Most

Stubborn Way. London, Oct. 23 .- The British victories in Natal, following each other in quick succession, though accompanied by heavy losses on the side of the victors, bear striking testimony to the valor of the vanquished Boers. They appear to have fallen victims to the very plan by which they purposed to drive the British into the sca. They have been beaten in detail by counterstrokes carefully considered and most brillantly carried out in the face of courageous opposition, which has done much to increase British respect for the burghers, whose splendid valor and determination, it is universally admitted, reached the highest level.

Fuller Details to Hand. Fuller accounts of Saturday's battle at Elandslaagte emphasize the splendid gallantry exhibited on both sides, and the superiority of the British in a pitched battle, although the Boers fought with the greatest tenacity to the last, only yielding when further fighting was hopeless.

An armored train, with the men of the Manchester Regiment, appeared on the left, at Ladysmith, at daybreak, Saturday, in support of the Johannesburg Imperial Light Horse and the Natal Field Artillery, with the object of reopening communication at Elandslaagte. The artillery took up a position above the town and shelled the rallway station, from which the Boers ran out, and the British mounted infantry, entering the place, released the English prisoners.



To all Members of the Order who are Brit-ish Subjects. Greeting: ish Subjects, Greeting:

That the policy of the I. O. F. with fespect to members of the Order entering the military or naval service of their own country may be clearly defined and fully understood, we desire to announce:

1. All members of this Order who are British Subjects have the right to enter the Army, Navy or Militia of Great Britain, or of any of her Colonies, and serve in South Africa or wherever else they may be called; and from the date of such service they shall be rated in the Ordinary or Preferred Cless and shall pay the rates provided for such class, as set out in Section 237 of the Constitution and Laws of the Order.

2. All restrictions as to residence or employment on vessels are hereby suspended in so far as they affect or may affect such brethren; such suspension to continue during the time that the said brethren are so engaged in the service of their country.


