Adjustment of Teacher's Salaries What to Do With a Boy Who Has Heen Bad.

The question of the adjustment of the salaries of teachers in the Collegiat institute came up again at the meeting of No.1 education committee last night According to the regulations of a year ago, the salaries of the teachers are graded according to their profession al standing, and the nature of the work conducted by them. In each grade a maximum and minimum of salary is laid down, and the teacher re eives a raise of \$25 per year until th naximum is reached. By a special arrangement, Mr. Edwards, one of the teachers in grade 3, has been conducting a number of classes in grade 2 and Principal Merchant, who has con trol of the pay sheet, asked the com mittee for instructions in the matter. 

Skouloudis, in an interview, is quoted as saying that the powers have not vet taken steps to communicate with the Greek Ministry on the subject of intervention, although he understood the powers were discussing some form of intervention. But whether it would direct intervention or simply a mediation, M. Skouloudis could not say. The Foreign Minister also remarked that he knew nothing concerning the report that Volo was to be declared a neutral port, but, he added, if the Turks commit excesses in that town. Greece will take the measures demanded by the situation. In conclusion, M. Skouloudis remarked: "The report that dissensions exist among the Ministers is absolutely false. We are ready to accomplish the heavy task which we have undertaken, and we cannot quit our posts without failing in our duty."

In the attack on the city of Riobamaba, a few days ago, the rebels met with heavy reverses. A Jesuit superior was killed, and two of the principal leaders, Chiroboga and Costales, were taken prisoners. Eighty-three others were captured, among them 32 priests.






