



# PARLIAMENT TO BE ASKED TO PASS BILL AT PRESENT SESSION

New Classification Under Civil Service Act May Soon Become Effective.



CARRY 22,000 PERSONS WEEKLY BETWEEN

DETROIT AND WINDSOR WINDSOR, June 20.—Twenty-two thousand is the average number of pas-sengers carried daily by the Detroit and Windsor Ferry Company between Windsor and Detroit each day, according to figures given out by the Windsor civic figures given out by the Windsor civic transportation committee tonight.

The figures were obtained by placing "clockers" at the ferry dock on this side, who counted the traffic for a period of a week from April 25 to May 1.

In the period named, 154,000 passengers, 4,000 automobiles and 412 trucks crossed the river. Based on these figures, the ferry company is earning an average of \$650 per day. Between June 14 and 16 there was a big increase in traffic, \$5,000 passengers crossing in the three days. he three days.





Hello-Girls' Friend. W. P. Blackmore of Princeton, in an address on the subject of "Operators of the Small Exchange," said that the operator was the vital element in any operator was the vital element in any small exchange. She received the blame for all trouble, whether it was her fault or the fault of the manager, or whether it occurred as a result of line trouble, over which neither of them had any control. She was generally a miserably-paid employee, receiving only from \$240 to \$350 a year. The rule of all telephone nanies was that courtesy must be shown to subscribers at all times, but he thought that sometimes the operator could hardly be blamed, since she was human, if she returned the shot when

she was fired at unjustifiably.

Telephone Problems. A. Turrill of Aylmer spoke on the bject of present-day telephone probsubject of present-day telephone prob-lems, enumerating scarcity of labor, un-stability of finances and the fact that telephones had to be moved from one house to another without charge, as some of the conditions which made for difficulties to be faced.

In the course of a general discussion several interesting questions were asked and answered. Someone wanted to know whether a telephone company had any redress against house-movers or opera-ors of other high machinery, such as diredges, who broke down wires. Some different opinions were expressed, but the majority view seemed to be that the company could claim recompense if its lines were at a reasonable height above the roadway. Another question was as to the result on the flow of rental collections of the addition of 25 per cent to the bill, with a discount of 20 per cent for payment within 30 days. The plan was generally

commended as a good one, and one which resulted in very much more prompt settlement of bills.


