THE GREATER NEW YORK.

Some Statistics Showing How Rig a City It Will Be. Much has been written concerning "Greater New York." but few have any conception how great a city it will be. Only London will exceed it in population, wealth and business. Its area will be 306 square miles, or 196,840 acres, it will have an estimated population of 3,430,000. Its bended debt will be \$216,471,593. Its annual tax budget will exceed \$55,000,000. The assessed value of its real estate (New York. Brooklyn and Staten Island) will amount to \$2,307,090. Its parks and park lands will comprise 7336 acres, not counting several noted roadways, such as the Harlem Speedway and the Coney Island Boulevard, which are under park control.

It will contain sixty-four monuments and statues, including Grant's tomb, to be dedicated next April. It will have forty-eight cemeteries, comprising 300 acres and containing a silent population of 4,000,000. Its public schools will them calves myself what furnit tion of 4,000,000. Its public schools will

contain 325,000 pupils and 7852 feachers. Its police force will aggregate 6509, and its firemen 2125. New York and Brooklyn alone have 2128 miles of streets and 991 miles of sewers. The capacity of the water works will be 503,700,000 gallons, and the miles of water mains will be 1093 churches, with 720,771 parishloners, and 300,000 Sunday school scholars. The seating capacity of the churches is 469,169. The aggregate value of church property is 368,718,000. There will be sixty-three libraries, containing 1,224,000 volumes, thirty art galleries, iffty-four theatres, with a seating capacity of 88,000, eleven halls for music and oratory, with a seating capacity of 38,000, eighty-one clubs of established social standing, having 48,000 members, two big universities and ninety-three other educational institutions.

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
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

caples of vegetable physiology. Anything which has a tendency to check or retard the flow of sap in trees meturally prevents the formation of new twally prevents the formation of new twood. This process of retarding wood growth is done in many ways. By pruning, to prevent leaves from forming and giving the tree health and vigor; by confining the roots in a small space, by withholding water, and by twisting the branches, and by a half-hundred other processes, all of which proceed from the same principle. When a tree has been chosen, which is usually one that is naturally stunted, its main stem and roots are twisted in zigzag form, which process is intended to check the flow of sap. The pots in which they are planted are narrow and shallow, so that they hold but a comparatively small quantity of soil compared with the wants of the plant, and no more water is given them than is necessary to sustain life. Nature generally struggles against this treatment, but eventually adapts itself to the new condition, and ere long the beautiful and curious dwarf tree of the Orient is produced.

Like Pets in the Poultry Yard.

Bacteriology is a science that gives the greatest pleasure to students, and they are invariably keenly enthusiastic, says an English journal. To have a fine colony of diphtheria or cholera germs in a flourishing condition is a source of great pride to experts, and they inspect the various germ families in their possession with more than the pride of a poultry fancier making a round of his yard. Just now it is a very distinguished thing among bacteriologists to have specimens of the bubonic plague bacillus. Of course, they are expensive, and difficult—at present to obtain in England at all, while in the United States there is said to be only one man who has the bacilli. They may, of course, become as easily procurable as cholera or typhoid microbes, but that will not be yet; and many people will pray—never. It is not pleasant to think that a slight accident may result in the implanting of the bacteriologist's germs in the most fruitful soil, instead of their remaining in his laboratory to work out their destiny in the case of experimental science. Cold Metals Diffused.

Professor Roberts-Austen of London in a lecture before the Royal Society, recently spoke on "The Interdiffusibility of Solid Metals While Cold." It was then shown that solid metals may be made to mix themselves as if the atoms of which they are composed were living creatures. He showed that when clean sheets of lead and gold are held together in the absence of air at a temperature of 40 degrees they will unite firmly, and can only be separted by a force equal to one-eighth of the breaking strain of the lead. The professor has also proven that if a plate of gold be laid under one of lead about three-tenths of an inch thick, in three days the gold will have risen and diffused itself to the top of the other metal in very appreciable quantity.

New Method of Securing Rubber.

Appropos to the numerous articles which have appeared lately regarding the probability of the exhaustion of the future supply of rubber is the report of a United States consul at Nicargua, who reports that a method of securing the rubber less destructive to the trees have been cut down or the legid made to exud from incisions at the foot of the tree, but it has been found that the leaves of the rubber tree yield a purer and more abundant supply.
