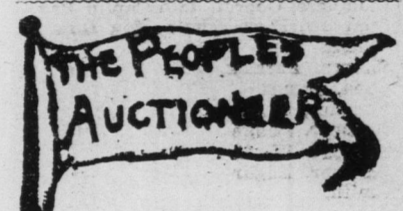

Someone was wondering why a certain woman was a suffragist. "Oh, that's simple enough," explained the woman who isn't. "There's a rather smart crowd in our town that's taken up suffrage and she has taken that side so as to be in with them." A little later someone asked her why she was opposed to suffrage and she immediately supplied them with some very high-sounding motives.

Her reasons for thinking as she did were honest and worthy, but her opponent's motives were not.

How did she know? I can't tell you. I suppose she knew in that mysterious way in which certain people always know that the person who does not think as they do is influenced by unworthy considerations.

Cut from the same piece of goods are the people who are always sure that anyone who criticises them is narrow or prejudiced or actuated by dislike, envy, pique or some other unworthy motive.

"Aunt Lucy" said the obstinate one on pursuing what seemed to everyone about her foolish course. Her older sister was arguing against it. "Aunt Lucy thinks you're making a great mistake."

"Aunt Lucy" said the obstinate one contemptuously. "You know she's an old fogey."

"And Miss Marshall" (her high school teacher) "thinks it's absolutely crazy."

"She wants everyone to be a teach-

er like herself. You can't tell anything by what she says."

Everyone Was Prejudiced Against Her. "Well, Ruth" (an older girl for whom the younger sister had always had a great admiration), said she was terribly sorry to hear you thought of taking up that work. She didn't think you were at all fitted for it."

The obstinate one never wavered a moment. "Well, I wouldn't have thought Ruth would let herself be influenced against me by you and mother," was her prompt explanation of that.

The Beothuks.

Mr. Howley's history of the Beothuks, is getting a grand reception from the Standard reviewers. The conscientious labour, wide research, and the accurate knowledge embodied in the work appeal keenly to the critics, and they will agree in rating it very highly, and conceding it premier place on its own peculiar subject.

The last issue of the United Empire, The Journal of Royal Colonial Institute, says of it in the course of a very appreciative article, that it is "an extremely able and authoritative work upon a little known subject, written by one, who has devoted forty years study to the question, and it should be read with the greatest attention, not only by the student of history of our oldest colony, but by all who are interested in the origin of the native races of North America."

The book is intensely interesting and beautifully illustrated, and will be a welcome addition to the libraries of our educational institutes, as it supplies an authoritative work on a period in our history of which we are all too unfamiliar. Students and book lovers will, no doubt, secure copies of this first edition while there is a good chance to do so, as it is a work that is sure to become more valuable, each year, and will be very difficult to get when the present edition is exhausted.

Show Bernstorff Check for \$5,000 to Aid Periodical.

Ambassador Pleased with Mr. Braun's Support, but asked Editor to keep His Approval of Magazine Out of the Public Prints.

(New York Herald, Aug. 21st.) As evidence that the official propaganda to influence public opinion in this country has been participated in by the German Government the World this morning reproduces the facsimiles of a letter from the German Ambassador to the editor of a pro-German publication and a check for \$5,000, payable to the publication in question.

The publication referred to is the Fair Play, a monthly journal published by Marcus Braun, a Hungarian, who is well known on the east side. In a letter addressed by Count Von Bernstorff to Mr. Braun he says that Fair Play "during the last seven months in its editorial policy treated all belligerents justly and thereby rendered great service to the millions of foreign born citizens of this country, especially those of German and Austro-Hungarian origin."

In his letter Count Von Bernstorff asks the recipient to publish his letter, "as this would be contrary to the instructions of my government, which does not wish me publicly to advertise any reviews or newspapers." Count von Bernstorff added, however, that Mr. Braun might be privileged to show the letter to anyone who is interested in Germany and her struggles.

The letter of Count von Bernstorff is as follows:—
German Embassy, Washington, D.C. Washington, D.C. March 15, 1915.

J No. 4844.
My Dear Mr. Braun:—In answer to your favor of the 12th inst., I beg to say that I have read the monthly review "Fair Play" for the last three years and I can state that the publication has been living up to its name and that it always has taken the American point of view. During the last seven months "Fair Play" has in its editorial policy treated all belligerents justly and thereby rendered great services to the millions of foreign born citizens of this country, especially those of German and Austro-Hungarian origin. "Fair Play" has fought for the rights of the latter and for truth, always maintaining an American attitude and showing true American spirit.

You are at liberty to show this letter to anybody who is interested in the matter, but I beg you do not publish it, as this would be contrary to the instructions of my government, which does not wish me to publicly advertise any interviews or newspapers. Very sincerely yours, F. BERNSTORFF, Marcus Braun, Esq., Editor of Fair Play, New York City.

The check for \$5,000, which is signed by Count von Bernstorff, is dated May 28, 1915, a little more than two months after the German Ambassador wrote his indorsement of Fair Play. It was made payable to the Fair Play Publishing Company and was drawn on Kuhn, Loeb & Co. Mr. Braun, editor of Fair Play, has been in Europe since which has not

been explained. Mrs. Braun, who lives at No. 223 East Sixty-eighth street, said yesterday she had received a cable despatch from her husband saying he expected to leave Copenhagen within the next few days. The office of Fair Play is at No. 501 Fifth Avenue, and in the absence of her husband Mrs. Braun is running the publication. She said yesterday that she knew of no check for \$5,000. The publication is popular with Germans and Austro-Hungarians and has enjoyed considerable patronage since the outbreak of the war.

A Smash-Up.

BOY'S NARROW ESCAPE.
While Mr. John Smart, of Logy Bay, was bringing a load of dry codfish to the city on Saturday afternoon, his horse, which is young and flighty, ran away and in collision that followed, resulted in a general smash-up. It was nothing short of miraculous how he managed to get away, as the horse, belonging to the same place as Mr. Smart, escaped serious injury.
A Telegram reporter was present at the time and saw what happened. The belly band came out of place, causing irritation to the horse which bolted. Coming over Cochrane Street in Zig-zag fashion, though at a fast clip, the mad beast was inclining towards the side walk when nearing Duckworth Street where some women were passing. Carrington, and the Rev. George M. Johnson. The inscriptions on the tablets which were executed by Messrs. Caldwell & Co., of Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, are as follows:—

Deo Optimo Maximo.

This tablet is erected Anno 1915 by their children, in memory of the Reverend Frederic Hamilton Carrington, A.B., of Topsam, Devon, and of his beloved wife, Mary Reilly, of Clonmel, Tipperary.
After serving as Curate in Devon, and as Chaplain to the Duke of Roxburgh, he came to Newfoundland in 1808.

He faithfully administered this Parish as Rector during the twenty years preceding his death, Anno 1839.

Deo Optimo Maximo.

This Tablet is erected Anno 1915 by their children, in memory of the Reverend George Macness Johnson, of Kineton, Warwick, and of his beloved wife, Frances M., a daughter of the Reverend Frederic H. Carrington. Mr. Johnson came to Newfoundland in 1847, and ministered indefatigably in this Parish during thirty years under that great Prelate, the Rt. Reverend Edward Field, D.D., on whose death he was appointed Rector of Barningham, Parva, Norfolk, where he died Anno 1901.

Mr. C. M. Rendell Died of His Wounds.

Mr. Frank E. Rendell is in receipt of a cable from his brother-in-law, Mr. James Simms, at Vernon, B.C., intimating that his brother, Charles M. Rendell, had died on August 19th of wounds received at the battle front in Belgium. Mr. C. M. Rendell was a son of the late Hon. G. T. Rendell and was well known and esteemed in St. John's, and many of his old friends and associates here will learn of his death with deep regret. He lived for a number of years in the best of health in his family, a wife and three children, are at present.
