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### General Intelligence.

#### The Open Polar Sea.

CHIEF JUSTICE DAILY BELIEVES IT DOES NOT EXIST.

To the Editor of the New York Herald.

I regret that my absence from the city has prevented my giving an earlier expression to my great gratification at the rescue of Lieut. Greely and his companions, and of my sympathy in the fate of the brave men who have sacrificed their lives in the cause of human knowledge, and in some of whom I was personally acquainted. The rescue of the survivors should be regarded as mainly due to the energy and capacity displayed by Commander Schley in getting off the relief expedition as early as he did. When I met him on his return, he was in the condition in which the vessel then was, that he would be disappointed in his expectation to sail on the day he had fixed upon, but he was so deeply impressed with the peril of every day's delay and was so energetic that he called on the day appointed, leading one of the best equipped expeditions that has ever been sent to the Arctic. How important this promptitude was is shown by the fact that the forty-eight hours delay in reaching the rescue party would have been fatal to all now living. It is a painful reflection, because if the first relief expedition had been planned and carried out with the ability with which this one has been carried out, the Secretary of the Navy the calamity which has occurred in the loss of seventeen lives might have been, in my opinion, averted.

The President is reported as having said that he never favored these expeditions, as the geographical and scientific information secured could not compensate for the loss of human life. He has in this perhaps not given full vent to his opinion, for the most satisfactory manner. 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## Farm and Household.

The Best Time to Cut Hay.

The best writers for the Agricultural

press have for many years

urged farmers to cut their hay

earlier than has been the prevailing

practice, and so far as we can

judge, the farmers generally are

ready to admit that the hay crop

is not cut quite as early as it should

be. The quality of the hay is

therefore not the best quality of

fodder for the stock. The difficulty

seems to be that farmers do not

get ready to cut their hay

early enough. There is a little more

planning to do, a little more

hiring help, or the extra

hire help do not arrive.

Some do not like to begin till

the work is finished, so that there

is no interruption when the

mowers are started. It is possible

that the farm can be moved over

and the hay secured at less cost

where other work is not allowed

to interfere after having begun, but

the quality of the crop is likely to

be inferior to what it would be if

each lot were cut at the time it was

in its best condition.

The introduction of hay-making

has enabled the farmer to cut

his hay in much less time than it

formerly took, and consequently the

hay crop is secured in much better

condition than formerly, but we
