LATEST TELEGRAPHIC DESPACHES.

FRANCE.
The Oath question is still in suspense. The government party attach great importance to it.

The Russian Ambassador leaves Paris tomorrow for the German baths, with leave of absence for two months.

The "Moniteur" publishes the official Customs Returns from which it appears that there has been an increase of 3,429,710*l.* over the corresponding month of last year.

The Ministry of Marine has appointed the officer who was acquitted of the loss of the Dordt to another command.

The mayor who declared himself in favour of the opposition candidate has been suspended.

M. Fould is expected in Paris to-day. He will take the place of M. Magan (who takes leave of absence), in the department of Finance.

PARIS, Friday Night, June 19.—At five o'clock this evening the plenipotentiaries representing the great Powers assembled at the Foreign Office for the purpose of signing the convention respecting the new frontier of Bessarabia.

SPAIN.

MADRID, June 18.—The Duc de Rivas has been nominated ambassador for Spain at Paris.

BELGIUM.

The "Moniteur" mentions the expected arrival of Prince Maximilian at Brussels.

Sir R. Cardwell, Physician in Ordinary to the Queen, was interred at Lacken yesterday.

HANOVER.

The King has conferred the Guelphic Order on several Russian personages.

DENMARK.

COPENHAGEN, June 17.—At a conference of the members of the cabinet it was decided that the despatch which refuses to accept the pretensions of the great German States on the question of the Duchies will not be sent the day on which the Council of State is to assemble.

RUSSIA.

Letters from St. Petersburg state that cholera which is never totally extinct in that capital, is now raging violently, and that the number of deaths exceed seventy a day.

HUNGARY.

The Hungarian nobles and clergy have been informed that their petition is being taken into consideration at Vienna. They ask—1st: That Government employes should be Hungarians. 2nd: That the Hungarian language should be officially employed. 3rd: That a representative constitution should be accorded. 4th: A reform of the present system of taxation. It is quite obvious, from these facts, that the Hungarians are not contented with the present state of affairs.

DENMARK.

COPENHAGEN, June 15.—The Privy Council have refused to assent to the German claims.

THE MODERN BABYLON.—The census in England is all taken in one single night. It discloses some interesting facts concerning the city of London. In this city, there were, on the night of the taking of the census, 2,362,236 persons—1,106,558 males and 1,254,678 females. The number of widowers were 37,089, widows 110,076. On the night of the census there were 28,598 husbands whose wives were absent, and 39,231 wives mourning their absent ords. London is the healthiest city in the world the annual deaths only averaging 1 out of 40 inhabitants. If the population were drawn up in marching order, two and two, the length of the great army of Londoners would not be less than 670 miles. One hundred and sixty-nine people die daily, and a babe is borne every five minutes.

The Atlantic Submarine Telegraph.—The alterations in the United States corvette Niagara Captain Hudson, are nearly complete, and to-day she is to leave Portsmouth for Liverpool to ship her portion of the great Atlantic telegraph cable. Six cabins, a portion of the steering, and a portion of the engineers' department the bulk-heads of which have been taken down have been thrown into the area required. There is a circle in the wardroom, occupying two-thirds of it at least, which has been enclosed and planked almost to the beams. There is a flooring also on the deck, and this will be covered with sheet lead, and be laid with about 500 miles of cable. The stanchions under the beams are secured by iron trusses; the fore-hold is also undergoing the like alteration, and one of the coal bunkers in the fore-hold has been knocked away to give additional room, temporary bunkers having been made—one on each side on the main deck. A guard is being made to cover the popellor and protect it from fouling or being fouled by the cable. Captain Hudson and Lieutenant C. H. Wells were entertained by Rear-Admiral Superintendent Martin, at dinner, in Portsmouth dock-yard on Tuesday evening, the 16th.

Atlantic Telegraph Company.—A special meeting of the proprietors of the Atlantic Telegraph Company took place in London on Satur-

day, the 13th inst., W. Brown Esq., M.P. in the chair. The object was to get their sanction to a bill in Parliament, giving fresh powers, and making the domicile of the company in London instead of Liverpool. The chairman said the Government had made this a *sine qua non*. It was not desirable that Government interference should take place in private companies, but for political purposes it was deemed requisite by the Government that they should, in this case, have such power, or they would give their support to another company. It appeared that the Government would subsidize to the extent of £14,000 a-year, and that a concession would be given for 25 years, the capital being £350,000. After these explanations the bill was approved of. The cables, it is expected, will be laid before the August gales set in.

AWFUL STEAMBOAT CASUALTY AND LOSS OF LIFE.

The following telegraph message was received here last evening:—

Montreal June, 27.

The steamer *Montreal*, which left Quebec last night at 5 o'clock, when opposite Cape Rouge, took fire. She had five hundred passengers on board, two hundred of whom are supposed to be lost. The steamer *Napoleon* came near and rendered every assistance. (Still later) —The *Napoleon*, with saved passengers, arrived—number lost will reach from three hundred to four hundred—out of whole cabin passengers only three saved. Cabin passengers roused to jolly boat, which, from its crowded state was upset and most of them drowned.

From the Patriot.

Principles of Responsible Government explained by Sir CHARLES METCALFE, when Governor of Canada in reply to an address from the people of one of the towns of that colony.

"If you mean that the Governor is an irresponsible officer, who can without responsibility adopt the advice of the Council then you, are I conceive, entirely in error. The undisputed functions of the Governor are such, that he is not only one of the hardest worked servants of the colony, but also has more responsibilities than any other officer in it. He is responsible to the Crown and Parliament and to the people of the Mother Country for every act that he performs, or suffers to be done, whether it originates with himself or is adopted on the advice of others. He could not divest himself of that responsibility by pleading the advice of the Council. He is also virtually responsible to the people of the Colony and practically more so than even to the Mother Country, every day proves it, and no Resolution can make it otherwise.

"But if instead of meaning any of the above stated impossibilities, you mean that the Government should be administered according to the well-understood wishes and interests of the people; that the Resolutions of September, 1841, should be faithfully adhered to; that it should be competent to the Council to offer advice on all occasions whether as to patronage or otherwise; and that the Governor should receive it with the attention due to his constitutional advisers; and consult with them on all cases of adequate importance; that there should be a cordial cooperation and sympathy between him and them; that the Council should be responsible to the Provincial Parliament and people; and that when the acts of the Governor are such as they do not choose to be responsible for they should be at liberty to resign; then I entirely agree with you and see no impracticability in carrying on Responsible Government in a colony on that footing, provided that the respective parties engaged in the undertaking be guided by moderation, honest purpose, common sense, and equitable minds, devoid of party spirit.

A RUMOUR has reached us, that we are supposed by some persons, to be actuated by prejudices of a religious character in our animadversions upon the conduct of our Government and its supporters: upon those who know us well, such an insinuation cannot have the slightest effect, for, as we remarked in our first editorial, we can point to a lifetime to prove that we never yielded to such considerations; but for the sake of those to whom we are comparatively unknown, it is necessary that we should take the first opportunity of repudiating such sentiments; the test of true liberalism, is not to be found in sectarian distinctions; but in a generous and sympathetic feeling for all, a desire that all may partake of the blessings which a free and unsectarian administration is alone calculated to produce; wretched indeed, and miserably contracted are those ideas of liberalism, which would only go to destroy the political ascendancy of one religious party, to rear upon its ruins the ascendancy of another: Equal rights to all Her Majesty's loyal subjects, has ever been our Motto; the consideration by which we were actuated, in many years struggle for the application of constitutional principles in the government of our native land, like others we may have been disappointed in the results, still our principles

change not, liberal we were, and liberal, in the above sense, we still are, but whilst we are willing to yield a fair proportion of joint rights to our fellow subjects, we expect a reciprocal return, the fraternal bond—which should unite a people living in one country, under the same paternal Government, engaged in similar occupations, and upon whom, success or failure, good fortune or calamity, must operate indiscriminately,—should not by party considerations be rudely sundered; and herein lies the secret of our political difficulties and misfortune.

This is the age of invention, of scientific application, and of improvement; but the grand characteristic by which, ages hence, it will be regarded by the philanthropist and the christian, is the suppression of intolerance.—The expansion of christian liberality, England from whence all that is noble now radiates, has set an example in this respect, which her colonies should not be slow to imitate, and thus, in a political point of view, it may be more truly observed now, than it was a quarter of a century ago—that 'Protestantism has bent, and Catholicism should yield somewhat with its adversary.'

Our principles are elucidated by the following address of the Lord Lieutenant to the teachers of the Marlborough-street Schools of the National Board in Dublin:—"There is one practical suggestion which I would ask your leave to make to you before you all disperse on your several paths; and it is this—I am happy to see amongst you who now sit before me, as well as amongst those who are gathered behind me, members of different religious persuasions. Now I trust I shall be the very last person to call upon you to undervalue the importance of your different religious convictions; but I think you will yourselves have been able to ascertain during your sojourn here how much good and worth there may be amongst the members of different persuasions—(applause)—and you will have derived no better lesson here, than if in your future lives, you inculcate those results of your own happy experience upon those who will be placed under your charge. Inculcate upon them the love of learning, for that is your special mission as schoolmasters; inculcate upon them the love of God, for that is your foremost duty as Christian men; and as a main branch of that love and the measure your own experience here, inculcate upon them the love of one another and may the blessing of the Almighty be always with you."
