Intense Feeling Created by the St. George's Bay Outrages.

A British Gunboat Present, but Fails

Halifax, June 4.—Newfoundland papers received by the steamer Mirandi to-night are filled with articles on the St. George's Bay outrages. In giving latest particulars of the affair one of them says: "Dark as were the colors which we employed in painting the picture of French outrages in St. George's they were not half black enough to portray the actual scene. When a British gunboat calmly looked on whilst a French man-of-war forbade British subjects to fish in their water we thought there could be no words capable of adding to the reputation of the British navy, but we were mistaken, for this outrage upon imperial and colonial rights was aggravated in the highest degree by the circumstances of

was aggravated in the highest degree by the circumstances of

INSOLENCE AND VIOLENCE
which attended its perpetration. The Pelican did not merely submit to an usurpation by the French of a title to sovereign dominion in our waters, but to a usurpation that should not occur in the employment of the arts of diplomacy or strategy, but by the terrors inspired by the threatening presence of an armed force. It is a fact that an armed body of French marines went in their boat to the place in the harbor of Sandy Point, where the nets of the Newfoundland fishermen were set, and there and then, under the very guns of the Pelican, ordered them to be taken out of the water. This was a 'forcible invasion' by a foreign power of the maritime jurisdiction of Great Britain and Newfoundland; yet it was, as we know, acquiesced in by the commander of the British man-of-war. But there was another outrage of EVEN A MORE FLAGRANT CHARACTER to follow. Having usurped our maritime jurisdiction, the French next proceeded to assert, on behalf of their nation, territorial jurisdiction in Newfoundland, and again they enforce their uprighteous claim by force of arms. A French officer fully armed came on shore at Sandy Point and read to the assembled British citizens a notice commanding them to take up their nets. Even this more impudent outrage failed to stir

the assembled British citizens a notice commanding them to take up their nets. Even this more impudent outrage failed to stir the blood of the British naval officers to resistance. Each one of these acts of violence constitutes, as we believe, such a contempt for an invasion of British dominion over the soil or waters of New. lence constitutes, as we believe, such a contempt for an invasion of British dominion over the soil or waters of Newfoundland as to warrant war. Britain has the absolute sovereignty of the island of Newfoundland and the waters surrounding it, and the French have only the right to exercise fishing privileges in our waters and to use the coast line during a portion of the year for certain rigidly defined purposes in connection with the fishery France herself has never until this moment set up the smallest claim to any sovereignty within this colony. It is true that claims have been made of an exclusive right of fishing in the waters washing a portion of our coast, but even if we conceded to them, which we do not, that exclusive right of fishery, they would still be as far as ever from establishing 'any sovereign title' to our soil or waters. INVASION BY AN ARMED FORCE belonging to a foreign power, and up to the present no steps have been taken by Britain to avenge the outrage. There can be no doubt that this was a deliberately planned doubt that this was a deliberately planned attempt on the part of France to force an admission from Britain of a right of sovereignty in the French Republic to a certain portion of the waters and territory of Newfoundland. No other motive than this could influence them to take the measures they adopted. Shocking Murder in the Vicin-

ity of Mitchell. Terrible Outcome of a Dispute About

a Fence. George Houghton Beaten to Death by Ward Rumford.

MITCHELL, June 4.—A young man named Geo. Houghton was killed yesterday after-Geo. Houghton was killed yesterday atternoon on lot 2, con 14, Logan, about two miles north from here, while engaged at work logging with Ward Rumford. Houghton's wife, who was on the ground where they were working, was having a dispute with Rumford about the work when the husband interfered, and Rumford struck fracturing the skull badly. Rumford, realizing what he had done, came to town for a doctor. The doctor started at once for the spot, and on arriving found Hough ton dead, he having lived only a short time after the blow. Rumford has been living under the same root with the Houghton family, and is in some way related to it. Rumford has given himself up. The inquest is now going on before Coroner Shaver, of Stratford.

Another Account.

Stratford, June 4.—It was reported on the street to-day that a murder had been committed at Bornholm, about seventeen miles from Stratford in the township of miles from Stratford in the township of Logan. Bornholm is a small country place, with a hotel, store, postoffice and blacksmith shop. The scene of the murder is in the 14th concession of Logan. The facts of the case, as nearly as can be gleaned, are as follows: William Rumford and Robt. E. Houghton are neighbors. They both own small farms in Logan. Or Thursday they were logging in a field, when they had some words over a line fence. Mrs. Houghton was also present. The men's temper got the better of them. Rumford

PICKED UP A CROWBAR, and without further ceremony sent it crashing down on the skull of Houghton, smashing the frontal and parietal bones and killing him almost instantly. When he became conscious of what he had done he sobbed bitterly and seemed to be very repentant. The body was taken to the house of the deceased and a medical man sent for, who, after viewing it, stated that the man had been dead for several hours. County Crown Attorney Idington was notified, and the coroner, P. R. Shaver, was instructed to go out and hold an inquest.

TWO MICHIGAN FARMERS KILLED.

CARO, Mich., June 4.—Last evening news reached this place that four farmers had been struck by lightning at the residence of I. T. Taggett, four miles west of Caro, in Fairgrove township. About twenty rods from the barn I. T. Taggett, Edward Good-child, Wm. Holmes and Matt Ringle, were a short time previous engaged in performing an operation upon a young horse when a thunder storm came up suddenly and the first bolt of lighting struck in the midst of the men. Assistance was soon secured, and within a short time Ringle and Taggett regained consciousness, but Goodchild and Holmes were dead when assistance arrived, although no marks or traces of the current could be found upon their persons. Goodchild was a farmer 37 years of age, and had a family of five children. Holmes was 31 years of age and unmarried. It was one of the greatest electric storms that ever passed over this section.

A ratification meeting is to be held to night, and measures will be taken to call out every man now at work. About 800 men are working under the scale, which, added to the 1,900 already out, will make a total of about 2,700 men on strike. The process of training was arduous, and as yet the vocabulary of the pupills is limited, but they have acquired the power of vocalization and something of a knowledge of words and their sounds. After this a complete acquisition of speech ought to be merely a matter of steady growth in intelligence and of practice in the exercise of new-found faculties.




