TWENTIETH YEAR

FURTHER DETAILS OF A FIERCE BATTLE NEAR ELANDSLAGTE.

The Total British Casualties After the Terrific Rush on the Boer Position is 42 Killed and 197 Wounded --Again Many Officers Fell.

Boers Are Said to be Attacking Glencoe and Dundee, But the News From the Scene is Meagre—General Viljoen, the Boer Commander, Was Also Killed on Saturday—Rhodes Cables for Reinforcements at Kimberley.

More thrilling details of the battle of Elandslaagte have come to hand... The details were given this morning... The news also came that not one but two of the leading Boer generals were killed—Kock and Viljoen.

The British losses in this battle were 42 killed and 197 wounded. Col. Scott-Chisholm of the Imperial White Horse is among the dead. The list of casualties is given this morning.

The Boers, 9000 strong, under Commandant Joubert had attacked Glencoe. They have also opened fire on Dundee.

It is reported that Cecil Rhodes has cabled the Imperial Government that reinforcements are needed at Kimberley, that the town was being surrounded by Transval and Free State Boers.

A story comes from Pretoria that Col. Baden-Powell has captured General Cronje of the Boer forces at Mafeking.

An attempt was made in England to wreck two trains loaded with South African troops on route from Pembroke dock to Southampton on Sunday morning.

London, Oct. 23.—The Daily Telegraph has received the following from Lady Smith, dated Sunday, 2:10 p.m.:

"The Boers, reported to be 9000 strong, and under the command of Commandant General Joubert and President Kruger in person, are to-day again attacking Glencoe. Gen. Yule, commanding our troops, has moved his camp back to a better defensive position."

Opened Fire on Dundee. London, Oct. 24.—The Daily News published this despatch from Lady Smith dated Sunday night:

"A large force, under Commandant General Joubert and Commandant Vagan, opened fire on Dundee yesterday. The firing was continued to-day. The result is not known here."

BOER CASUALTIES.

London, Oct. 23.—An official despatch from Lady Smith, the British headquarters in Natal, dated 10 p.m. yesterday, gives the following list of casualties among the prominent Boers at the battle of Elandslaagte:

General Viljoen, killed. General Kock, wounded and captured. (Since dead.) General Schiel's son, killed. General Schiel, German officer, commanding the artillery, wounded and a prisoner.

CHAMBERLAIN WAS INSULTED BY O'BRIEN AND THE IMPERIAL HOUSE SUSPENDED HIM.

It is Not a Loss. Sir Michael also pointed out that the present war differed from previous ones in that the estimates had been more carefully drawn up. No one could foresee what the total cost would be, but the British troops had met with such brilliant success and the colonies were loyal. Although there might be something in today's news giving cause for anxiety, yet he would not anticipate that the campaign would not be brought to a successful conclusion within the period for which estimates were framed.

Transval Must Pay. As British colonies had been invaded, he considered it to be consistent with all the laws of war, if when it was brought to a successful termination, the Transval taxpayer should at any rate have to bear part of the cost. The Transval had been wealthy in its gold fields. There had been complaints from those interested in the gold fields that there had been excessive taxation, but he believed that the best information that he had received was that the Government had provided a reasonable sum towards the expenses of the war, with a reduction at the same time of the taxation of the gold fields.

No Taxation at Present. Continuing, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach said that these anticipations are not fulfilled and the sum borrowed proves to be but part of the total cost of the war, we shall appeal to your patriotism next April. First Manchester Regiment—Eleven non-commissioned officers and men killed and 20 wounded. Gordon Highlanders—Five non-commissioned officers and 15 men killed, and 12 non-commissioned officers and 16 men wounded.

The total number of casualties now stands 42 killed and 197 wounded. Grand total 197.



The Movements of the Two Nations Are Known, and Great Britain is Ready for Them, Even if She Has a War on in South Africa—What About Newfoundland?

IS RHODES IN A HOLE?

Kimberley is Said to Need Reinforcements, as the Town is Surrounded by Boers. London, Oct. 24.—The Daily Mail says it understands a message was received in London yesterday from Cecil Rhodes, dated at Kimberley, Oct. 19, declaring, in substance, that the inhabitants of Kimberley desired to draw the attention of the Government to the need of promptly sending reinforcements there, as the town was being surrounded by increasing numbers of Transval and Free State Boers. The matter, according to The Daily Mail, has been submitted to the Cabinet.

TRAITORS AT WORK.

Rascally Attempt Right in England to Throw Trains of Troops Off the Track. London, Oct. 23.—What is believed to have been an attempt to wreck military trains bound from Pembroke dock to Southampton was discovered yesterday evening. Five chains were placed on the tracks at points near Swansea. Two trains laden with South African troops passed soon after their discovery.

WAS CRONJE CAPTURED?

Story Comes from Pretoria that Colonel Baden-Powell Has the Boer General. London, Oct. 24.—The correspondent of The Daily Mail at Durban, Natal, says: "An official of the Bonanza mine, who has just arrived from Pretoria, declares that while there he heard that Col. Baden-Powell, the British commander at Mafeking, had captured General Cronje and 30 other Boers, and had killed 500."

LOOKING AROUND FOR PULP.

English Agent Out Here to Make Arrangements for Business With This Continent. Chicago, Oct. 23.—S. Chase Phillips of London, who is interested in paper and pulp manufacturing, is in this city. He is in America to make arrangements for the forthcoming visit of sixty English pulp and paper manufacturers and proprietors of the Second World Irish. Phillips had a meeting with the pulp plants of the United States and Canada. Mr. Phillips explained that hitherto the English paper mills had gotten their pulp from Scandinavia. Now they are looking to Canada and Maine. One hundred thousand tons of American pulp would be taken by England this year, and he estimated that in two years the figure would be increased to 600,000 tons.

Subsequently, Montreal, Ottawa and possibly Toronto, will be visited. The visit to Canada will, of necessity, be a short one, as the delegates are booked to sail for England on Nov. 4.

TRYING TO HULLY TRAITOR'S DISLOYALTY.

Sir Wilfrid's Quebec Organ Comes Out With a Loyal Article.

REASON BOURASSA BOLTED.

Surmised to be That He Was Promised Cabinet Rank and Was Thrown Down.

LE SOLEIL TAKES HIM TO TASK.

For Kicking Up When the Premier is Having so Much Trouble With English Provinces.

Montreal, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—There can be no doubt that Hon. Mr. Tarte's position in the Cabinet is rapidly becoming untenable, and that Mr. Bourassa's resignation was prompted by the Minister of Public Works, who posted off to Quebec to try to induce other members to follow suit. It has been stated that Mr. Malouin, M.P., might resign, but this is doubted. In fact, it looks as if the Minister of Public Works would get a cool reception in his little game to stir up trouble in this Province. It is believed that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had promised Mr. Bourassa Cabinet rank, and, being unable to carry out this promise, the grandeur of Bourassa kicked like a steed and finally resigned.

Pacaud's Paper Speaks.

Le Soleil, the Government organ in Quebec, has a very significant article. It reproaches the member for Labelle for embarrassing Sir Wilfrid Laurier, while the English-speaking Provinces are giving him so much trouble. "Who will now deny that Canada is a hard country to govern?" says Mr. Pacaud. "Sir Wilfrid Laurier has no right to ignore the sentiment and aspirations of the great majority of this country, composed, as it is, of English Protestants, and also of French Catholics. He has become so identified with this country that they have just as strong a desire to go and fight for their Mother Country as their English-speaking fellow-countrymen."

What Might Have Happened.

Le Soleil also intimates that the Government failed to send a contingent to the Transval. It would not have been a surprise to see Mr. Chambliss, or even Lord Minto to dismiss his advisers, and the Quebec organ concludes as follows: "The step taken by Mr. Bourassa is so deeply to be regretted, should have the effect of engaging all the French Canadian efforts to close their ranks tighter than ever in support of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Le Soleil also calls upon the Mother Country to give an unprecedented reception to the Canadian contingent."

The Herald in Line.

The Herald also says: "The action of the Government in sending a contingent to the Transval is most unfortunate. It must be followed in the future, but at the same time we venture to say that similar action will never be taken by the people of Canada whenever a similar set of contingents arise."

BOURASSA TALKED.

Told His Constituents He Threw Up His Seat Because of the Contingent. Montreal, Oct. 23.—Henri Bourassa, the late member for Labelle, addressed two meetings in his constituency yesterday, in the morning at Papineauville and in the evening at Montebello. He read his resignation to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, explaining his reasons for resigning, declaring that the Premier should have called Parliament before sending a contingent to the Transval, and that it is his duty to resign. He also announced that he had accepted of the Edwards Lumber Company, who employed a large number of French Canadian, and that his resignation would run against Mr. Bourassa as the straight Liberal candidate.

To all Members of the Order who are British Subjects, Greeting: That the policy of the I. O. F. with respect to members of the Order entering the military or naval service of their country may be clearly defined and fully understood, we desire to announce:

1. All members of this order who are British Subjects have the right to enter the Army, Navy or Militia of Great Britain, or of any of Her Colonies or Territories in Africa or elsewhere they may be called, and from the date of such service they shall be rated in the ordinary or Preferred Class and shall pay the rates provided for such class, as set out in Section 277 of the Constitution and Laws of the Order.

2. All restrictions as to residence or employment on vessels are hereby suspended in so far as they affect members of this order, such suspension to continue during the time that the said members are so engaged in the service of their country.

These are the rates to be paid by the members of the I. O. F. who go to the Transvaal in the service of their country. All members of the Canadian Contingent who are about leaving for the Transvaal may join the Order without the payment of any fees whatsoever.



INSURRECTION AT PANAMA. A HIGH HOT BORDER FIGHT.

Martial Law Has Been Proclaimed in the Isthmian City. So a Report Says.

THE UPRISING IS WIDESPREAD. A SUNDAY BASEBALL EXCURSION

Insurgents Have Armed River Steamers, Burned Bridges and Done Other Things. Developed a Row and Mexican Guards Who Tried to Stop It Were Resisted.

Washington, Oct. 23.—A cablegram has been received at the State Department from U.S. Consul Gudgeon at Panama, stating that an insurrection has broken out there, and that martial law has been declared.

THE PHILIPPINE WAR.
Capt. Guy Howard Was Shot Down by a Concealed Enemy—Skirmishing Continues.

Washington, Oct. 23.—The following telegram confirming the report of the death of Capt. Guy Howard was received at the War Department from General Otis to-day: Manila, Oct. 23.—Capt. Guy Howard, assistant quartermaster and quartermaster of the 10th Cavalry, was shot down by a concealed enemy on the Rio Grande River by a native and a native were wounded. A civilian employe and a native were wounded. A scouting detachment, 30th Volunteers, encountered insurgents southwest of Santa Rita, scattering them, killing six, capturing eight, and ten rifles. No casualties. General Lawton is operating at San Isidro. The forwarding of supplies to that point continues, attended with some difficulty on account of lack of transportation, which will be applied to the insurgents in Southern Luzon attacked Calamba. These were driven off. No casualties. This morning Kine, commander of the 10th Cavalry, with only attached insurgent forces concentrating on his front, routed them from trenches and pursued them three miles. His casualties, one private killed, one corporal and three privates wounded. Enemy's loss unknown.

THE PRINCE RECEIVED "BEN."
Ex-President Harrison Paid a Visit to Marlborough House.

London, Oct. 23.—The Prince of Wales to-day received former President Benjamin Harrison in audience at Marlborough House. Mr. Harrison was accompanied by the United States Ambassador, Mr. Joseph H. Choate. After the audience Mr. Harrison visited the House of Commons, accompanied by Mr. A. J. Balfour, the Government leader in the House, and First Lord of the Treasury.

AGAIN DIAMONDS GO UP.
Two Advances of 5 Per Cent. Made Within a Week.

New York, Oct. 23.—Since the 16th inst. diamonds in the rough have advanced twice in each case 5 per cent., making a total increase in price of 55 per cent. during the last six months. So far the cut diamonds have not been affected, but as soon as the rough stones are put on the market a proportionate rise in cost will result in the finished product.

JEWISH HOUSES STONED.
Anti-Semitic Riots in Moravia Resulted in a Charge of Genocide.

Vienna, Oct. 23.—Anti-Semitic riots broke out at Heliobach, Moravia, yesterday evening. Jewish houses were stoned, stores pillaged, a house was burned and the residents chased. The rioters killed several persons and injured several others. The military finally restored order.

TYPHOID AT CAPE NOPE.
There Are Now in Hospital at That Camp 250 Patients.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 23.—Advices from Cape Nome, Alaska, brought by the steamer Lakme, which left here Oct. 6, are that typhoid fever has broken out in the camp in severe form. The hospital is crowded, there are now 250 patients in it. There have been five deaths and others are expected.

Next to Knox Church.

He was 70 years of age and leaves three children, Mr. George Coppia, organist and choirmaster of the Weston Methodist Church, is a son of deceased. The funeral this afternoon will be private.

Rev. Philip Toque Dead.
Rev. Philip Toque, a retired Anglican clergyman, died on Sunday at his house, 70 Stafford-street, after a brief illness. He was 80 years of age and was a native of Newfoundland. In 1854 he was ordained a priest. He held several important charges, but in later years besides doing considerable writing he acted as missionary to sailors.
