



"For four years Walter Wellman has been devoting his time to preparations for an undertaking to reach the North Pole in an airship. He was at Spitzbergen in 1906 with a balloon, but postponed his departure on account of the lateness of the season. In 1907 a start was made in the airship America, but the vessel encountered a storm and was driven back. He left New York on May 12 of this year for Spitzbergen to complete his preparations for the start made three days ago. Recently he estimated that under favorable conditions the Pole could be reached.


