West Land Regulations Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli-cant must appear in person at the Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intend-ing homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of One Delegate—Absolute Colonial Autonomy Basic Principle of All.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing way pre-empt a quar-ter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. If thes.-Must re-side six months in each of six years from date of homesteat entry (includ-ing the time required to earn home-thed restort) end cultures fitting acres stead pstent) and cullivate fifty acres extra.
