## ELECTRIC FEAT AT INSTITUTE OPENING

King Edward Pressed Button in England Which Did The Deed.

MONTREAL, Oct. 21--When King Edward in the library at West Deag Park, Chiswick, today pressed the button, which, after the Royal Standard, 1877, was sent to the Dalhousie Lumber Co.
