JANUARY.—You cannot plough this month, but you may consider what we have to say about subsoil ploughing. The subsoil plough should be used in spring, following in the furrow of the breaking plough; loosening the soil six or eight inches deeper. The breaking plough should turn the soil up six inches deep, making the entire loose ground twelve or fourteen inches deep. A crop of corn is best to grow on the sod, and the effect of subsoiling will be seen in the crop by the time it is two feet high. The heat of the sun and the exposure of the soil to the air, together with the presence of the cornroots, prepare the subsoil for turning up to the surface. The next spring, plough the field so as to place one-half of the subsoil on the surface. At the next ploughing all this loosened subsoil can be turned to the surface.

FEBRUARY.-As soft or bituminous coal is becoming more extensively used, especially in our large towns or cities; we think it worth while to say that especially in our large towns or cities; we think it worth while to say that the soot of this coal is exceedingly valuable as a fertilizer. None of it should be lost. It accumulates rapidly in chimneys, and must be often removed. Among other things it contains carbonate of lime and magnesia; sulphate and acetate of lime; phosphate of lime; acetate of ammonia, and charcoal powder. It is enough to mention these in proof of the fertilizing qualities of soot. In Europe it has been used for many years as a top-dressing to all crops, and has a specially beneficial effect in grass, wheat and oats. The turnip fly, and the caterpillar, which eats the cabbages, have a great dislike to it. It is best applied before rain sets in, but in dry weather should be used with caution as to quantity, not more than four bushels an acre. MARCH.—Respecting frequent ploughing for wheat, a practical farmer says : If any one will break his ground deeply and thoroughly two or three times during the spring and summer, the extra amount of wheat per acre will pay for ploughing, and leave a handsome profit besides. I have tested this practice several times with most satisfactory results. A field of sixteen acres I broke in spring, and ploughed the half again on the twentieth of June. On the first of September, following, I ploughed again the entire field, and sowed in wheat. The half that had only received a single ploughing yielded 13 bushels and 18 pounds ; the half that had received three breakings yielded per acre 23 bushels and 40 pounds. At one dollar a bushel this would pay for the extra ploughing, and leave a net extra profit of six dollars per acre besides.

APRIL.—That it is possible to cut timothy too close seems quite clear, especially in a dry, hot climate. This is particularly the case when the cutting is done with a mower, which is now very general. The bulb having been shaded in its growth by the tall grass is suddenly laid bare to the rays of the hot sun in July and August, which dries every particle of moisture in it, consequently, when rain comes the bulb has lost its germinating power. It was noticed that, when a small portion of a meadow was cut down with a cradle for seed, that the growth of grass during the fall was far greater, and also that the timothy is a great deal heavier on that part than alongside where it was mown close with the machine. This being the case, the value of machinery is, by so much depreciated, and the cradle is to be preferred.

JUNE.—It is not the most pleasant of subjects, but we cannot forbear say-ing a few words on the value of night soils. We have the authority of Leibig for stating that in the fortress of Rastadt and in the soldier's bar-racks of Baden, the privies are so constructed that the seats open, through wide funnells, into casks fixed upon carts. By this means the whole of the excrement, both fluid and solid, is collected without any loss. When the casks are full, they are replaced by empty ones. The farmers around these garrison towns know the value of this matter for fertilizing effects, for they are willing to pay a certain sum for every full cask, which not only pays the original outlay, but also the annual cost of repairs, &c., and leaves a handsome profit besides. There is also a cleanly side to this subject, upon which we need not expatiate.

JULY.—Buckwheat ploughed in and under the surface of soil has by long experience been proved a certain means of fertility. It is in many places better than clover, for it will grow where clover will not, that is on poor sandy soils. It has been recommended to plough and harrow the land fine and mellow, then saturate the buckwheat with stale chamber lye, or greasy pickle from the mackerel barrel, then dry with hickory ashes, a peck or half a bushel to every bushel of buckwheat. After the buckwheat is a few inches high, sow a bushel of gypsum to the acre toward evening. This will cause greater growth. In case the soil is very dry at seeding time, it is best not to sow the prepared seed in the morning, but toward evening ; let it lie all night, then harrow it and roll it early in the morning while the soil is wet with dew.

It is undoubtedly influenza, and is caused by exposure to damp and cold during an enfeebled state of the system. With care, fatality may be prevented. Warm gruel or bran, middlings or oatmeal, are of service, but a warm stable is necessary. Worms seem to be one of the last results of the disease, and are found in the air passages and in the lungs. A similar disease was found among lambs, but was cured by a little warm gruel, with a few drops of peppermint water fed to them with a spoon. The disease was prevalent among young stock in England, but readily yielded to the generous treatment we have suggested. Prevention is better than cure. Let the young stock have kind and careful treatment.

SEPTEMBER.—We are glad to know that our farmers are alive to the value of a good orchard. In respect to the proper time for planting there are differences of opinion. If the soil is light and moderately dry, and the locality not too far north, trees may be safely planted in the fall, provided they are of the most hardy kind, such as apples, pears and plums. Taking all things into consideration we prefer early spring to Autumn. But the trees should always be dug up in the autumn and transported to the place where they are to be planted, and then carefully heeled in. It may be well enough to cover the entire stems with earth, if received very late in the season. In heeling in the roots, the roots should be covered quite deep, so that at least a foot or more of the stems will be covered. If there is any danger from frost, shade the trees with evergreens.

OCTOBER.—A practical farmer, on the subject of sowing grass-seeds, says he has always raised better crops, that is, got a better stand by sowing his grass-seed early in March, upon land in winter wheat or rye, rolling it and plastering it well. He has tried sowing timothy in the fall in land that had borne a crop of winter grains, harvested early, ploughed and harrowed, and the timothy brushed in. In this way an excellent crop of timothy grass has been obtained, paying for any loss that might be sustained from not sowing again with grain, either in the fall or spring. Much, however, depends on the character of the season. If the land is to be kept for meadow, he would never sow timothy with clover. If anything is sown with clover he would prefer orchard grass, because it is fit about the same time.

NOVEMBER.—Of breeding stock for the dairy, Mr. Nimmo, who flourishes near Napanee, says, he had thorough-bred Ayrshires, and short-horns, but he believed the best breed for the dairy was obtained by crossing common Canadian cows with thorough-bred Durhams. He deprecates pure-bred for the Dairy, and recommends crosses of thorough-breds of good milking families, or the best milkers of common Canadian cows. Mr. Nimmo has had much experience in raising stock. A cross between a good native cow and a pure-bred Durham, and then crossed with an Ayrshire produced excellent milkers. He had seven cows which yielded 7,800 pounds of milk during 1870. Cows must have plenty of good food and an abundance of good water. One cow well fed and cared for, is better than three poorly treated.

Book learning is not to be despised in these days, and it is a pleasing fact that the literature of farming is greatly on the increase. There are also many valuable periodicals published in the interest of agriculture, and in every farm-house there should be found one or more of these.

### MONEY ORDERS ON THE LOWER PROVINCES.

The money order offices in Canada draw also upon all money order offices in Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. Orders, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in sterling money, and for sums up to  $\pounds 10$  sterling. The terms are :

For orders upon the Lower Provinces the same rates of commission as upon money orders drawn by Ontario or Quebec upon offices within those Provinces.

For money orders on the other Provinces the terms are :

For orders up to £5, 25 cents.

" over £5 and up to £10, 50 cents.

No half cents can be introduced into orders.

No money order exceeding \$100 in amount can be granted in any office in Canada; but Postmasters are at liberty to grant two or more orders for \$100, or for any lesser sum.—They cannot, however, grant two or more orders for sums of or under \$30 on the same day to the same applicant in favor of the same payee.

## SAVINGS BANK DEPARTMENT.

The Postmaster General will receive at any of the Post Office Savings Banks, deposits paid to the postmasters by persons wishing to place their money in the Government Savings Banks.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. Any person may have a deposit account. Any deposits will be received daily, during the ordinary hours of post office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster General.

4. The postmasters of the offices named will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors. They will also furnish all information with respect to the mode of depositing or withdrawing money.

5. Each depositor will be supplied with a pass-book, and the sums paid in, or withdrawn, will be entered therein by the postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in, will be sent to the depositor, from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-General will issue a cheque, payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

6. Every depositor's account will thus be kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank, at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices which at the time may best suit his convenience, and may exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the pass-book, in proof of identity—whenever paying\_in or drawing out money.

7. Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum will be allowed on deposits lying in the ordinary deposit accounts, but when a depositor has \$100 deposited, he or she may request the Postmaster-General to transfer the sum to a special account, and will then receive certificate of such special \$100 deposit, bearing interest at 5 per cent. per annum.

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## THE STAMP ACTS.

These Acts impose a duty on every promissory note, draft, or bill of exchange, not exceeding \$25, 1 cent; not exceeding \$50, 2 cents; less than \$100, 3 cents; not less than \$100, if executed singly, 3 cents per \$100 or fraction thereof; if executed in duplicate, 2 cents per \$100, or fraction thereof on each part; if executed in more than two parts, 1 cent per \$100, or fraction thereof on each part.

Any interest payable with the note at maturity must be counted as part thereof. The duty is to be paid by *bill stamp*, on which the date is to be written. Bank notes, checks, and money orders are exempt. These Acts impose heavy penalties for violation.

## DIVISION COURT.

This Court is for the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contracts amounting to \$100; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to \$40. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.

### CLERKS MAY ENTER JUDGMENT.

"Special Summons" shall be returnable on the 11th day after the day of service thereof upon the defendant in case the defendants or one of the defendants reside in the county in which the action is brought, and unless the notice required by the second section of the Act of 1869 has been given by a sole defendant, or by one or more of several defendants, and leave to dispute the plaintiff's claim has not been given by the Judge, the clerk, after receiving a return of the "*special summons*," with the proper affidavit of service, may, on the 12th day after the service of the summons, enter judgment against the defendant or defendants so served as aforesaid, for the claim, or so much thereof as has not been disputed, if the plaintiff is content with judgment for such part.

If the plaintiff is not content to take judgment for the part not disputed he must proceed to trial, as in ordinary cases, and the part of such claim not disputed shall be considered as admitted and confessed by the defendant or defendants.
