Nearly On Time But Only Few Passengers

The Suburban Freight Springs Surprise Today

TROUBLE OF ANOTHER KIND

To Make Up Some Time For Passengers Freight Cars Were Left Behind and Now There is Complaint By Merchants

The suburban-freight on the I. C. R. did much better than usual this morning, springing a gentle surprise upon the passengers, train crew and quite a number of suburbanites who refused to stir their homes in time to meet it but waited until the Sussex came along before going into the city. The train was just seven minutes behind time, so that it is to be wondered that all were surprised. The arrival nearly on time was accomplished by reducing the string of freight cars to half their usual number before attaching the three passenger cars at Hampton. Thus, instead of having a train of forty-falling 1100 tons today's train was just 850 tons. The train did not have to make the same number of stops this morning for any who have been accustomed to riding to the city on the first suburban car. The passing of the Sussex in rain which has been more regular than there are also instances of some few suburbanites who are required to be at work at 8 o'clock remaining in the city overnight rather than take any chances of losing their employment because of a Guelph freight special. Instead of usual seventy there were only about thirty-five people on board. A new phase of the situation has now presented itself. Merchants about the city are complaining that the practice of cutting the freight in half continues to mean a delay of twenty-four hours in delivering their goods. The remaining half of the freight special today left at Moncton and the presumption is that it will not be brought down till tomorrow morning. Taking Manager Guelph's figures as an estimate it computed that instead of the I. C. R. retaining a loss of \$10,000 which was strongly complained at his conference in the suburbs, it is now losing nearly \$2000 by the splitting of the freight.

New Rules on I. C. R.

An order-in-council at Ottawa puts to force new rules and regulations on the I. C. R. and P. E. I. Railway. They include a general notice and general rules that apparently are intended to insure any laxity that may have existed in the conduct of employees in the general notice reads: "To enter or remain in the service is assurance of willingness to obey the 'Obedience to the rules is essential to a safety of passengers and employees, and to the protection of property. 'The service demands the faithful, intelligent and courteous discharge of duty to obtain promotion, capacity must be shown for greater responsibility. 'Employees, in accepting employment, assume their risks. 'The following are among the general rules: 'The use of intoxicants by employees on duty is prohibited. The use of or frequenting of places where they are sold is sufficient cause for dismissal. The use of tobacco by employees while on duty or on passenger stations, on passenger cars, is prohibited. Employees must always be vigilant to detect and must promptly report any thing detrimental to the railway's interest."

The date is fixed today. The executive clemency Governor Glenn now is all that can prevent the death of the gunmen.

GIANT BRITANNIC IN WATER TODAY

Sister Ship of Ill-fated Titanic Launched at Belfast—Is 300 Yards Long

Belfast, Ireland, Feb. 26—The launch of the Britannic, the 30,000 ton White Star liner, marks an important development in constructional safety so far as engineering ingenuity can ensure it. She was launched today. The Britannic, intended for the Transatlantic service, had only just been laid down when the Titanic disaster occurred and as a result of that accident the plans of the new liner were almost completely remodelled. She is a triple screw steamer, 300 feet in length, and there has been introduced into her construction every device possible to prevent a recurrence of the accident which destroyed the Titanic. A complete inner skin extends to a considerable height above the load line, the most vulnerable portion of the vessel, and the height and number of the bulkheads have been increased. It is said she will be able to float with any six compartments flooded. The inner skin consists of heavy plating, which extends for more than half its length of the vessel, from the water-tight bulkhead in front of the forward boiler room, to the stern end of the turbine engine room. It is connected to the outer shell by longitudinal tubes and angles, with especially strong sections at the bulkheads and water-tight divisions. In addition an extra water-tight bulkhead has been introduced and the existing bulkheads have been carried right up to the bridge deck.

Historic Church Burned Down by Women

Arson Squad Set Fire In Dunbar—Relics of Battle of Scots and Cromwell's Forces Destroyed

Dunbar, Scotland, Feb. 26—An "arson squad" of militant suffragettes today burned to the ground the historic parish church of the village of White Kirk, near here. A large quantity of antique furniture was left strewn about the scene. The church was erected in the sixteenth century and contained many relics of the battle in which the Scots were routed by Oliver Cromwell's forces in 1650. In the vicinity is the famous battle ground of Dunbar, where the English totally defeated the Scots in 1296 and caused John Balliol to give up the crown of Scotland. Many priceless scriptural relics and curios from the Holy Land were destroyed by the fire.

All May Be Warned To Leave Mexico

Washington, Feb. 26—The possibility that Great Britain, Germany, France and other powers may follow the lead of the United States in warning their subjects to leave Mexico, was discussed in official circles here today. It is reported that the fire is under control. B. J. Arden, night watchman, thinks the fire originated in the stores department under the front end of the building, and was apparently due to electric wiring. Immediately that the alarm was spread all the guards of the penitentiary turned out armed and waiting to take immediate measures to quell a mutiny. The prisoners appeared nervous and restless, packing their cells and watching the night outside, but otherwise everything was quiet. The loss in the stores department will amount to \$12,000, with the other departments, it is expected that the total loss will amount to a much greater figure.

PROMINENT MEN DEAD IN ENGLAND

Sir John Tennie, Noted Cartoonist; Professor Driver, Hebrew Scholar

London, Feb. 26—Sir John Tennie, for many decades the principal British cartoonist, died today at the age of ninety-four. Oxford, Feb. 26—Rev. Samuel Rolles Driver, regius professor of Hebrew in England and Canon of Christ Church, died today in his 88th year. Professor Driver was probably one of the greatest authorities on Hebrew and took a prominent part in revising the Old Testament.

H. ERNEST HILL OF DARTMOUTH IS DEAD

Halifax, Feb. 26—H. Ernest Hill, of Dartmouth, died this morning. Formerly he was a member of the Hill company up to the time it was taken over by the Starr Manufacturing Co., when he was made a director. This position he held at the time of his death. He was fifty-three years old.

ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE URGE IMPORTANT MEASURES

Toronto, Feb. 25—The members of the Associated Boards of Trade today decided to: Ask the dominion government to subsidize a line of ocean freighters, to cost \$2,000,000; Urge the Ontario government to do the proposed Workmen's Compensation Act; Ask that the alien naturalization limit be increased to five years, and that precautions against the evils of illiteracy in voting, etc., be taken; Recommend the establishment of a dominion labor bureau; Favor the adoption of a central site in London, England, and the erection of a building for the joint employment and services of the Canadian provinces; Urge the expenditure of a liberal dominion grant this year upon good roads and bridges.

SAYS BROTHER KILLED POLICEMAN

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 25—Wesley Moore, a young self-confessed automobile bandit, has admitted that his brother Alpheus, who was shot by a policeman on Saturday night while trying to rob a grocery store, was the slayer of Patrolman Thomas F. McMenen. The policeman was killed several weeks ago when he attempted to detain two young men on Friday, not so cold tonight, in western portion moderate west wind.

Killed In Duel By His Comrade

Metz, Germany, Feb. 26—Lieutenant Hagen, N. B., the 9th infantry regiment, stationed here, was killed today in a duel with Lieutenant Von La Valette, a comrade of the same regiment.

MISSING LINGAN REPORTED SAFE

Picked Up With Propeller Gone and is Being Towed to Boston

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 26—The Dominion collier Lingan, feared for whose safety was felt during the last few days, is safe. She was picked up 110 miles southeast of Cape George by the cutter Morwenna. The Lingan's propeller is gone. She is being towed to Boston. The Morwenna is a Dominion Coal Company's boat and is under charter to the Red Cross Line between Halifax and New York.

ST. JOHN MAN SAID TO BE IN NUMBER

J. H. Burton, a wealthy bachelor of St. John, N. B., according to his description in a despatch to the Boston Post, has been disappointed in his ambition to secure the services of a handsome young housekeeper and in addition to that he is out of pocket the amount of money he forwarded to the lady for her traveling expenses from Boston.

The lady in the case, Mrs. Mabel Jewett, has been arrested in New York by post office inspectors on the charge of using the mails to defraud by posing as an applicant for a job as housekeeper. She is said to have worked in the same game for fifteen years under various names. Her method was to advertise for a position as housekeeper, stating that a good home was more of an inducement than the wages. When she secured replies she is said to have accepted them all, forwarded a picture of a pretty young woman alleged to be herself and asked for money for traveling expenses. Mrs. Jewett is about sixty years old and has a husband, who is serving a term in jail; also a son and daughter, more than twenty-five years of age.

LOWEST BUILDING IN KING STREET TO GIVE WAY TO THE ADVANCE OF BUSINESS

One of the landmarks of King street will disappear on May 1 when Louis Green's tobacco store in the Hall property next to Oak Hall and now owned by Scott Brothers & Company, Ltd., will be vacated. Knowing that his premises would be required some day, Mr. Green took the precaution to provide himself with another stand and opened another store in Charlotte street and this will be his headquarters after May 1. The store which he is vacating is being razed for another year, but this period will mark the end of the career of the little two story building which has, for many years, held the record of being the lowest building in King street. Next year it will be razed to the ground and it will be replaced by a handsome new building which will be occupied by Scott Brothers & Company.

SARDINE COMPANY PROPOSAL

The Canadian Sardine Company has laid before its creditors a proposal which would enable it to escape liquidation and to resume work. The proposal is that the creditors accept in settlement of their claims, six per cent bonds which would be redeemed as soon as the company is in a position to do so.

New York, Feb. 26—When Judge Midgley Marsden, of Hales-Briggs, England, awarded the challenge trophy for the best dog in the Westminster Kennel Club Exhibition, yesterday, to an English sheep dog Stumber, owned by Mrs. Tyler Moore, Westbury, L. I., it marked the fourth successive annual win by an English bred dog at this show. Fast Freight, a wire-haired fox terrier, owned by Bickley Kennels, Evanston, Ill., was the runner up, but the judge predicted that the latter would eventually be beaten by Matford Vic, an English fox terrier, which, owing to poor condition during the week, was ineligible to compete for the best dog prize.

Among the visitors were Dr. Robert Webster, master of the Ottawa Hunt Club, and J. H. Sturdee, a Canadian alienist, who is a breeder of high class collies. When Mr. Alban Sturdee, of St. John, showed a fine Irish setter, Richwoods Boy, which was a winner in his class.

BACK FROM IRELAND

Patrick Walsh Was on a Visit Home After Nearly 10 Years

After an enjoyable visit to his old home in Ireland, Patrick F. Walsh, of the I. C. R. news department, has returned to St. John. He was away about five months and visited England and Wales in addition to different parts of Ireland. His old home is in Coppakeel, Monasterevin, and it was the first time he had been there for nearly ten years. He was heartily greeted by old friends and relatives, his brother resides there as do two sisters who are novitiates in a convent of the Sisters of Charity. When first he came to this country Mr. Walsh was but fifteen years of age. He is now about twenty-four years of age and this is his second trip to his home in the old country. On his first return journey he brought out here with him two of his sisters. The feeling in the old country he said today was that Ireland would certainly be granted home rule this year. One factor noticeable now was that the young men of the country were not showing the same tendency to migrate as characterized their ancestors, because of improved conditions, and the possibility of their owning their own farms. Speaking of education, Mr. Walsh said that he was glad to see young children here to see young men of their own age skipping to school in Ireland with a penny and a piece of turf, for in part of the country schooling was not yet entirely free and the pupils were required to bring a penny and provide their own fuel.

PROBATE

The probate court today took up the matter of the estate of Samuel T. King, lumber merchant. He died in 1891. By his will he nominated his son Charles W. King, and his son-in-law, James Stratton, trustees. They having died without fully administering the estate, on the petition of the widow, the surviving son and the daughters, Gorham K. King of Red Bluff, California, a son of Charles W. King and grandson of the testator, is appointed administrator, with the will annexed, of the unadministered portion of the estate, and a commission having issued to administer the oath of office to him on the return thereof such letters were issued today. Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford are executors.

METEORITE STRIKES VILLAGE

Warsaw, Russia, Feb. 26—Several houses were destroyed by a huge meteorite which descended today in the village of Jendkovity. It emitted sulphurous fumes.

GOVERNMENT CHECK IN FRANCE OVER INCOME TAX

Paris, Feb. 26.—The government suffered a check in the senate yesterday during a debate on the income tax. A ministerial, Senator Puchot, introduced an amendment that the bill would provide for the immediate abolition of the present system of direct taxation and the substitution of a tax on income. This was rejected by 140 to 184.

FISHERY CLAIM SETTLED IS ANNOUNCEMENT IN SPEECH

(Continued from page 1.) A short time ago there was placed by the United States an embargo against potato shipments from Canada into that country. This action was one of great importance to the agriculturist in New Brunswick. The agricultural department has kept in touch with the American authorities, representatives from the department and from the potato shippers having attended a meeting in Washington in December, and subsequently a meeting at Bangor, Me.

The important subject of maritime representation has received consideration during recess. My government was represented at the inter-provincial conference held in Ottawa in October last, when this subject was presented and discussed at the conference. It is a matter of sincere regret that the representatives of the various provinces did not concur in the case as presented by the maritime province representation. The conference decided that it was a matter to be dealt with by parliament. Further effort in connection with the representation was made in January last, when the claims of the maritime provinces were put forward and urged upon the federal government.

I am pleased to announce the settlement of the fishery claims that have been outstanding between the province and the federal government for upwards of thirty years. The settlement of these claims ensures the payment by the federal government to the province of the sum of \$4,000,000. My government has pressed for a settlement of these claims, and there is no doubt the knowledge that an agreement has been reached and that payment will be made will be heard with interest and satisfaction throughout the province.

The work in the immigration department has increased rapidly during the year, and reports show a larger number of people settling in the province than formerly. The Farm Settlement Board have had a busy year, having purchased over 160 properties, and have sold and settled over 180. Greater publicity throughout Great Britain and more complete organization within the province would ensure splendid results. We have the fertile lands and we have satisfactory markets. The province urgently requires more population upon the land.

Railway construction has been active throughout the year, the Minto Railway and the Southampton Railway both having been completed, and both are being operated by the C. P. R. Company. Since the opening of the Minto line a very substantial development has taken place at the coal areas at Minto. The railway is assured a paying traffic, and a populous community is being built up in the mining district. The New Brunswick Coal and Railway has been operated by the C. P. R. under agreement to lease since June 1 last. Work on the St. John Valley Railway has proceeded throughout the entire season. The grading is practically completed between Centreville and Gagetown, a distance of 120 miles. Between the above mentioned points over ninety miles of steel is laid. The superstructures of the bridges are being placed at present. Considerable ballasting has been done, and this work will be prosecuted vigorously with the opening of spring. It is hoped that the three sections from Centreville to Gagetown will be ready for operating by midsummer. Work on the remaining sections will be proceeded with.

The ordinary revenues of the Crown Land Department are slightly less than last year, the cut of lumber being smaller than for several years. The ordinary revenue, exceeding half a million, does not include the receipts from the sale of lands, the proceeds of such sale going to the "Crown Land Sinking Fund." The above amount does not include the receipts on account of the new timber licenses issued under the authority of the Crown Timber Act of 1913. Bills to amend the succession duties act, the mining act, public utilities act, etc., as well as other measures, will be submitted for your consideration. I have directed that the accounts showing the income and expenditure for the past year, together with a statement showing the income and expenditure for the current year up to the opening of the present session, be laid before you. Estimates of the probable income and expenditure for the present year will be submitted to you. I am confident that you will find that proper attention has been paid to the needs of our public services and due regard to economy in administration. I will leave you to your deliberations, confident that you will devote yourselves earnestly in promoting such legislation as will result in the progress and development of our province.

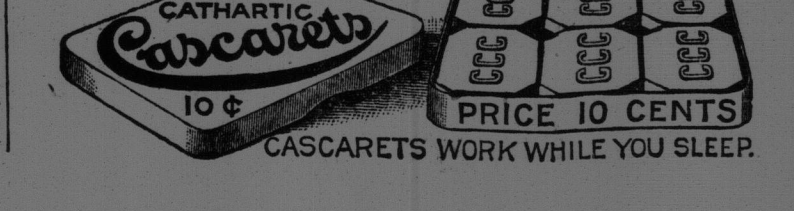
Daily Hints For the Cook

Cream of Tartar Biscuits One quart of bread flour after sifting, 2 level teaspoons of cream of tartar, 1 level teaspoon of soda, same of salt and sugar, 1 rounded tablespoon of lard. Mix with milk, about one coffee-cup full or enough to make a soft dough. Mix lightly and quickly with a knife. Handle just enough to get into shape on a lightly floured board. Roll out about 1/4 inch thick, cut small, grease tin, hot oven about 15 minutes. Always use level teaspoons of cream of tartar and soda.

Lemon Tarts Line your pans with a rich piecrust, prick with a fork and bake in a quick oven. Mix in double boiler 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup butter, 1 tablespoon flour, the juice and grated rind of 1 lemon, yolks of 3 eggs and white of 1. 1 cup hot water and cook until thick. As soon as the shells are done fill with the hot mixture and spread with a meringue.

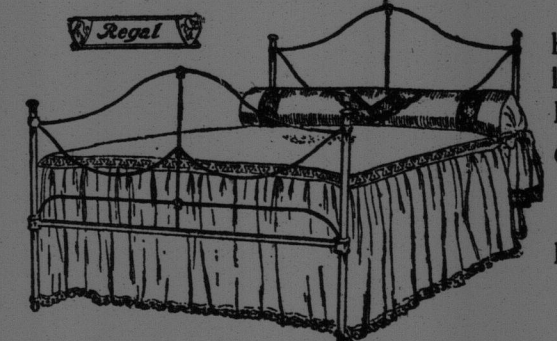

PROTECT THE BIRDS

Treaty Between Great Britain and States; Also Other Nations

Washington, Feb. 26.—A treaty is being negotiated between Great Britain and the United States for the protection of migratory birds which at different periods of the year pass between Canada and the United States. The secretary of state is acting under authority of a law of congress.

A treaty with Great Britain applies to birds that migrate between the British colonies in Central and South America and the West Indies, as well as Canada.

It is understood this treaty will be followed by others between the United States and France and Holland, which have colonies in America.



KADUNA IN PORT AFTER FOUR WEEKS BATTLE WITH STORMS

The long overland South African liner Kaduna, under the command of Captain Purdon, arrived in port last evening after twenty-eight days and eleven hours of what the captain termed "the worst weather I have ever experienced." The Kaduna left Cardiff on January 29 and for the greater part of her voyage was tossed and buffeted about by strong winds and mountainous seas that threatened to tear her machinery and boilers from their supports. When the steamer was 800 miles west of Falmouth one of her compasses was smashed and she was holed for sixteen hours until temporary repairs were made. She ran into a hurricane on February 1 and again speed was reduced and the vessel allowed in the trough of the sea, her decks inclined some times more than forty-five degrees, the boat deck was lifted by the wind from the side walls. The hurricane threw the guy bolts from the masts, the tarpaulins on the hatches and the canvas on the bridge were torn to ribbons, and only with difficulty was the funnel saved. From February 8 to February 18 the Kaduna made but forty miles. Captain Purdon has been to St. John before in command of the South African steamers Menai and Yale. The Kaduna is docked at Long Wharf and will load for South Africa.

RECENT DEATHS

Michael Hanlon passed away in the early hours of yesterday morning at the residence of his stepson, John Hughes, 107 Hilyard street. He leaves, besides his wife, four sons, James, of Fairville; Joseph, of Boston; Charles, of Dakota; and William, of St. John; two daughters, Mrs. Daniel McCann of this city, and Mrs. Jas. Logan, of Winchester (Mass.). Two sisters, Mrs. Catherine Dolan, and Mrs. John Dolan, both of this city, also survive him. Mr. Hanlon, who was a surveyor by profession, was well known in Fairville and Milford where he had spent the greater part of his life.

Charles H. Ebbett died at his home in Lower Gagetown last Thursday. He was in his seventy-ninth year, and leaves a sister and three sons. The funeral was held last Saturday, and was conducted by Rev. D. Patterson, assisted by Rev. C. B. Lewis.

NEPHEW OF KING IS AT WORK ON A FARM IN ENGLAND

London, Feb. 25.—Prince Erik of Denmark, a nephew of King Christian X, after working unobtrusively on an English farm at Fairford, in Gloucestershire for some months, will soon go to Holland and Belgium to continue his agricultural education.

If it is said, the way of the prince in England is due to the advice of Minister of Agriculture Pedersen, who encouraged his own daughter to study domestic life as a maid servant here. It is well known that Denmark is famous in her dairies, but Mr. Pedersen, while visiting England some time ago, was impressed with the profitable English method of using waste lands in hog rearing, which he is alleged to have described as the best he has ever seen. He has now returned to his native Denmark, father of Prince Erik, to send the latter there.

The prince lives in a farmer's family on an equal status with its members. He works hard and for long hours. Occasionally he pays a visit to his aunt, Queen Mother Alexandra, at Sandringham.

TWO ARE ACQUITTED

In the County Court yesterday afternoon, the jury acquitted George Campbell on a charge of theft from the C. P. R., and William P. McFarlane on a charge of setting fire to the court house, market building, Dufferin hotel and one or two other places last April.

The latter case was tried before the following jury: G. D. Davidson, Frank E. Lewis, W. J. Thomas, W. B. McDonough, James A. Brown, James A. Stevenson, Thomas Cogger, William B. Hatfield, Wilfred C. Day, Percy B. Holman, James Higgins and J. C. Lake.

Evidence regarding the fire was given by F. C. Gates, J. C. Berry, Deputy Chief Jenkins, Armstrong B. Clifford, Fred W. McNeil and Wilfred E. McGuire and the Chief of Police told of making the arrest.

Dr. J. V. Agin, medical superintendent of the Provincial Hospital, was called for the defence, and said that the defendant was suffering from hallucinations, and had imaginary ideas about a certain sect he called "Morsomites." These McFarlane described to him, he said, as a band of people who were working to get his money. They held offices at King Square, McFarlane said, and he believed that they employed all the civic officials including the magistrate, the chief of police and the recorder, and that they received half of their salaries for "placings" them.

The jury acquitted the prisoner but found him of unsound mind and he was allowed to go with his parents.

The judge's charge in the case of the King vs. George Campbell, charged with stealing a bottle of whisky from the C. P. R., was given yesterday afternoon and the prisoner was acquitted.

INSPECTION FOR MAINE POTATOES

Governor and Council Passes Orders Regulating Shipments Out of State

(Bangor Commercial)

Augusta, Feb. 25.—The governor and council passed the following orders on Monday relative to the appearance of the powdery scab potato disease in Arctostook county near the New Brunswick border.

That the commissioner of agriculture is hereby requested and directed to use the power and authority of the state to

(a) inspect and regulate the shipments of potatoes in and out of the state and particularly to establish at once a system of complete inspection of all potatoes in and to be shipped from the area infected by powdery scab.

(b) To prevent the replanting of land infected with powdery scab with potatoes the coming season; to use every effort to prevent the planting of seed potatoes other than those known to be free from infection and to use every effort to make clean the infected areas.

(c) In order to completely and successfully carry out the above instructions, the commissioner of agriculture is authorized to invite the cooperation of all railroads and other transportation companies of Maine and Canada and the dealers of potatoes and all other persons engaged in raising potatoes and all other persons who in any way should be able to assist in preventing the spread of this and other contagious potato diseases in the state.

(d) Also authorize and request the attendance of the commissioner of agriculture, the director of the experiment station, and William A. Marton at the hearing to be held before the horticultural board in Washington, Feb. 26.

CANT STOP HATPIN EVIL

Paris, Feb. 25.—The police are beginning to believe that la belle Parisienne is invincible. Twice has the prefecture issued a stern edict against unprotected hatpins, but the Parisienne merely smiles, shrugs her shoulders and goes on her way, often bristling like a hedgehog. To Prefect Hennion was first entrusted the task of rebuking careless hatpin wearers, but, although he had become the terror of the Apaches, he failed ignominiously to bring about a change in the Parisienne's dangerous habit. For a few days after the order was issued the younger and more energetic policemen produced their notebooks and took the names and addresses of fair offenders but a smile disarmed them and people remained in as great danger as before. M. Hennion made a new rule. Since the majority of the gouged and lacerated cheeks occurred in the underground or in omnibuses, he ordered the guards to refuse admittance to all women with unprotected hatpins, but the subway guards proved too gallant. Inquiry at headquarters show that not a single report of such exclusion has been made, although in every train the deadly hatpins are plainly visible.

HOUSE RENTS

To the Editor of the Times—Sir—Seeing an item in your paper about a society formed in New York to fight the loan shark, I thought something might be done to destroy one of the same nature in this city, namely the rent shark. There are many honest house owners. It is not these I refer to, but those who seem to have no conscience, those who demand rent far above their property value. Allow me to give three instances.

A flat in St. Patrick street was let last year for \$8; this year it is \$12. Another case in City Road has \$5 a month added to his houses in that street. Another landlord has his flats rented at high pressure, and his tenants must get their groceries from him. I think that is about as near slavery as he dare go. People with families cannot get a place to cover their heads. Many have to pay more than they are able, and they and the children must suffer for the unholy greed of others.

I write this so that our city council will be awakened to the fact that this house letting has become a serious matter, and will not stand delay much longer. I know supply and demand rule the market, but the demand in this case is artificial and is caused by our system of house letting. If taking the house by the year was abolished, and letting by the month was adopted, the demand would spread itself from two to twelve months. There would not be the same break-neck race to get a house in February or March. I think the city should build houses for the work-people. This is not charity but business and a paying one.

If something like this is not done, it will drive many from the city, while others will be forced to herd together, two or three families in one small flat. This will not stand for health or morals. This should appeal to our employers, for if the workers have to live under such conditions as many are now forced to do and in the immediate future many more will have to do, we cannot be efficient workers.

Our city is doing all it can to hold old industries and induce new ones to locate here, but this is worse than useless without able workers.

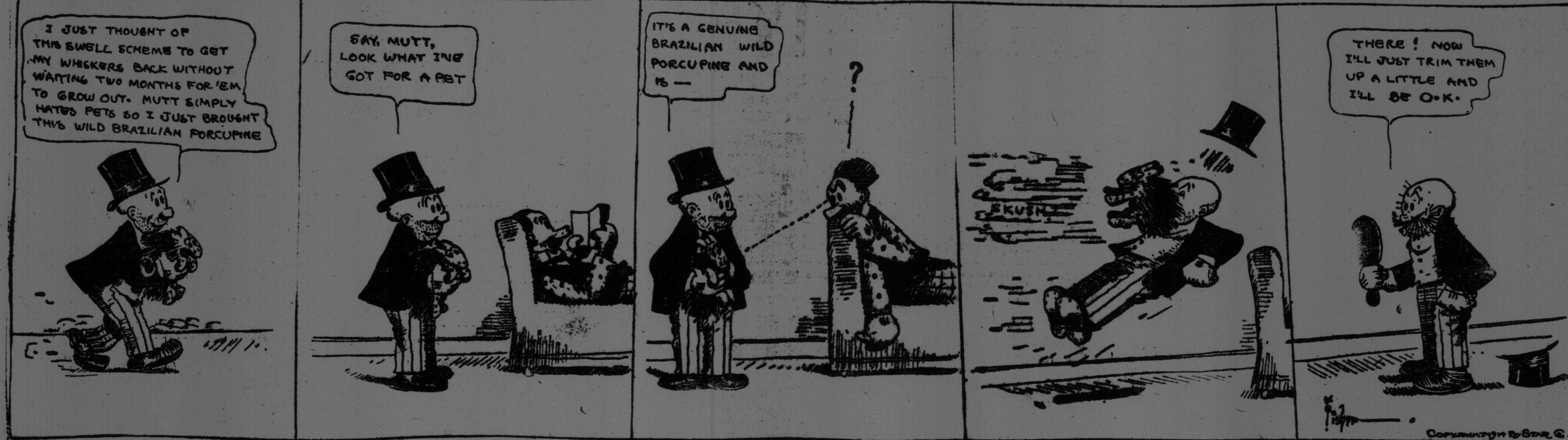

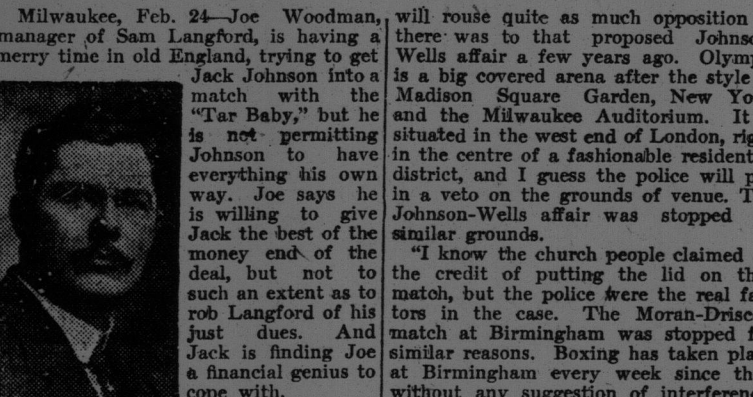

ACADIA UNIVERSITY

Baptist Foreign Mission Board Cets \$15,000—Other Bequests in Mrs. Tedford's Will

The will of Mrs. Anne Willett Tedford, wife of Harvey G. Tedford of Yarmouth, N. S., disposes of an estate of \$125,000, made up of \$105,000 personal property and \$20,000 real estate. The will is dated July 19, 1906 and Captain John Walter Anderson of Yarmouth is executor. The principal bequests are:

- To the husband, Harvey G. Tedford, \$20,000.
To Acadia University, \$20,000.
Old Ladies' Home, Yarmouth, \$4,000.
Yarmouth Y. M. C. A., \$2,000.
Foreign Mission Board of Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, \$15,000.
Halifax School for the Blind, \$1,000.
Zion Church, Yarmouth, \$1,000.
Yarmouth Public Library, \$1,000.
Home Mission Board of the Baptist Church, \$1,000.
Yarmouth Town Mission \$500.
Deaf and Dumb, Halifax, \$500.
Halifax Infants' Home, \$500.
British American Bible and Tract Society, \$500.
N. S. Branch of British and Foreign Bible Society \$500.
Ministers Annuity Fund of Baptist Convention of Maritime Provinces, \$1,000.
Yarmouth Mountain Cemetery Company, \$500.

After making a number of small bequests to cousins, amounting in all to \$7,000, the residue of the estate is to be divided equally between Acadia University and the Foreign Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces. As the residue will probably amount to somewhere around \$40,000 it will be seen that Acadia and the Mission Board will get the lion's share or about \$40,000 each. A codicil to the will gives \$5,000 to McGill University, and reduces the legacy of the husband Harvey G. Tedford from \$30,000 to \$20, as above stated.

FIVE YEARS SINCE LAST

A Nauwigewauk farmer was before Magistrate Hiltche in the police court this morning. He was charged with being drunk and using profane language in Charlotte street last evening. "When did you come to the city?" asked the magistrate when the prisoner told him he belonged to Nauwigewauk. "Yesterday morning, Your Honor." "Did you come on the suburban?" The prisoner replied that he did not. He drove to the city yesterday morning probably because he wished to spend as much of the day as possible in the city before returning in the evening, and, knowing that he could not depend on the suburban, he used a slower but surer means of traveling. "How long since you have been here before?" the court asked. "Oh, it's a long time," answered the prisoner. It was about five years, he said, since he had been there before and the court held that five years was a long time between drinks. The prisoner was allowed to return to his home on condition that he send the court \$4 to atone for his spree with the understanding that if the money is not forthcoming, a fine of \$15 or four months in jail will stand against him.

INQUEST TO BE OF SPECIAL IMPORTANCE

Corner Roberts Has Strong Jury to Probe Hotel Fire — Inquiry May Be Broad in Scope

The inquest into the death of Jude LeBlanc and little Alfred Johnson, whose bodies were found in the Grand Union Hotel after the fire of Tuesday night, will be opened by Coroner W. P. Roberts on Monday evening next at eight o'clock. It will likely be held in the court house. One of the strongest juries ever selected for a coroner's inquest here has been empanelled by Coroner Roberts, and the members of it will do not only with the immediate cause of the death, but also with conditions in other hotels in the city. It was said today that there was a probability of an investigation being started into the conditions of the city hotels in general, as well as factories and other places where many people are found together. The members of the jury are R. T. Hayes, R. J. Walsh, James Lewis, P. S. Thomas, Edward Bates, W. H. White, and W. A. Wetmore. Yesterday afternoon they viewed the bodies of the two victims of the fire, and this morning they made a thorough inspection of the hotel premises, to familiarize themselves with the positions of the rooms, corridors, exits and other matters. The work of adjusting the loss in the fire was begun yesterday and is expected to be finished today. Edward Bates, C. E. L. Jarvis, and E. L. Philp are attending to this matter. The work of repairs on the hotel is to be started at once and business will be resumed as soon as possible. The body of Jude LeBlanc, the chef, was taken to Moncton today for interment, while the body of young Alfred Johnson was buried this afternoon from the home of Frank O'Brien, Mill street.

ATHENA IN PORT

New Officers in List—Scotch Immigrant Gives Skirl of Pipes at Point

Donaldson Linnr Athena, Captain James Black, arrived in port last night and docked this morning about 11 o'clock at No. 4 Scotch Point. It was a rough passage. During the trip two of the passengers met with accidents by falling overboard. While the sea was at its worst two of the passengers, one from the second class and the other from the steerage, ventured out on deck and when a heavy sea struck the ship they were thrown heavily to the deck. They had quite recovered, however, when they landed at West St. John this morning. This is the Athena's first trip to St. John since last year, and three new faces were seen among her officers. Dr. Elmes, who was surgeon on the LeLicia, is now in the Athena and she has also new second and third officers, Messrs. Watson and McLean. The Athena has a freight cargo of about 4,000 tons, and included in it are two valuable bull dogs and a thoroughbred Yorkshire terrier. Ten of the passengers on the Athena are for New Brunswick, eight for St. John, one for Fredericton and one for Black's Harbor. The majority of those coming to St. John are Scotch girls who have been engaged as servants. One of the passengers, when the boat was docking, produced a set of pipes and, marching up and down the decks, gave an impromptu concert.

BETTER NEWS FROM THE WEST

A visitor to the city today is Henry J. Keith, of Saskatoon, who is at the Royal. He has many friends in St. John and is being well greeted. Speaking of conditions in the west he said today that matters showed great improvement and this year would probably be a generally prosperous one throughout that country. From January 1 affairs had been brighter, there had been a stronger air of confidence, and the money situation had been considerably easier. One of the best features he thought that had resulted from the depression of last year, was the trend against speculation. While there was bound to be more or less land changing owners it would not be on a speculative basis so much in future and this he regarded as beneficial.

HAPPY HOME CURLERS

Excitement ran high in the Thistle Curling Rink last evening when two teams from the Happy Home Club met in the first game of a series. The teams playing last night were called Boston and New York. The game resulted in a victory for the New Yorks, 18 to 5. The game was full of thrills.
