How and where will you keep your bird?

That cleanliness is obviously of the first importance and that it is hard to keep fanciful cages free from dirt and parasites is enough to condemn them. Swiss cottages, pagodas and the like, hung with pendants and sparkling with metallic ornaments, are both instelless and dangerous. The bird will pick at the bright points and dangling spangles until it poisons or chokes itself, and the corners and crinkles are so many lodgings for dirt and vernin. Wooden cages are to be avoided because subject to impurity and brass ones on account of the great danger from verdigris, for the gilding soon wears off: the elganing wired are also harmful to the bird's eyes, and they offer no contrast with its yellow plumage. If you must have a cage of the popular bell shape, get a painted one, and repaint it as often as seems desirable, says Harper's Bazar.

Where you shall place your canary or other bird to good advantage is a matter to consider carefully. 
