

NEARING THE RHINE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. A London cable to the Herald says that the French, by sharp actions in the Vosges, in which they have overcome innumerable obstacles, have straightened out their front north of Sondernch, and are believed to be about ready for their final operations against Munster and the Lower Freht Valley. For more than two months the French Alpine troops, to gether with large bodies of line in fantry, have been engaged in a con sistent advance that not once been stopped. Progress has been slow necessarily.

FRENCH REPORT.



AN OBJECT LESSON IN PATRIOT-ISM.

There is a saying, attributed to the Duke of Wellington to the effect that the battle of Waterloo was won on the fields of Eton, which brings out a feature of the volunteering in the pre sent war. Since the battle of Water loo, athletics has progressed in every direction among the nation at large, and no class of men throughout the Empire has shown greater enthusiasm or contributed more largely to the make-up of British forces at the front than athletes. The members of the athletic clubs of Oxford and Cambridge and other universities, mer bers of football clubs, cricket clubs, lawn tennis, boxing, harriers, are to be found largely in the rank and file. In the British Isles we hear of a Football Battalion and a Sportsman Battalion. But this warlike activity among Athletes is not confined to the homeland, it is to be found elsewhere overseas. There are 1200 members of swimming clubs in Sydney, N. S. W., and 300 of these have enlisted. One thousand members of the Rugby Football are also in the ranks from this State and cricket clubs claim to have sent 1000 cricketers, and now there is a movement for the formation of an Australian Sportsmen

In such a

As to this, I should only like to say in passing that Burt, the economist, who insisted on enlisting as a private, and has pretty good means, therefore, of sampling the temper of the men in his battalion, tells

me that while they are perfectly resolute about the task before them, they are equally resolved that there shall be no more wars or military service if they can help it. James-an ex-Pacifist like myself-tells me the same thing of the French soldiers. "But let us grant the possibility that out of the confusion of parties may come political wreckage. Unfortunate, of course. Still, I claim that if we have saved our souls alive we shall in the end sweep away polinovement of liberation. People will have come to feel much more genunely about many things-nationality, for example, and public right-than ever they did in the past. I can conceive a new Holy Alliance coming about which should not be anti-democratic, but should be more like Mazzini's dream. That, however, is as it may be. All I contend is that the vital element is safe. There had grown up in Europe a giant Power, which, with all the science and ma-
