

Dearly Beloved in Christ,-Once more as the Holy Season of Lant approaches, the duty becomes incumbent on Us of addressing you in

Pastoral Letter.

In looking abroad over the face of the world to-day, it is impossible not to be struck with astonishment and wender at the vast strides that have b en made by men in the regions of science and physical enterprise. Man seems to have grasped, and harnessed to his use, the most hidden and pow-erful forces of Nature. Time and space have been so minimized as to be almost abolished, and the most dis-tant bounds of the world are brought together. The air, the earth, the sky; all are being dominated by the great powers of the human mind, and men have reason to be elated and to cry out with the Psalmist, "What is man, "that Thou art mindful of him? Thou hast made him a little less than the Angels. Thou hast crowned him with glory and honour. Thou hast set him over the works of Thy hands. Thou hast subjected all "hands. Thou hast subjected all "things under his feet."—Ps. VIII.-5-6. But unfortunately, while men are so absorbed in the study and develop-ment of all these material forces, and secret powers of the universe, they are apt to forget that there is another a higher, a holier, a more sacred, side to human character, a more noble and exalted sphere of human knowledge. namely, the moral and religious That region of human aspirations which stretches away beyond this present perishable world into Eternity It is sad to note that this religious and moral side of man's nature has not advanced in proportion to his material and physical progress. In-deed we are sometimes inclined to believe that this better and more exalted aspect of man's character has not only not advanced during these latter years, but has actually graded; gone backwards, and sunk to a more debasing level than even in the days of paganism It is now nearly two thousand years since the enobling doctrine of Christi-

anity was unfolded to the world, and the pure moral stream of the Gospelthe pure moral stream of the Gospel-teaching was poured forth into the seething gulf of pagan depravity which then enveloped the whole hu-man race. St. Paul in his Epistle to the Corinthians (I. Cor. V.) gives us a glimpse of the horrible and unnain all state of immorality which existed among all classes, at the time of the introduction of Christianity. Notwithstanding all the prayers that are being constantly poured forth in the choirs of God's churches, and the cries raised from the thousand choristers of religious men and women, be sieging the throne of mercy, for peace and good will among men on earth; yet we behold at this present moment whole armies of men arrayed in war-like attitude, bent upon destroying each other and sending down to death in horrid carnage hundreds and thousands of their fellows, even innocent women and children not being spared, in this fiendish carnage. Again, where men are not actually slaughtering and butchering each other, they are hating and persecuting each other. The spirit of disorder, irregularity and it subordination is abroad: the whole ocial and commercial fabric is unhinged and dislocated; mutiny and reellion against all authority are rife; and the very foundations of the social system are in a state of upheaval. We need not dwell upon the terrible responibility resting upon parents in regard to allowing their children to go abroad. In England at the present day the

most drastic legislation has been passed against the agents or, as they are called, "procurers" of this immoral trade. The law inflicts the degrading punishment of "flogging" upon the culprits, for it is acknowledged that such iends in human shape are impervious o any moral punishment; and the only way to produce an effect on them s to treat them as we do the brute beast—with physical punishment.



I am aware that the writer does not want this. I suppose he would like to have in office always a few pliable politicians that he could encourage with hope, or move with fear whenever his own exigencies prompted

Then, with regard to the Government, the mountain labors again and brings forth a veritable mouse. This is what he says:-"the ship is man-made, the haven God-given, but the honors of navigation rightly be longs to the captain." Well, supposing we take this to be true, but really is not, then the dishonor and disgrace of getting the ship out of he valuable cargo, and in the confusion and disorder running the ship on the rocks-then every ruinous mishap which occurs "rightly belongs to the

LONDON, Feb. 3. King Menelik, of Abyssina, is dead according to a special despatch received here. His successor and grandson, Lidj Jeassu, entered the capital on Sunday amid great pomp.

LONDON, Feb. 3. War has been resumed. The bom pardment of Adrianople began at ' o.m., and a small skirmish occurred at Tchatalia lines. Unless Turkey yields, the Allies will now endeavor o drive her out of Europe.

LONDON, Feb. 3. Colonel James Martin M'Calmont I.P., for the Eastern division of Anim, died on Sunday. He was Depu y Grand Master of the Orangemen o reland, and sat for Antrim East since 1885. He was Aide-de-Camp to Ear Cowyer an dthe Duke of Marlborough when viceroys of Ireland. Colonel M'Calmont was 66 years of age.

LONDON, Feb. 3. Osman Nizami Pasha leaves Lonon to-morrow to resume his ambassadorial duties at Berlin. He said hat from information received from nilitary sources he believed the Al es underestimate the condition of the Furkish Army, and would find them selves confronted with a redoubtable nemy including the best Mussulman veterans who fought under Isset Bey and the tried soldiers and good marks nen, lately engaged in Tripoli under Enver Bey and Fethy Bey. GENEVA, Feb. 3. The Swiss Federal authorities eviently regard the situation with great apprehension. During the last two months they have been witnessing on the French and German frontiers arge masses of troops gradually colecting, and to-day the frontier garri ons are virtually on a war footing Many officers, both French and Gernan, were recently withdrawn from Switzerland where they had been working or residing. Ever since January, the federal authorities have been taking precautionary measures. Offiial notices have been published the newspapers to the effect that in the event of war all Swiss citizens in certain countries must return immediately, while in a second zone o countries, including America, those who are liable for military duty must be in readiness . There is to be no mobilization in Switzerland, but 100,-000 soldiers can be at their posts in 24 hours, 250,000 in 48 hours and 500,000 within a week, as officers and men have rifles, ammunition, uniforms and all other paraphernalia at their homes. Cereals of all kinds have been ordered from the States and Canada, the usual Russian sunply having failed owing to the Balkan war, but it is now beginning to arrive, and is replenishing the Government's almost empty storehouse. Farmers have beeen warned to have their horses in good condition; chief surgeons and doctors have received official letters from Berne.



"The contract, combined with the speeches with which it has been in troduced in both Houses, appears to constitute A COMPLETE AND UN-EXPLAINED REVERSAL of our policy of refusing to issue to foreigner licenses to export herring even for food purposes, from any but the Treaty Coast. We cannot follow these fish after they leave this Colony ,and there seems to be no possible way to prevent their use for bait purposes af-

No doubt Sir Robert Bond and his colleagues will apply the probe to the big concessions which the American press reported the Booth Company were to obtain from the Morris Government. There is no doubt that the Booth Fishing Company were report ed to be obtaining concessions of bait for fifteen years. The Govern ment press has denied this. But the terms of the contract have never been published and these should be mos carefully scrutinized in view of what happened in connection with the Trefethen and Lord contract.


