

From Heaven to Earth

"The Messiah came to earth;

So runs the children's hymn; and the Lessons for the first half of this year tell how that majesty made itself known.

In the three months now beginning, we see, first, John the Baptist, who rebuked men so boldly for their sins, pointing two of his own disciples to Jesus, His cousin from Galilee, as the "Lamb of God". They immediately follow Jesus, and others are gathered in. Then this Jesus from Galilee cleanses the temple of wicked men, and calls it His Father's house—meaning God's. By His words to a ruler who sought Him by night, and to a woman whom He met at a well at noonday; by healing a nobleman's

boy, and a man who had been helpless for thirty-eight years; by feeding a great multitude with five small loaves and two small fishes, and by the wenderful words He spoke atterwards; and then by giving sight to a man born blind:—in these ways He showed that He came from God, that He knew God, and that, in truth, He was God.

The Children and the Church Service

We all admit the necessity of inculcating in our children such habits as honesty, cleanliness and consideration for others. Has it occurred to us to add church-going to the list? In after years, when cares and pleasures encroach on the spiritual life, a well developed habit of letting nothing but strict necessity prevent our attending the worship of God in His house, will be one of the greatest safeguards towards keeping us, although in the world, yet not of it.

More or less, children take their opinions from their elders. If church, therefore, is a weariness of the flesh to these, or the service and sermon merely an opportunity for criticism, too soon the little ones will tire of

But, if they see at home an appreciation and love of divine worship, it will likely develop in them the spirit which says, "May I go"? instead of, "Must I go"?

But it must be taken into consideration, that, however well and reverently children have been taught to behave, so long a period of enforced quietude as a church service is a severe strain on their patience. The singing, perhaps, they enjoy most, and those churches which make a practice of having a hymn especially for them in the morning service, do wisely in thus encouraging the little tots to "make a joyful noise unto the Lord", in words suited to their understandings and in melodies which appeal to them.

As, at a dinner table, children may find some of the courses too rich for their digestions, while there is much that will be nourishing and palatable, so there will be few sermons in which there are not many little bits that come within the range of their small minds. They might be encouraged to memorize the text, and a harmless rivalry might be developed amongst them in seeing which can remember the most of the sermon.

It is given to very few who have left child-hood behind to realize "the long, long thoughts" of the little ones there, and we may not know just what seed may lodge and germinate in their hearts, it may be after many years. So, when the Master, by the hands of His faithful ministers, scatters the seed, let the little ones be in their places to receive it.

John 1: 1-14. Study John 1: 1-18—*Memory verse, 3.

2 The same was in the beginning with God. 3 All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made.

THE LESSON RETOLD

After Jesus had lived for thirty years on earth and had gone back to heaven, four of His followers wrote about all the wonderful things He had said and done, while He was here among men. One of these, named John, tells us more about Jesus Himself, than any of the others. John wrote his story or Gospel when he was an old man. He was the youngest of the twelve disciples whom Jesus gathered about Him and taught; and so he had a long lifetime to think over his Master's words and acts, before he wrote them down. Perhaps this is why he seems to give us such a sweet and beautiful picture of Jesus and just what He was like. It is from John's Gospel, that our Lessons for this Quarter and the next are taken.

John tells about Jesus from the very beginning, that He was with God even before the world was made, and that He was God; and that "all things were made by Him; and without Him was not anything made that was made." John calls Jesus "the Word", because He came to tell people about God. From'Him, also, all life comes, and He puts light into the hearts of men, to show them how to live aright.

When the time came for God to send Jesus down from heaven to live among men, a man was sent to tell the people that they must get ready for His coming, by putting away all their sins, and doing God's will with all their hearts. The name of this man was John the Baptist.

Strange to say, however, when Jesus did come into the world, there were very few who welcomed Him, although He was their true King. Even His own people, the Jews, though their prophets had told them, over and over again, thus He was coming, would not believe that He was the Son of God. Only a few received Him gladly; and to these He gave the greatest blessing that any one can have—the right to call themselves

sons and daughters of God. And so Jesus came to dwell amongst men on earth, and those who became His friends and followers rejoiced because they saw in Him God's own wonderful kindness and love and truth. And the better they knew Him, the more they loved Him and trusted Him with all their hearts.

JESUS AND JOHN THE BAPTIST

January 12, 1908

John 1:25-34. Study John 1:19-34—Memory Verses, 29, 30.

Golden Text-Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world.—John 1: 29.



25 And they asked him, and said unto him, Why baptizest thou then, if thou be not that Christ, nor Eli'as, neither that prophet?

26 John answered them, saying, I baptize with water: but there standeth one among you, whom ye know not;

you, whom ye know not;
27 He it is, who coming after me is preferred before me, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose.

28 These things were done in Bethab'ara beyond Jor'dan, where John was baptizing.

29 The next day John seeth Je'sus coming unto him, and saith, Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world.

30 This is he of whom I said, After me cometh a man which is preferred before me: for he was before me.

31 And I knew him not: but that he should be made manifest to Is'rael, therefore am I come baptizing with water.

32 And John bade record, saying, I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it abode upon him.

33 And I knew him not: but he that sent me to baptize with water, the same said unto me, Upon whom thou shalt see the Spirit

descending, and remaining on him, the same is he which baptizeth with the Holy Ghost.

34 And I saw, and bare record that this is the Son of God.

THE LESSON RETOLD

While Jesus was growing up in Nazareth, John the Baptist was being taught by God the message he was to deliver to God's chosen people, a message to warn them to be sorry for their sins, and to prepare to meet the long promised Messiah or Christ, whose coming was now close at hand.

At last, John began to preach, and deliver this message in the wilderness of Judea. He was clothed in a long, rough garment, made of camels' hair, with a leathern girdle about his waist. People flocked to hear him from all the cities round about, and many thought that he might be the Christ. So the great Council of the nation in Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to him, where he was baptizing at the river Jordan, to ask him who he really was. And he said, "I am not the Christ". Then they asked, "Art thou Elias then?" (For the Jews thought that before the coming of the Messiah, Elias, or Elijah, the prophet, would come back from the dead.)

"Neither am I Elijah", answered John,

"hor am I that great Prophet of whom Moses spoke; but I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness, Prepare ye the way of the Lord, as said Isaiah the prophet." Then they said, "What right, then, have you to baptize people, if you are neither Christ nor Elijah nor that prophet?" John did not explain his authority to them, but only went on to tell them that Christ was even now among them, though they did not know Him. And so great was He, that John did not think himself good enough to stoop down and unloose the latchet of his shoe.

The next day, as John was teaching beside the river, he suddenly saw Jesus Himself coming towards him, and he cried, saying, "Behold, here is the Messiah whom I have told you about—the Lamb of God, who is to die, that He may take away the sin of the world".

Now, some weeks before this, Jesus had come to John to be baptized. And after His baptism, as He was coming up out of

the river Jordan, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended like a dove and rested upon Him, and a voice came out of heaven, saying, "This is My beloved Son". John had seen all this, and it was a sign given to him that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. So now John declares, that, as he himself had baptized with water which cleanses the body, Jesus would baptize with the Holy Ghost who can cleanse the heart.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The day after John the Baptist had pointed out Jesus as the Lamb of God, to the messengers from the Jewish rulers, as John was standing talking with two of his disciples, Jesus passed by. John pointed Him out to the disciples, saying, "Behold the Lamb of God". And immediately they left John, and followed Jesus.

When Jesus heard them behind Him, He turned, and asked them what they wanted. "Master", they said, "where do you live?" Jesus was very kind and gracious to these men, who evidently wished to be with Him to learn of Him, and He invited them to come to the place where He was staying; and they remained there the rest of the day.

One of the disciples was named Andrew,

and the other was John, who wrote the Gospel from which the Lesson is taken. Andrew, after he had been with Jesus, immediately hurried away in search of his brother Simon, to tell him that they had found the Messiah. And he brought him to Jesus, and Simon, too, became a follower of Jesus, and Jesus gave him the new name of Cephas or Peter, which means "a stone". In the meantime John had gone to his brother James and brought him to Jesus.

The next day, as Jesus was starting to go into Galilee, He saw a man named Philip, who belonged to Bethsaida, the city from which Andrew and Peter had come, and him also He called to follow Him as His disciple. Philip found a friend called Nathanael, and

told him that they had found Him, of whom Moses and the prophets had written, Jesus of Nazareth. But Nathanael was very unbelieving, and said, "Can any good thing come out of so small a place as Nazareth?" "Only come and see", begged Philip.

So Nathanael went, and as he came near, Jesus said, "Here is a true Israelite, in whom there is no deceit". Nathanael, surprised, asked, "How do You know anything about me?" And Jesus answered, "Before Philip called you, I saw you under the fig-tree". Then Nathanael saw that Jesus had power to read what was in his heart, and said, "Master, Thou art indeed the Son of God".

January 26, 1908

John 2: 13-22-Memory Verses, 15, 16.

Golden Text-Holiness becometh thine house, O Lord, for ever .- Psalm 93: 5.

13 And the Jews' passover was at hand, and Je'sus went up to Jeru'salem,

14 And found in the temple those that sold oxen and sheep and doves, and the changers of money sitting:

15 And when he had made a scourge of small cords, he drove them all out of the temple, and the sheep, and the oxen; and poured out the changers' money, and overthrew the tables;

16 And said unto them that sold doves, Take these things hence; make not my Father's house an house of merchandise.

17 And his disciples remembered that it was written, The zeal of thine house hath eaten me up.

18 Then answered the Jews and said unto him, What sign shewest thou unto us, seeing that thou doest these things?

19 Je'sus answered and said unto them, Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.

20 Then said the Jews, Forty and six years was this temple in building, and wilt thou rear it up in three days?

21 But he spake of the temple of his body. 22 When therefore he was risen from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this unto them; and they believed the scripture, and the word which Jesus had said.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Now it happened that the time of the Passover, one of the great Jewish Feasts was near, and Jesus went up to the holy city of Jerusalem where the feast was held. There, in the temple-God's holy house-Jesus saw something that made Him sad and angry. All the outer court or enclosure was filled with noise and confusion; and crowds of scrambling, shouting people were buying and selling oxen and sheep, to be used in sacrifices. Boys were crying doves for sale, and changers sat at small tables, giving to the people from foreign countries the Jewish coins used in paying the temple tax, in exchange for the coins they had brought from their own lands.

Jesus was greatly troubled at seeing such things going on in His Father's house, so He hastily tied together some small cords into a whip, and went up to the sellers of the oxen and sheep, and commanded them to leave the temple at once. And He drove them all, and all their sheep and oxen, out of the gates. The sellers of the doves were allowed to take their cages away, but they,

too, had to leave the temple; while the money changers fared worse: their tables were upset and they were turned out.

When His disciples saw what Jesus had done, they remembered that long ago it had been written, that God's Son would be filled with a great love for God's house and a burning desire that it should be kept holy. The rulers of the Jews could not find fault with Jesus for what He had done; but they came asking Him to tell them who He was, and to give them some sign to show them what right He had to drive the buyers and sellers out of the temple.

Jesus did not answer them directly, but said, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up again". The Jews mocked at Jesus' words. "This temple took forty-six years to build", they cried, "and yet you say you could raise it up again in three days!"

But Jesus was speaking of the temple of His body. The Jews had shown disrespect to the temple of God, making it a place for worldly business. So, too, they would make light of Him, refusing to honor Him as their Saviour and King, and would in the end take away His life—kill His body. The Jews had asked a sign or miracle from Him, to show His power. They would see the proof that He was the Messiah, when His body, which they would nail to the cross, was raised from the dead on the third day. The Jews did not understand what Jesus meant at the time. Neither did the disciples. But the disciples kept the saying in their memory, and when Jesus really did rise from the dead on the third day after He had been cruelly put to death, they remembered the words which He had spoken so long before



Lesson V. JESUS THE SAVIOUR OF THE WORLD February 2, 1908

John 3: 14-21. Study John 3: 1-21-Memory Verses, 14-16.

Golden Text—For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.—John 3: 16.



14 And as Mo'ses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up:

15 That whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life.

16 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.

17 For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One night, while Jesus was in Jerusalem at the Passover, there came to Him a ruler of the Jews named Nicodemus. He had heard of Jesus' miracles and of His teaching, and wished to learn more about Him. Nicodemus chose the night time for coming to Jesus, because he did not wish his friends and companions to know about it. Besides, Jesus would then be free to talk with His visitor, after the work of the busy day was over.

Jesus and Nicodemus had a long talk together. At the beginning of the talk, Jesus said, "Except a man be born again, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God". Now, Nicodemus thought that Jesus meant by this, that a grown-up man must again become a little child. But what Jesus did mean was, that one's heart must be made all over again by the Holy Spirit. And He said, too, that no one can see the Spirit changing the heart, any more than he can see the wind blowing; but we know that the Holy Spirit has been at work, when we see holy and loving words and deeds coming from the heart which He has made new.

Another thing that Jesus told Nicodemus was the meaning of the Old Testament story about the Israelites who were bitten by poisonous serpents and were cured by looking at a brass serpent which God had bidden Moses lift on a pole, so that all the bitten ones might see it. "As Moses lifted up that serpent of brass", said Jesus, "so must I, the Son of Man, be lifted up on the cross, that whosoever believeth in Me may not perish, but have everlasting life. For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

"Do not think", Jesus went on to say, "that I came to the world to bring punishment upon people for their sins. I came to save them, and everyone who trusts in Me will be safe and blessed forever. But if anyone does not trust in Me, he is like a man who should turn away from the bright sunshine, to walk in the darkness. Such a man would have only himself to blame if he should run into danger. Whoever will not have Me as his Saviour, shows that he

is a wicked man, and he is sure to suffer for his wickedness."

Lesson VI. JESUS AND THE WOMAN OF SAMARIA February 9, 1908

John 4: 19-29. Study John 4: 1-42-Memory Verses, 23, 24.

Bolden Text-If any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink.-John 7:37.



19 The woman saith unto him, Sir, I perceive that thou art a prophet.

20 Our fathers worshipped in this mountain; and ye say, that in Jeru'salem is the place where men ought to worship.

21 Je'sus saith unto her, Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet in Jeru'salem, worship the Fa'her.

22 Ye worship ye krow not what: we know what we worship: for salvation is of the Jews.

23 But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him.

24 God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.

THE LESSON RETOLD

When the time came for Jesus and His disciples to go back from Jerusalem and Judea to Galilee with His disciples, He decided to go by way of Samaria—which was the nearest way. Jews did not often travel to Galilee by way of Samaria for the Jews and Samaritans had long hated one another.

But Jesus had a reason for going by way of Samaria. On the way they came near the city of Sychar. Jesus, being weary with His journey, sat down beside a well some distance from the city, called Jacob's well, while His disciples went to buy food. Soon a woman carrying a pitcher, came out of the city to draw water from the well. Now this woman was a great sinner. She did not love God, and had done many things to displease Him. Jesus knew this, and, as He talked with the woman, He told her of some of the wicked things she had done.

The woman was greatly surprised, and said, "Sir, I see that Thou art a prophet". And because she thought that He could tell her, she went on to ask Him a question

which the Jews and the Samaritans had long quarreled about—the proper place to worship. "We Samaritans", she said, "have always worshiped in Mt. Gerizim (which was near by where they were), and the Jews say all men ought to worship in the temple at Jerusalem." Then Jesus said to her, "The time is soon coming when people will not be required to come to this mountain, or to go to Jerusalem to worship God. You Samaritans worship God without truly knowing Him; but the Jews truly know Him, and from amongst them will come the Saviour of the world. The true way to worship God, is to worship Him with the heart.

The woman wondered much at Jesus' words. "When the Messiah comes", she said, "He will tell us all things." "That is indeed true", answered Jesus, "for I that speak unto you now am He".

The disciples had now returned, and they wondered greatly to see Jesus talking with a despised Samaritan woman; but none of them questioned Him why He did so, for

they knew that all that Jesus did was right. But meantime the woman hurried back to the city, and said to the people, "Come, and see a man who told me all the things I ever did. He must be the Christ". Then the people came and begged Him to come into their city and teach them, and many believed on Him.



43 Now after two days he departed thence, and went into Gal'ilee.

44 For Je'sus himself testified, that a prophet hath no honour in his own country.

45 Then when he was come into Gal'ilee, the Galilæ'ans received him, having seen all the things that he did at Jeru'salem at the feast: for they also went unto the feast.

46 So Je'sus came again into Ca'na of Gal'ilee, where he made the water wine. And there was a certain nobleman, whose son was sick at Caper'naum.

47 When he heard that Je'sus was come out of Judæ'a into Gal'ilee, he went unto him, and besought him that he would come down, and heal his son: for he was at the point of death

48 Then said Je'sus unto him, Except ye see signs and wonders, ye will not believe.

49 The nobleman saith unto him, Sir, come down ere my child die.

50 Jesus saith unto him, Go thy way; thy son liveth. And the man believed the word that Je'sus had spoken unto him, and he went his way.

51 And as he was now going down, his

servants met him, and told him, saying, Thy son liveth.

52 Then enquired he of them the hour when be began to amend. And they said unto him, Yesterday at the seventh hour the fever left him.

53 So the father knew that it was at the same hour, in the which Je'sus said unto him, Thy son liveth: and himself believed, and his whole house.

54 This is again the second miracle that Je'sus did, when he was come out of Judæ'a into Gal'ilee.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus stayed in the city of the Samaritans for two days, and then He and His disciples went on their way into Galilee. 

4 For an angel went down at a certain season into the pool, and troubled the water: whosoever then first after the troubling of the water stepped in was made whole of whatsoever disease he had.

5 And a certain man was there, which had an infirmity thirty and eight years.

6 When Je'sus saw him lie, and knew that he had been now a long time in that case, he saith unto him, Wilt thou be made whole?

7 The impotent man answered him, Sir, I have no man, when the water is troubled, to put me into the pool: but while I am coming, another steppeth down before me.

8 Je'sus saith unto him, Rise, take up thy

bed, and walk.
9 And immediately the man was made whole, and took up his bed, and walked: and



on the same day was the sabbath.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus stayed a good while in Galilee, and then, as the time for one of the Jewish feasts drew near, He went up to Jerusalem. Now, close by the place called the sheep market in Jerusalem, was a famous pool of water called the Pool of Bethesda. Around it were built five covered porches, in which lay a great number of people who were sick or blind or lame. They waited there, because at times the water moved as if some one had stirred or troubled it, and it was thought that, when this happened, the water had the power of healing the diseases of those who went down and washed in it. So, about the time they expected this moving of the waters, multitudes of sick people gathered to the pool, and lay about the porches and steps, as close to it as they could get, for only those who went into the water as soon as it was stirred could be cured.

There was one man lying there, who had been sick for thirty-eight years. He was perfectly helpless. Jesus saw him, and knowing how long he had been suffering and how helpless he was, pitied him, and said, "Would you like to be made well

again ?" "Yes", answered the man; "but I have no one to help me down into the pool, when the waters begin to be troubled; and while I am trying to get down to it by myself, others step in before me, and I am too late."

The man did not know that Jesus had far greater power to cure him than the waters of Bethesda, and thought that He was only speaking about the pool. Then Jesus said to him, "Rise, take up they bed, and walk !" And the man, who had not been able to walk for nearly forty years, not only stood up and walked, but was able to carry his bed alone.

But the Jews who were standing near were angry when they saw this, because Jesus had cured the sick man on the Sabbath day: and, wishing to find fault, they said. "It is very wicked of you to carry your bed on the Sabbath". The man answered, "He that cured me told me to take up my bed and walk". "Who was it who told you to do that?" they next asked. But the man did not know who it was, for Jesus had hidden Himself in the crowd.

But some time afterwards, as the man

who had been cured was standing in the temple, Jesus came up to him and said, "It was your own sin and wrong-doing which brought your long illness upon you. See that you do not sin in such a way again, or you will be punished in a far worse way."



THE LESSON RETOLD

"Bring them to Me", commanded Jesus, "and tell the people to sit down on the grass." So they all sat down in rows, a great company of five thousand men, and many women and children besides.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The day after the feeding of the five thousand, the people found that neither Jesus nor His disciples were with them on that side of the Sea of Galilee. For the disciples had crossed the night before in a boat, and Jesus had followed them, walking on the sea. So the multitude entered into boats, also, and crossed over to the city of Capernaum, looking for Jesus. When they had found Him, they asked curiously, "Master, when and how did you cross over the sea?"

Jesus knew that they had not followed Him because they thought He was the Messiah and wished to hear more of His teachings, but because they had been fed by a miracle, and hoped that perhaps more of their bodily wants would be supplied by Him again in the same way. So He said to them, "Do not be over anxious about your daily food, which cannot last, but strive to get from Me spiritual food, which will give you everlasting life".

"But", they said, "what good works must we do to please God?" "Only", answered Jesus, "believe in Me", whom the heavenly Father has sent into the world." "How can we know that God has sent you into the world?" they next asked. "Show us a sign that you are the Messiah. Moses gave our fathers bread in the wilderness, and that was the sign that God was with them."

"It was not Moses, but God Himself, who gave the manna in the wilderness", Jesus answered. "Yet that was not the true bread of heaven. God alone can give you that bread which giveth life unto the world." "Master", many of them cried (not yet understanding what Jesus meant), "give us always this bread". Then Jesus said, "I Myself am the Bread of life; he that comes to Me shall never hunger, and he that believes on Me shall never thirst". For Jesus was speaking, not of bread needed for the body,

but of bread needed for the soul. Their bread was His words and teachings, which would nourish the soul.

"But", Jesus went on to say, "I have explained all these things to you, and you have seen the miracles which I have done, and yet you do not believe. Only My Father in heaven can give you faith to believe, and whoever comes to Me in faith, I will not turn away."



2 And his disciples asked him, saying, Master, who did sin, this man, or his parents, that he was born blind?

3 Jesus answered, Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents: but that the works of God should be made manifest in him.

4 I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work.

6 When he had thus spoken, he spat on the ground, and made clay of the spittle, and he anointed the eyes of the blind man with the clay.

8 The neighbours therefore, and they which before had seen him that he was blind, said, Is not this he that sat and begged?

10 Therefore said they unto him, How were thine eyes opened?
11 He answered and said, A man that is called Je'sus made clay, and anointed mine eyes, and said unto me, Go to the pool of Silo'am, and wash: and I went and washed, and I received sight.

12 Then said they unto him, Where is he? He said, I know not.

THE LESSON RETOLD

In this Lesson Jesus is again in Jerusalem. One day, as He was leaving the temple with His disciples, they passed a man who had been born blind. His disciples asked Jesus about the man. "Master", they said, "we have been taught that children are born blind or lame because of some sin of their own or of their parents. Now, whose sin was it that caused this man to be born blind?"

"This man's blindness", replied Jesus "has been caused by no sin of his own or of his parents, but it has happened, so that all men might see this day how great and wonderful are the works of God. It is to heal sufferers such as he, that I must use that wonderful power which God has given me. And I must do God's work even on this day, although it be the Sabbath. I am like one who cannot leave his task till the night comes when no man can work. The night is coming soon to Me, when I shall cease from all such

labors, as a workman does at the close of the day. As long as I am in the world I must be the Light of men, so that none may be left to walk in darkness."

Then Jesus stooped down to the ground and made clay of the dust. With this He touched the eyes of the blind man, and said, "Go now, and wash it off in the Pool of Siloam". The man had such faith in Jesus, that he went immediately, and as soon as he had washed he could see.

None of his neighbors could believe that a man who had been born blind could ever be made to see, and they began to dispute amongst themselves whether this could really be the same person.

"Yes, I am the one who was born blind", insisted the man. "How did you get your sight then?" asked a number at once. And when the man had told them how it had been done, they asked, "Where is this Jesus?" But the man could not tell them.

Then the rulers of the people came together to decide what they should do to Jesus for thus breaking the Sabbath day. They said that He could not be the Son of God, as He claimed to be, if He did such wickedness. But many of the people, and, amongst them, the man himself, believed in Jesus, because only the Son of God could have done such a wonderful thing as to give sight to a man who had been born blind.

Golden Text—At the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder.—Proverbs 23: 32.



THE LESSON RETOLD

King Solomon was the wisest man that ever lived. He wrote a book filled with wise sayings, called proverbs. This Book of Proverbs is now a part of the Old Testament. These wise sayings are full of instruction, and full of warning, as well, against everything that is evil. And many, many times Solomon warns men specially against one of the worst evils—the sin of drunkneness. In one place he gives a terrible description of a drunkard returning home after spending a night feasting and drinking with evil companions.

He tells how the poison in the strong drink had taken away all the man's senses, and all his knowledge of what he was doing. He had been knocked and buffeted without being able to protect himself, until he was covered with wounds and bruises, and his eyes were swollen and red, and, altogether, he felt very sick and unhappy.

29 Who hath woe? who hath sorrow? who hath contentions? who hath babbling? who hath wounds without cause? who hath redness of eyes?

30 They that tarry long at the wine; they

that go to seek mixed wine.

31 Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his colour in the cup, when it moveth itself aright.

32 At the last it biteth like a serpent, and

stingeth like an adder.

33 Thine eyes shall behold strange women, and thine heart shall utter perverse things.

34 Yea, thou shalt be as he that lieth down in the midst of the sea, or as he that lieth upon the top of a mast.

35 They have stricken me, shalt thou say, and I was not sick; they have beaten me, and I felt it not: when shall I awake? I will seek it yet again.

And yet, strange to say, he would not be warned against his evil ways: his love for wine had become such a habit that it had made him a slave to it, and so he went on drinking it and caring for it more and more.

"But at last", said Solomon, "this beautiful wine that looks so rich and red and sparkling in the glass, biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." Serpents and adders were two of the most dreaded reptiles of that Eastern country. They often darted out from hidden and unexpected places, and attacked people who had no thought of danger, and the bite of each was poisonous and deadly. So was it with wine. The constant drinking of it, would at first seem harmless. But before a man was aware of it, it would cause his destruction and death.

And drunkenness brings other sins with it. It takes away one's love of what is good and right and his love of truth, until nobody will believe in his word, nor respect him. And Solomon said that it was just as senseless and as dangerous for a man to allow himself to come into such a condition, as for him to try to lie down on the crest of a wave.

or on the top of a ship's tall mast. In any of these cases, he was almost certain to meet death, or at least, to be badly hurt.

And again, no man who drank wine, could ever keep his own respect, or that of his friends. For when his senses were benumbed by drink, he would often do such foolish and senseless things as would have made him feel thoroughly ashamed, had he known of them, and had not the terrible drink blinded his eyes and deadened his feelings.

Surely it was wise counsel that King Solomon gave, when he said, "Look not thou upon the wine". We are sure of being safe from the drunkard's woes, only when we have nothing to do with the drink that causes them.
