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



ZURICH, Aug. 23. Germany has replied to the Argenine note, which demanded compensation for the torpedoing of Argen tine ships and a pledge from GerBerlin that Germany has not conceded these demands but possibly an micable settlement is not excluded.

BERLIN, via London, Aug. 23. In the aerial attack yesterday on the British coast, military establishments at Margate, Ramsgate and Do ver were bombarded successfully, the war office announces. In numerous aerial engagements the Germans shot down three airplanes. Two German machines have not returned.

LEYLAND LINER SUNK.

BOSTON, Aug. 23. The Leyland liner Devonian, which left an Atlantic port July 28 has been sunk, presumably by a submarine. Officers of the line to-day confirmed the report that the ship was lost, but stated that they had received no word s to the safety of the crew. The Denian was long in the Bostoniverpool service and was the first ship sailing out of this port to arm nerself against submarines. Advices rom England to the company did no ndicate whether the Devonian had departed for this side, though it was ssumed that she was on the west bound voyage when sunk. The regiments stationed there were ordered to die at their posts if necessary. Many of them did so, while what remained in the line were captured. Over twothirds of the prisoners were taken there. A visit to the reconquered territory shows the value placed on the position of LeMort Homme and Rogneville as defensive organizations. The ground everywhere is covered with small fortresses. It was the last hope of the German Crown Prince who apparently was obsessed with the desire to conquer Verdun, in the neighborhood of which thousands of the flower of the German army found only burial place, without any of the laurels of victory. All attempts to recapture the positions lost proved vain every German effort being thrown back in disorder. What is remarkable about the whole French offensive is the smallness of their losses, while those of the enemy have been terrible, as can be seen wherever one goes on the battle field. 



"A thorough-bred scoundrel," as Judge Morris put it, is Nathaniel Scott, who deserted his lawful wife and seven children and was frustrated in the attempt to marry another woman by the long arm of the law. Not long since he worked at Grand Falls where he kept company with a fair damsel, whom he gave to understand that he was an unmarried man, soon winning her affection. His fiancee removed to Howley where he communicated lengthy love letters to her. 



Boston Transcript: The offence of Lord Atholstan, whose house near Montreal was blown up early yesterday morning in an attempt to kill him and his family, was that, as owner of the Montreal Star, he was doing the best he could to win the war. This dastardly attempt is clearly a result of the propaganda against the conscription, and against loyalty to the Dominion Government, which has been going on for some time. Such a propaganda, in Canada or the United States, is straight work for the Germans, whether it is intended to be or not. It is dangerous and most disloyal work; and so far as it can be shown that the abominable attempt against Lord Atholstan was plotted in the United States or operated from here, it is in order that our authorities shall do their utmost to help the Canadians to run down the gang that have done the thing. The United States and Canada stand shoulder to shoulder in this war. Theirs is a common puroose, a common hope. 


