Herald and the wrecked crew of the Golden Hind, lost at Shag Rock, St. Mary's Bay, ten days ago, returned to town by train to-day via Placentia. Capt. Herald says the vessel was lost about 10 o'clock in the morning. A thick fog had set in so that they could not see twice the length of the ship ahead. Soundings taken a minute before the rocks were seen showed a safe depth of water. When the land was seen Capt. Herald tried to get her round, but she mis-stayed and went on the reef about 100 yards off the shore. A hole was stove in her and she soon filled.
