London, March 3 .- Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary for war, in discussing the army estimates in the House of Commons yesterday, said of affairs in the Middle East that although the situation was an anxious one it was not proving in practice so formidable as in prospect. "I was in the room when the attorney-general was speaking to Mr. Tite, but I did not hear him say anything as drastic as that," said Mayor Little today. "Mr. Tite told him that there were eight thousand trade unionthere were eight thousand trade unionists in London who were opposed to all clauses of the London bill and that he could bring them down to Toronto as a deputation. Mr. Raney, of course, told him there was no need for this, but that if he could bring proof that such a number of people were opposed to the clauses of the bill the Government would certainly refuse to pass it.

"I quite agree with Mr. Tite. If there are eight thousand people in London who are opposed to any of the expenditures which we are asking the Government to authorize, I certainly think the Government should refuse to approve them. There was no indication that eight thousand voters were solidly against any of the projects."

In it he says: "Every step of this command will be towards one supreme aim—the annexation of Fiume to Italy. Whatever solution is anticlpated by this command will always be left to the representatives of the city."

First Witness Called.

A. C. Pyke, secretary of the Ontario Wholesale Grocers' Association and Canadian Wholesale Grocers' Association was the first witness called on by A. W. Roebuck, counsel for the Ontario attorney-general's department at the resumed inquiry into the wholesale grocers' case this morning. Mr. Pyke has been intimately associated in wholesale groceries for the past twenty-seven years, having been a wholesale grocar and a wholesale broker during that time. He carried on business extensively at Halifax. The Ontario Wholesale Grocers' Association, according to Mr. Grocers' Association. according to Mr. Pyke, was composed of 82 members, while the Canadian association had a while the Canadian association had a membership of 239. The application for membership in the Wholesale Grocers' Association was presented to Mr. Roebuck and examined by him. The different provisions for membership were pointed out by Mr. Roebuck and Mr. Pyke proffered an explanation of some of the difficult interpretations. The Wholesale Grocers' Association, according to the application for membership ing to the application for membership, was not a co-operative association. An interpretation of a "co-operative association" was an organization formed

or buying goods and supplying consumfor buying goods and supplying consumers.

Question of Eligibility.

An applicant was not eligible for membership who had an interest in the profits of a retail store, although Mr. Pyke pointed out that a wholesale grocery might still be eligible for membership if it had to take over a retail grocery store to liquidate its indebtedness. The amount of money invested did not determine eligibility, although it was pointed out by Mr. Pyke that a necessary requisite for membership in the Wholesale Grocers' Association was that it carry a full lipse of stock and also have a warehouse. Wholesalers having a retail counter were not eligible for membership in the association.

Mr. R. F. Buck then questioned Mr. Pyke relative to his association with Mr. I. A. Lytle who discussed the duestion of supplying the retail merchants through the wholesalers. Mr. Pyke stated that Mr. Lytle came to his office and stated that he was anxious to distribute his products through the wholesale trade. The reason as brought out in the hearing for Mr. Lytle's association with the Wholesale Grocers' Association was to discuss how changes of the method of distribution might be

They had been asked for with a view of increasing membership.

Mr. Roebuck reverted to the question of eligibility for membership in the Wholesale Grocers' Association. "Is a man who cuts prices eligible for membership?" asked Mr. Roebuck.

"There is nothing in the bylaws to stop them. We don't control prices. We have nothing to do with the prices," answered Mr. Pyke.

W. F. O'Connor, K.C., chairman of the investigating board, took exception to Mr. Roebuck's questioning witness on irrelevant matters. It was the chairman's contention that questions and decisions of the Canadian Food Board were not to be considered in the investigation, "This is a combine charge that we are investigating," he said.







ESTIMATES FOR YEAR SHOW BIG INCREASE

Public Debt Will Require \$35,000,000 More.

BIG DEFICIT LIKELY

Predicted Economy by Government Not in Sight.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, March 22.-Estimates for the fiscal year 1920-21 brought down in the House this afternoon are interesting in view of a decrease of \$364,000,000 in proposed expenditures of all kinds, as compared with the estimates for the current fiscal year which ends with the present month. This very considerable decrease is, nowever, almost wholly accounted for by the practical cessation of war expenditures, which this year were over three hundred millions, the appropriation for demobilization during the coming fiscal year being only \$38,000,000. On consolidated revenue account a total expenditure of \$440,000,000 is provided for, which is a decrease of only \$11,000,000 below that of the current year. It is to be noted, however, that there is an increase of over thirty-five millions on railways and canals, and of four millions on soldiers' land settlement. in the House this afternoon are in-

The total proposed expenditure on apital account (not payable out of revenue) is \$58,000,000, which is a decrease of \$41,000,000 as compared with the current year. This is accounted for by a decrease of \$23,000,000 on railways and capals out of \$15,000,000. railways and canals, and of \$18,000,000 on public works

or by a decrease of \$23,000,000 on railways and canals, and of \$18,000,000 on public works.

While the decrease in proposed expenditures may be considered gratifying, they cannot be properly appreciated without comparison with those of pre-war days. For the year 1913-14 the total expenditure on consolidated found account amounted to 124 milions, as against 440 for the coming fiscal year. For the year 1913-14 the total capital expenditures were 37 millions, as against 58 for the coming fiscal year. For 1913-14 the grand total of expenditures on all accounts to 184 millions. For the coming fiscal year (apart from demobilization), it is estimated at 498 millions.

The increase in estimated expenditures for the coming fiscal year is therefore 334 millions over the actual expenditures for the year before the war, or nearly two and a half times the total revenues during the latter year. And it is to be noted that the supplementary estimates for the coming fiscal year are still to be brought down.

The increase over the pre-war year may largely be accounted for in increased interest charges, pensions, soldiers' land settlement and civil restablishment together with the added burdens of railway operation and maintenance. Interest charges on the national debt and sinking funds amounted in 1913-14 to 14 millions. For the coming fiscal year they are estimated at 123 millions. Pensions in the pre-war year amounted to 312 thousand dollors; for the coming fiscal year they will approximate 27 millions. In addition there are 50 millions for soldiers' land settlement and 34 millions for soldiers' land settlement and 34 millions for soldiers civil re-establishment. These excesses account for 240 millions of the 334 million increase over the pre-war year. When they are taken into account, the increase is still 35 millions dollars.

Immigration when it was at its height in 1910-11, cost \$1,079,129. Today, when it is at its lowest ebb, it is to cost \$1.443,190. Other departments are costing about in proportion. In this connection it is perhaps interesting to note that for rentals in Ottawa alone the Government will pay next year the sum of \$1,070,000. In fact Government offices, which in old days were con-fined to Government buildings, are now scattered all over the city. In addition several new and pretentious office buildings have been constructed. An analysis of the expenditures proposed under consolidated fund discloses that, after allowance is made for all extra-ordinary outlays and increases in ex-traordinary outlays, the actual amount proposed for ordinary running expenses is about two millions in excess of the estimates for the current fiscal year.

On Consolidated Account.

The total expenditure on consolidated account is estimated at 440 millions. The reveaues of the Dominion for the current fiscal year so far have averaged thirty millions a month. On that bases they will total three hundred and sixty millions for the year. It is evident therefore that unless revenues are increased during the coming year by additional taxes or otherwise, there will be a deficit between ordinary expenditures and revenue of eighty million dollars. It is further to be noted that estimates on capital expenditure, in-On Consolidated Account. ostimates on capital expenditure, in-cluding demobilization, total nearly a hundred millions. This will have to be borrowed. And to that extent, if not to a greater extent the already form-idable national debt will be added to.






