Beresford Says "Insane Advertising of Dreadnoughts" Causes Needless

Offence.

LONDON, May 21—Addressing a gathering of Australasians here tonight on the naval question, Admiral Lord Charles Beresford urged that the colonies, instead of contributing toward the building of a Dreadnought, should build cruisers to protect their trade and commerce, and to form the nucleus of a navy of their own, after the example of Japan, which a half century ago was fighting with tortoiseshell armor and bows and arrows.

This, he said, should not be difficult for the colonies. What the British Empire wanted was a navy that was able pire wanted was a navy that was able to go out and attack and protect trade

to go out and attack and protect trade routes.

He considered that "our insane advertising of Dreadnoughts" offended other nations and involved Europe in terribly expensive naval competition.

"The only way the colonies can help us is by protecting their own traderoutes. The idea of having destroyers and submarines in their home water would not carry out the object at all. If the Dominions would begin with cruisers they would eventually go in for a larger growth, but to meet the difficulty and gain the object they have in view, namely, to help the mother country, the investment of money in cruisers will most likely meet the object desired."

Beresford advocated the occasional interchange of ships and declared that if the nations of Canada, South Africa, Australia and Britain cemented together for defence they could laugh at the rest of the world.
