PORTO RICO REPORTED TO BE VISITED BY A HEAVY EARTH SHOCK

Great Destruction Is Said To Have Resulted From Upheaval.

Havana, Oct. 12.—Widespread damage has been caused by an earthquake in Forto Rico, according to an unconfirmed report received here from Santiago de Cuba. Many buildings are said to have been destroyed. The report fixes no definite locality, and no loss of life is mentioned. Cable communication between Cuba and Porto Rico is badly hampered.


CHINESE MILITARY ON HSU SHIH CHANG

AND ARE MAKING EAST OF THE RIVER Enemy Forces Making Desperate Efforts To Blow Up Allied Advance Southeast of Le Cateau--Canadians

are Fighting Their Way Into the

Town of Forest Against Stubborn

Foe Resistance. With the British Army in France, Oct. 11.—The enemy today began an attempt to slow up the Anglo-American advance on the main battlefront. All the bridges across the River Selle from Le Cateau southward were blown up, and the Germans seem to have been digging in furiously along the line of the high ground some 2,000 to 4,000 yards east of the river, which already has been crossed by the British and Americans at several places. Apparently the Germans intend to make a stand here. In this locality all of today's operations were devoted to gaining the river crossings and establishing a firm footing on the east bank. There has been sharp machine gun fighting, and the Germans, from the high ground of Le Cateau, have poured a heavy fire upon the west bank

As soon as the Americans and the cavalry entered St. Souplet, south of Le Cateau, they came under a heavy fire from the German gun concentration. It is reported that the enemy gunners fired their weapons here over open sights. Luckily their aim was not as good as it might have been.

FOE TERRITORY PENETRATED.

South of here the British and the French have driven deeply into the enemy territory, and the French now control a long strip of the west bank of the Oise Canal. British advanced mounted patrols also have reached the canal bank at Longchamps, but they had made too rapid progress, and consequently returned. The British by their drive launched this morning on the fringe of the battle area are now operating well on the other side of the Scarpe River, and have reached positions less than three and a half miles from the important centre of

The troops are driving northeasterly toward this city, and at the same time are widening the already wide salient which has been made in the former German positions. There are strong indications that the Germans realize they must get out of the entire Doual salient.

It is not improbable that one of the enemy's principal ideas in trying to slow up the advance in the area southeast of Le Cateau is for the purpose of protecting his forces in the Douai salient, for every foot gained in this battle area in creases the menace to the Germans in the Douai pocket. The British encountered hard opposition to the Scarpe operations, but despite this they have made rapid progress. They have further relieved the pressure east of Arras, and are now well to the east of Vitry-en-Artois and Noyelles-sous-Bellone. SOLD LIVES DEARLY.

The German machine guns have been fighting hard in the environs of Le Cateau, and the better part of the day was required to clear them out. Little posts of the enemy, well supplied with ammunition, apparently had been left behind by their commanders, with instructions to sell themselves as dearly as They obeyed orders, and frequently held out manfully. By the end of the day, however, it appeared that most of them had been driven out or killed, and the British were reported to be moving eastward on the road between La ateau and Bazuel, some three miles to the southeast, from which they seemed o be about three thousand yards distant.

Northwest of Le Cateau the Canadians were in the outskirts of the town of orest, fighting their way forward against other stubborn enemy machine gunners. It was during last night that the first reports that the Germans were digging were received, and these were confirmed today. By midday the enemy seemed to have a continuous line all the way from a point southast of Le Cateau south-ward in front of Mennevret and east of Grougis, while in Aisonville and the area

near it fires were burning briskly. The enemy is by no means sure of holding on to his quickly-arranged line for any time, as it offers little protection, being simply a scratch on the surface, probably protected by a few strands of wire. Moreover, the roads to the east are still cluttered up with enemy troops and transport. The airplanes report that the retreat is in progress far back of the present location of the enemy.

AVIATORS KILL MANY. The British aviators have become fatigued with the labor of killing Germans. New York, Oct. 12.—Just as the president passed 51st street a their machine guns, and dropped hundreds of tons of bombs upon targets it was impossible to miss. The road between Le Cateau and Bazuel offered some exceptional targets for the bombers. Again and again the 'planes swooped low in an automobile, which sped away with him down 5th avenue.

A few minutes later a loaded revolver was found on the street.

BRITISH CAPTURE VILLAGES IN ADVANCE NORTH OF SENSEE

London, Oct. 12.—British forces last night continued their advance north of the Sensee River, Field Marshal Haig announced having any harmful intentions, saying he merely wanted to shake today. The advance is in the direction of Douai. The villages of Hamel, Brebieres, less than three miles from Douai, and Cuincy, less than two miles from Douai, have been captured. Further north, the British have pushed to the east of Henin-Lietard, northwest of Douai, and they are in the environs of Ennay.

GOURAUD'S FORCES CROSS THE SUIPPE IN PURSUIT OF ENEMY

With the French Army in France, Friday, October 11.-Gen. Gouraud's troops have crossed the Suippe River almost everywhere along the 20-mile front between Bertricourt and Betheniville. The Germans still hold the bridgehead at Boult-sur-Suippe.

The enemy is retiring to his next zone of resistance on the Retourne, but there are unmistakable evidences that he is preparing for a still further retreat



GERMANS BLOW UP ALL

BRIDGES ACROSS THE

FIGHTERS OF 222NATIONS FILE PAST THE "ALTAR OF LIBERTY"

New York, Oct. 12.-New York's patriotic fervor, already thrilled with the knowledge of brilliant successes for the Allies' arms against Germany, was quickened today when the fighting men of more than 22 nations-from five continents and islands in every sea-marched down flag-bedecked Fifth avenue in review before President Wilson, in joint celebration of Liberty Day and Columbus Day. It was a grim, businesslike procession—even with the picturesque and colorful uniforms of fighters from other lands that swung down the Avenue of the Allies and under the banners of the nations arrayed against Germany and her allies. Scores of airplanes, flying in battle formation, preceded the marchers from Seventy-Second street, past the "Altar of Liberty" in Madison Square and to Washington Square.

Guns, tanks and other trophies captured from the Germans at Chateau-Thierry and other battlefields were towed by military tractors. The United States division was composed of 10,000 soldiers, who have completed their military training, and soon will sail overseas for France, and Liverpool, 700 sailors. The total number of all troops in line was estimated at 25,000.

LETTER WRITER SAID BISHOP FALLON WAS HOARDING UP COAL

Fuel Controller Finds He Has Only 23 Tons.

Fuel Controller J. W. McCallum had a long letter this morning, calling his attention to an alleged coal "hog" in the city. The letter first referred to the possible investigation of cellars in the city, and then followed with the exposure. The letter referred to was none other than the Right Rev. M. F. Fallon. The letter stated that not only was the cellar at the bishop's home on Central avenue full, but that outhouses were also packed. It stated that Finney & Shannon had "numerous" teams drawing coal to the residence of the bishop for over a week. It added that 100 tons could be easily removed from the hishop's premises, and he would not miss it.

Mr. McCallum has been running down many such reports. He does not delay when a complaint is made to him, and the latest was no exception. His inquiry showed that last year Bishop Fallon had used 35 tons of egg and one ton of stove coal. So far this year he has had delivered nineteen tons of egg and four tons of chestnut coal. In other words he had 23 tons of coal, and his requirements are 36 tons.

"It's just like a case I had up north," said Mr. McCallum. "I was told that a person had a cellar full, and the side of the barn bursting out with coal. I investigated and found six tons of coal in the barn and not a pound in the cellar."


FOR BIG CAMPAIGN Has Been at the Front Since May, 1917.

Pte. Robson enlisted in London with a Middlesex battalion and went overseas as sergeant in the paymaster's office. After he had been in England a short time, he wrote his mother that there were lots of young men returning from the front wounded who could handle his job easily, and he feit that he ought to make an effort to reach the front with the fighting units. He did so, and underwent an operation in England to fit himself that he might pass the medical test to cross to France. This he succeeded in doing in May, 1917, and had been up in front ever since with a Toronto Highland unit. This is the first time his name has appeared in the casualty list.

Pte. Robson was well known and popular in London. Prior to enlisting he was a member of the staff of the local branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia. Andrew Robson, the father, was last night re-elected president of the Liberal Club.







Women have traveled far along the road to equal citizenship with men, especially during the present war, and it now remains to be proven, whether they are willing to take full advantage of the opportunities afforded them.

MANY WERE TRAINED BY MAJOR JOHNSON, **KILLED IN ACTION**

One of the Best-Known, Popular and Efficient of Officers.

The announcement that Major Andrew Johnson has been killed in action in France. recalls the fact that he was prominent and exceedingly popular in local military circles for a number of years before the outbreak of war, having also many warm friends among the

civilian population.

Trained Many Officers. Trained Many Officers.

Formerly quartermaster-sergeant instructor of the R. C. R. here, the majority of the senior officers from No. 1 Military District who are serving overseas at the present time received their instruction from him. During the first year of the war his time was largely occupied with giving instruction to officers' training classes. In March, 1915, he received his commission and was attached to the 33rd Battalion, C. E. F., with the rank of lleutenant, and appointed as assistant adjutant. His ability and efficiency were invaluable in getting the unit into good shape, and he was popular alike with officers and men, as he had been with the regulars in the days hefore the ware

had been with the regulars in the days before the war.
Went Over With Perths.

before the war.

Subsequently he was transferred to the 70th Battalion as adjutant with the rank of captain. When the 110th (Perth) Battalion was raised he was made junior major of the unit, going overseas in this capacity. Another promotion came in England, when he was appointed senior major of the 156th Battalion, commanded by Lieut.-Col. C. M. R. Graham. When the 5th division was broken up he reverted to the rank of captain in order to get to France, and was posted to the 38th Battalion in command of A Company last March.

Served in South Africa.

Born in Hamilton, Ont., "Andy" Johnson, as he was known to his many friends and associates, entered the R. C. R. at Halifax in 1901.

After the close of the South African war he was transferred to Toronto, where he was stationed until 1910, marrying to 1906, Alice Simpkin, of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, In 1907 he was transferred to Wolseley Barracks, coming here as a drill sergeant, and was a quartermaster-sergeant instructor at the time of the outbreak of war.

Major Johnson was prominent in Masonic circles, and belonged also to the Foresters. He was a member of the Church of England.

Since the 110th went overseas, Mrs. Johnson, with her daughter Margaret, their only child, has been living in the home of her father in Toronto. Previous to leaving London Major and Mrs. Johnson made their home at 676 William street. Major Johnson was widely known throughout No. 1 Military District.


