DIVISION TONIGHT **OVER COMPULSION** ENDS LONG TALK

Thirteen Days' Continuous Debate On Conscription Will Culminate In Vote This Evening-Government Majority May Be Sixty-How the Provinces Will Ballot.

O awa, July 5.—After thirteen days of commons debat the vote of the second reading of the conscription bill the amendments thereto will be taken late tonight or rly tomorrow morning. The debate has been sustained m the outset, and the parties have put up man for man in th. discussion. There have been placed on the Hansard upwards of six hundred thousand words, more or less moderate in tone. The debate has encroached upon party lines more than any other probably since confederation. Some sixteen Liberals have broken with their leader, while on the Conservative side a round dozen have defected. In addition, some widely divergent opinions as to details and application have been expressed, even among those who have agreed on the general principle of the bill.



NEW SYSTEM FOR TAX DISCOUNTS IS PROVING FAILURE

Collections Are \$400,000 Behind Those of Last Year.

WORK ALSO INCREASED

Citizens Able To Get Reduction On Each Installment by New Arrangement.

The new system of discounts, adopted by the city council, in the matter of tax collection, is working out very poorly, according to returns at the city hall this morning. Out of a total of \$1,505,525.97 on the rolls, just \$682,568.82 has been collected by Assistant Collector Charles Turner. This is a little better than 40 per cent of the total amount to be collected.

Last year, the collectors received \$1,057,720 on the first installment, or about 80 per cent of the total amount to be collected.

In 1916, and in previous years, the city allowed a discount of approximately 6 per cent for prompt payment of taxes. As a result, the council always had about 75 or 80 per cent of the taxes in hand in the middle of the year, with which to finance itself.

This year, the council decided to add one mill to the tax rate, to be deducted from the bills, if the taxes were paid promptly on the three installments. Citizens found that it would be much to their advantage to pay in three installments, rather than take the discount as in other years, and pay the whole thing up at once.




