THE EFFECTS OF SPRING
Thaws Occasion Shut-downs at Minor Producing Mines.
Properties Opening Up Afresh—White Bear Builds Mill.

Per Year \$2.50.
Various incidents of more or less interest have occurred during the past week in connection with the local mining industry. The advent of the spring thaws has affected the mines depending upon wagon roads for shipping ore, but in other directions the change of season has exercised no effect. The outlook for a rapid extension of activity in the local mining industry is bright, and it is believed that very little work will be done during the winter months. The Jumbo ceased hauling ore during the week, an inevitable result of the breaking up of the wagon roads. Prior to the suspension a large quantity of timbers was taken up to the property for use underground and in the construction of additional ore bins. A crew of sixteen has been retained permanently on development work. The Kootenay also ceased shipping, and the mine is now closed down. The Number One mine also went on the closed list owing to a shortage of timbers, and the same drawback has affected the Jodie mine. The delivery of mine timbers over the high line railroad, and this has been noted up since the last heavy fall. A few days longer will clear out the spur, and the delivery of materials will then be facilitated. The reopening of the Number One is fixed for Thursday or Wednesday.

LE ROI MINE SUSPENDS SHIPPING TO NORTHPORT TEMPORARILY.

ONLY MILL REDUCTION WORKS RESUME—PROBABLY FORTNIGHT.

All the men employed in breaking ore in the Le Roi mine were laid off yesterday. The management having concluded to suspend the shipment of ore to the Northport smelter pending the resumption of activity at the works.

The number of men affected by the order is between 180 and 200. The balance of the mine crew, which numbered slightly over 400, is retained on development work.

The Le Roi Two's delayed consignment of ore is expected here today, but it is not likely to be started before May 1. The interval will be utilized to make some improvements to the works, but in the interim the crushing machinery and tables will be operated steadily.

Many citizens who have given the subject consideration are not disposed to put much weight upon the monthly milk tests conducted here, although the ordinary system of taking milk samples is practiced here. It is maintained, however, that a genuine average sample of milk sold by a dealer can only be secured under conditions that cannot be secured locally, and that unless this actual average is obtained the result of any test is too unreliable to be of any material value.
