

Astute Management.

Mr. Asquith is gaining the reputation long enjoyed by Mr. Gladstone, the Grand Old Man of politics of the later Victorian era as an old parliamentary hand. It may be remembered that when he was appointed leader of the English Liberal Party, the more radical section of it regarded his leadership as a doubtful experiment. He was looked upon as a Rosebery man, and the pro-Boer section had not forgotten nor forgiven his attitude during the Boer War. His strong handling of the House of Lords during the fiscal controversy which culminated in the passage of what is known as the Parliament Act, and while affording an opportunity to the House of Lords to compel a three years consideration of highly contentious legislation, made it impossible for the House of Lords to hold up legislation for an indefinite time, gave a touch of his quality. The Parliamentary Act made the passage of any Home Rule Bill a practical possibility. It called for three "askings" in the Commons in successive sessions, should rejections follow the first and second "askings" by the Lords. A third rejection in the Lords goes for nothing, and the bills proceeds to the King for assent just as if the Lords had assented to it. Mr. Asquith also gave a taste of his quality in placing himself in the breach of assuming charge of the Military Department when the crisis arose a few months ago. His action was generally regarded as strong and masterly. The announcement made to-day of his proposal to handle the Home Rule crisis savours of great parliamentary capacity. He pledged to put through the present Home Rule Bill. This pledge he intends to keep to the letter. The Bill will be passed through the House of Commons, sent up to the House of Lords and course rejected. The provisions of the Parliamentary Act will be fully complied with, and the Royal Assent will put it on the Statute Book. This in all probability will be accomplished within a month or two. But under the provisions of the Bill itself it cannot come into force before next February. So much then in regard to putting it on the Statute Book and so much for the interval which must elapse before the Act comes into force. There is, however, fierce opposition to it in the North of Ireland. A large population is up in arms against it. To-day an armed truce exists in Ireland, and these are ugly facts which have to be faced. Mr. Asquith proposes to face them. He is open to compromise, and pledges himself to put an amending Act through Parliament which will modify the Act before it can become operative, if an agreement can be reached between all parties. If an agreement cannot be reached, then the Bill as it now stands will come into operation as a matter of course, unless Asquith's own amendments pass. Mr. Asquith has seized a strong position, and a serious blow will be struck at the efficiency of popular Government, if a way-out cannot be found without a resort to the arbitrament of the sword.

FROM BARBADOS.
The barq. Gaspe, Capt. Connors, arrived in port this morning from Barbados, bringing a cargo of molasses to James Baird, Ltd. The passage occupied 24 days. Summer-like weather was experienced until the vessel got in the vicinity of Cape Race where she first met the ice which detained her. On Saturday last port would have been reached but the drifting ice prevented her and the vessel was obliged to harbour on the Southern Shore to await a favourable opportunity.

Home Rule Bill
Will Be Put on Statute Book.
Then Amended Before it Comes Into Operation, Whether Compromise is Reached or Not—Redmond Regards Asquith's Announcement as Serious—May Refuse to Support Amending Bill.

LONDON, To-day. That the Commons had and would maintain a complete and ultimate mastery of the situation and also that the only way to carry out any agreed settlement of Home Rule was through an Amending Bill and to follow the passage of the original measure, were the two outstanding points of Premier Asquith's speech when moving the procedure resolution in the Commons. Although the resolution covered a trio of bills to be forced through under the operation of the Parliament Act, general interest is centred on the Irish Bill. The Prime Minister rather adroitly turned the tables on the Opposition, pointing out Unionists had washed their hands of responsibility for the Irish Government Bill, hence any suggestion stage or a debate in Committee must prove entirely futile and be a waste of time. He reiterated his desire never to close the door on settlement as a proof of which he intended to introduce proposals. The Government would ask the House to give a third reading to the original Bill before the White-sunrise recess. Bonar Law taunted the Prime Minister with admitting that Home Rule, as it stood, was unsatisfactory, since he had found an amendment Bill necessary, while with regard to Parliamentary procedure, he charged that the Government was enjoining on the privileges of the Opposition to such an extent that in any other Parliament, it would have provoked violent scenes. The statement of the Prime Minister, nevertheless, relieved the Opposition. The Opposition seeing the Bill must become law, realize their best course is to fight to secure special treatment for Ulster and that they were going to draw upon will be offered by the Government that were given out at the time of the second reading, providing for temporary exclusion is now regarded as almost certain. John Redmond, Irish Nationalist leader, remarked that the reception of Premier Asquith's proposals by the Commons, certainly emphasized the futility of trying to make advances to them. Redmond sympathized most sincerely with Prime Minister's hopes of a peaceful settlement. These hopes were to be realized, the best course would be the introduction of an Amending Bill. Asquith declared, however, that even if all efforts to arrive at a peaceful settlement failed it was still his intention to introduce an Amending Bill. The Nationalist leader, however, was allowed to say that it was a very serious decision to announce and, for his part, he could not commit himself to approve of this course, certainly not approve at this moment when parleys were supposed to be going on, and there was hope of reaching a peaceful settlement. He hoped that if an amending Bill was introduced, it would be to give effect to the agreement reached. If an Amending Bill were introduced after failure to reach agreement, then he must hold himself absolutely free to deal with it when it rose. Proceeding, Redmond complained that the Opposition idea of compromise was to receive everything they asked for and give nothing in return. He had as high an interest as Sir Edward Carson in a peaceful settlement, and for one he was prepared to run great risks and make great sacrifices, but the position in which the Opposition sought to place the Nationalists was neither fair nor honorable. While Nationalists desired peaceful settlement, he said they were opposed to a compromise which would stage the Nationalists, he remarked, were in a position of knowing that in a few weeks the triumph for which they and their followers had spent their lives would be consummated. An outburst of hearty cheering from the Ministerialists, which lasted two or three minutes greeted Redmond's remarks. Redmond's speech has created a sensation in political circles, but opinions differed as to its practical effect. The present position is that Home Rule will be sent to the Lords before Whitsun, the Commons having voted Premier Asquith's proposal for hastening the remaining stages of the Bill. Then if no agreement is reached with the Opposition, Asquith will introduce an Amending Bill, enabling Ulster counties to vote themselves out of Home Rule Bill for six years. While some interpret Redmond's speech as a warning to Government against further concessions to Unionists, others interpret it as a warning to Ulster that once Home Rule Bill is on the Statute Book, any further concessions can only be had by the consent of the Nationalists. The third and final reading of the Home Rule Bill will be taken up before the end of May, it was announced in Commons this afternoon.

For War on Cancer.
New York to have biggest hospital in the world.
New York, May 1.—What will be the largest and best equipped cancer hospital in the world, with an ample supply of radium at its command and the benefits of years of research to draw upon, will be established here, according to unofficial announcement made to-night through co-operation between the General Memorial Hospital and Cornell University Medical College. A fund of \$1,000,000, independent of the value of the institutions, is already at hand, it was said; of this amount \$50,000 was given by Allan A. Ryan, son of Thos. A. Ryan. The authorities of the two parent institutions are reticent as to the identity of the other donors.
Dr. James Douglas, a copper millionaire and philanthropist, a prime mover in the project, it was stated, and has turned over to the General Memorial Hospital a half interest in his Colorado radium mines, besides contributing to the fund.
Formal announcement of the plans for the cancer institution is expected to be made on Saturday.

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, May 12. Premier Asquith to-day, pledged the Government to introduce an amending bill to the Home Rule measure, in the hope of its being passed by agreement between all parties. If this offer is accepted, he said, both the original Home Rule Bill and the Amending Bill will become law practically simultaneously. This, he contended, was the only proper way of carrying out any agreed on settlement, which might be reached.

LONDON, May 12. Sir Edward Carson was in the House of Commons to-day. His approaching marriage to the niece of Morton Frewen, the former O'Brien member for Cork, and cousin of Winston Churchill, has upset his Ulster colleagues and supporters. They cannot reconcile his threat of civil war with marriage bells.

BELFAST, May 12. Gun-running operations by Ulster Unionists have been renewed on a big scale. Twenty machine guns have been landed on the coast of County Down during the last two nights, according to information received by Customs authorities here to-day. This information has been reported to the Admiralty warships patrolling the Ulster coast, and they have been instructed to maintain a more vigilant watch for filibusters. The garrison at Holywood Barracks is under orders to be ready for any emergency. This indicates a general confiscation of arms, if the Ulster Volunteers keep up filibustering. Autos owned by wealthy Unionist residents are being used by the volunteers for the transportation of arms. The presence of dozens of autos making trips towards the coast at night has given evidence of fresh ammunition being received, despite the watchfulness of the Government.

LONDON, May 12. The formal announcement of the murder of two British subjects in Mexico, at a recent date, and the serious wounding of another, was made in Parliament to-day by the Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs. The dead are G. E. Williams and H. H. Green, and the wounded, F. Baird.

MONTREAL, May 12. A new liner will slip into Montreal in a couple of weeks. On her bridge will be a skipper unknown to the St. Lawrence route, but well known in many other services. The vessel is the new Cunarder Alaunia, commanded by Captain Koston, who rushed through the ice of the North Atlantic with the Carpathia, and saved many from death when the Titanic plunged beneath the water. The Alaunia is a sister ship to the Aurania, whose maiden voyage was made last summer. She is a twin-screw vessel of 13,400 tons.

LONDON, May 12. A suffragette, armed with a hatchet, to-day damaged the portrait of the Duke of Wellington in the Royal Academy.

CATANIA, May 12. Slight shocks of earthquake were felt to-day in the vicinity. Mount Etna became active again during the night. Flames issued from the crater, which was surmounted by a high column of smoke.

NORFOLK, May 12. Seven people were killed by an explosion in the engine room of the Old Dominion ship "E. Jefferson," near Cape Henry, last night. The ship returned to Norfolk last night, left the dead and injured, and then resumed her trip to New York.

Roberts was summoned to the child who was terribly scalded about the face and body, and did everything possible for him. Later he was conveyed to the hospital where his injuries were further attended to. The child was taken home from the institution last night, and is expected will be alright again in a short time.

SAGONA AT LASCOE.—Word was received from the s.s. Sagona last evening by Messrs. Job Bros. & Co., saying that the ship was at LaScoe, and was not expected to get any farther north owing to the heavy jam of ice on the coast. The Sagona left here to bring up the seals captured by the people on the French Shore during the spring, but as the greater number of seals was taken on the north side of White Bay, it is feared that the ship will have to return to port without them.

LONDON, May 12. It is officially announced that Shamrock IV. will be launched on May 26. The Scotch Liberal members of Parliament, yesterday decided to incorporate the Women's Franchise clause in the Government of Scotland Bill at the second reading which will be moved on Friday. The clause provides that a vote shall be given to all women, householders and married women. The Unionists of Leinster, Munster and Connaught have sent a petition to the King against the passage of the Home Rule Bill by Parliament. They declare it to be their conviction that if the Bill is forced upon them by the Commons without an appeal to the country, it will create civil war.

Cost of Landing Coal.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—At the time of the last increase in wages, Mr. Harvey said that it cost him 37 cents a ton to land coal. Perhaps it would be well to let the public know just what it does cost to land a ton of coal. For a steamer working three hatches, eight men a hatch are employed in the hold filling, one hecker on, two vang or crane men, two tipping tubs, one clearing gangway, three pushing cars to the store where they are dumped—total 17 men. The least that this crew of men will handle is 16 tons an hour—160 tons for a ten-hour day; 17 men's wages at 25 cents an hour for 10 hours will be \$42.50, this amount divided by the 160 tons landed gives a landing cost of slightly more than 26½ cents per ton. Who gets the odd 10½ cents which goes to make up Mr. Harvey's 37 cents? If he is willing to stand by his statement and have coal cost him 37 cents a ton to land, he can pay his laborers the odd 10½ cents per ton, which would make their wage over 34 cents per hour. When we take into consideration the fact that 16 tons an hour is the least quantity landed for a hatch crew, and that some firms have mechanical appliances which save labor, we can readily see that in most cases it does not cost even 26 cents a ton to land coal. Then why try to make the cost appear greater than it really is?

Mr. Montgomery, representative of the Furness Withy Co., told Mr. Kennedy, his foreman, not to employ any of the men who went to the Longshoremen's meeting Friday night. This Mr. Montgomery came here a short while ago from Nova Scotia, from a country where higher wages are paid, and where the cost of living is higher. Here in Newfoundland he can get cheaper labor, cheaper food and a better way of living than his own country could afford him. Now he is putting the screws on laborers who are trying to improve their condition of life.

Mr. Fearn is one of the chief opponents of the increased rate of wages. He has been very persistent in refusing Union labor of any kind. He has been made Secretary of the M.P.U. (Merchants' Protective Union). This appointment may possibly result in strained relations between the M.P.U. and other Unions. It is to be hoped that they will be more happy in their choice of a delegate. Our Association would like to have reasonable men to deal with.

Polar Bear Devours Eskimo Boy

IN NORTHERN LABRADOR, Quebec, May 4.—R. White, who was the first to seek a permit to establish a fur farm in Ungava, reports that in September, 1913, at Sarsfjord Bay in Northern Labrador, a young Eskimo boy was devoured by a Polar bear. The boy was asleep with his brother in a boat anchored a little way off the shore. One of them awoke and saw the bear, which had raised his head and forepaws into the boat. He kept shouting and the animal would let go of the boat, but immediately afterwards climbed on again, seized the boy who was asleep and carried him ashore. The bear was shot by natives, but the boy who had been carried off, was already completely devoured.

It is learned that the proposal might be that the setting-up of a temporary Government be undertaken by a commission, composed of five persons, two of them to be named by Huerta, two by the Constitutionalists and the fifth by the mediators.

Great Bequest For Poor Ladies.

Racehorse Owner's \$240,000 Will.

London, May 1.—Nearly £200,000 was bequeathed for charitable purposes by Mr. Ernest Dresden, racehorse owner, of Cavendish Square, W., and Newmarket, who left estate of £244,921 gross value.

Subject to other bequests he left the residue of his property for a home or homes similar to Dresden House, Albion Villas, Hove already established by him, where ladies of not less than fifty years of age, in reduced circumstances, but having some small means, may obtain lodging and food at a reasonable cost.

His bequests to his servants amounted to many thousands of pounds. He left £5,000 to Middlesex Hospital, £3,000 to the Royal National Lifeboat Institution, for an "Ernest Dresden" Lifeboat. He directed that any person or institution engaging in litigation against the executors, or any person interested under his will, shall forfeit all interest under the will.



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
