

The explanation of the British authorities is that the copper, although shipped to Rotterdam, was d to be forwarded from that port to the Krupp factories in Prussia, to be used in the manufacture of torpedoes, and that under international law it was liable to seizure as contraband of war. Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, according to the report, pointed out to the United States that such articles be liable to seizure as contraband even if they had been shipped under the American flag. It is well, perhaps, that the shipments in ques-

tion were not made on an American vessel. If the flag that covered them had been the American, the principle laid down by Sir Cecil would still hold good, but perhaps sensitive public opinion in the United States might be slow to recognize it in such case. The incident is calculated to mark a line of danger. The British authorities presumably were able to establish beyond reasonable doubt that the copper was in transit for Germany. Where the evidence of German destination is clear, there should be no difficulty in justifying the seizure of the goods, no matter what flag covers them. But it is not difficult to conceive of operations in which the British Government, while fully believing in the ultimate German destination of the goods, could pro duce no conclusive evidence to sustain their view. If the goods were consigned to a dealer in Rotterdam, they would stand as in an ordinary commercial transaction between an American seller and a
