Reasons For Interest.

In conclusion, the speaker made an appeal for enthusiastic interest on the strength of the attractions which the service offers. "In some ways." she said. "it is more attractive than the life of the soldier in the field. Wherever the sailor goes, he takes his house with him, an advantage in itself. The service appeals because of its great traditions. One hundred years ago, it was an adventure of hardship to come across the sea to Canada. The blood of the people who made this adventure flows in the veins of you who are living inland in Canada. Doesn't it bring home the romance of the sea even to the third and fourth generation? The greatest achievements of science have gone into the making any equipping of the ships of the navy. Going into this branch of the service is a great education. Canada's share is going to be a big question after the war. It will mean something to have contributed 3,000, 4,000 or 5,000 men to the fleet.

"I ask you to be missionaries of this cause. The navy belongs to Canada because Canada belongs to the Empire. There is a beautiful prayer, some 300 or 400 years old, in the Church of England prayer book, referring to the navy which "safeguards the sovereign and his kingdom and brings security to those who cross the seas on all occasions." This, I think, is the best expression of what our navy has meant and means."
