The following is the substance of the reply:

The recent assumption of authority by the Bishap of Rome, in prevending to parcel out this country into new Dioceses, and to appoint Archbishops and B shops to preside over them, without the consent of the Sovereign, is a schismatical act, without prevedent, and one which would not be tolerated by the Government of any Roman Catholic Kingdom. I trust that it will not be quietly submitted to by our own.

Hitherto, from the time of the Reformation, the Pope has been enutented with providing for the spiritual superpitendence of his adherents in this country, by the appointment of Vienss Apostolic, Bishops who took their titles as anch, not from any real or prefended Sees in Fingland, but from some imaginary Dioceses in partitions and leaves. In this there was no assumption of spiritual authority over any other of the subjects & the Engiths Crown than those of his own communion. 


