CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—Ex-Senator George F. Edmunds, who is now in this city, believes that the Reading coal combine is amendable to the Sherman anti-trust law, and its product is liable to seizure by the Government, while the principals are liable to arrest and imprisonment. Ex-Senator Edmunds, as chairman of the judiciary committee of the Senate, reported to that body in July, 1890, what is now known as the Sherman anti-trust law. In an interview with an Inter-Ocean reporter he said: "The Government can legally seize every pound of coal shipped by the Philadelphia and Reading Coal Company across the State line of Pennsylvania if that company is violating what is known as the Sherman

Wiggins Wags His Unweary. ing Jaw.

The Moon, He Says, is the Moot Likely of the Heavenly Bodies to Take a Tumble—Prof. Snider is a "Disgrace to Science and Himse;t"—A Lady's Fears.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—Prof. Wiggins was seen to-day respecting the alleged collision of the earth with a comet last night, as stated by Prof. Suider, of Philadelphia. Prof. Wiggins denies that any collision took place; first, because there was no comet near us, and secondly, because a comet could not collide with the earth. PROF. POOR'S VIEWS.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 25.— Prof. Charle
Lane Poor, of the Johns Hopkins University, who has been watching the comet for
week, says that nothing definite could be
determined in wear's. determined in regard to its identity for several months. "It is useless," he said "to discuss the probability of its identity with Biela's comet or to attempt to sketch its course through the heavens until man more observations have been made. Usuall with three observations at intervals of tw or three days it is possible to obtain, very

with three observations at intervals of two three deys it is possible to obtain, very roughly, the orbit of such a body.

"An accurate determination of the orbit of a comet requires a continuous series of observations extending over a period of several months, and the work of computing the path may well last several months more, so that the orbit of no comet is known with any accuracy until long after the body has made its appearance.

"The comet now in question has been visible only seventeen days. Had the observations during this period been of the best we could then only very roughly determine the probable path of the stranger. Unfortunately, however, it is impossible to make satisfactory observations. During the first few days there was quite a sharp and definite nucleus in the comet, and this could readily be taken as its center in measuring its position among the fixed stars. Since those first days the strange body has increased remarkably in size, but this increase has been accompanied by a decrease in brightness and a loss of all definite outlines and nucleus. At present the comet appears as a large, very faint, and diffused haze, showing no marked point from which to make measurements. This light haze appears to fill the field of view of the telescope, and to measure the position of such a body is impossible."

Two equally good astronomers, side by side, at the same time, with different telescopes would probably differ greatly as to their estimates of its position. As a consequence of this indefiniteness of the comet's real position, all attempts to compute an orbit from the few observations now at hand

real position, all attempts to compute an orbit from the few observations now at hand have proved of slight avail. The comet has been watched with care during the last week at the Johns Hopkins observatory, but with no satisfactory results. It now appears as a faint haze or fog in the telescope."



THE HEALTHY EXCITEMENT OF POLITICS.

INew York Sun]

The subject of discussion at the meeting of the Nineteenth Century Club in this city on Tuesday evening was the educational influence of Presidential campaigns.

One of the principal speakers was Mr. James Schouler, who "thought that the excitement of a Presidential election every four years was an evil."

This is the kind of talk we hear every four years for some months before the election of a President and some months afterward. A great many good people at such times become much perturbed in spirit by the fear that the community will suffer injury by devoting too much heavy thought to the government of the country, and to the various questions of rational politics and policy which must be wisely answered in order to maintain the perpetuity of our free institutions.

We have no sympathy or toleration for this view. It seems to be based on the idea that the best possible condition for a man is the condition of an oyster. We suppose an oyster is ordinarily quiescent and practically undisturbed most of the time, at least by any considerations except such as relate to his sustenance. If all that it is worth while for a man to do is to make money, and the ideal of happiness and progress is to acquire and store up material possessions, then any portions of one's time which is devoted to other subjects may be regarded as wasted; but if anything that makes life worth living, outside of procuring an abundance of food, clothing and shelter, then there is no reason to deprecate the degree of attention which the people of this country give once infour years to the conduct of our great and excellent Government.

There are many countries which are not thus disquieted. Persia, for example, is a land where the people are not very often disturbed by their cloice of a ruler. Those good solbs who cannot abide the frequent turmoil of our Presidental elections should emigrate to some par's of the world where the inhabitants sluggishly exist under


