

### Germany Summoned to Disarm

Trade and Employment Outlook Gloomy in Great Britain .-- Anti-Japanese Riots in Shanghai Result in Many Casualties -\$100,000 Diamond Seizure at Rouse's Point.

PARIS, May 31. The Allied note summoning Gerany to disarm as provided by the Versailles Treaty, will be presented to Dr. Stressmann, Foreign Minister, on Tuesday, at Berlin, by the Allied Ambassadors in a body.

BRITISH OVERSEAS TRADE DIS-APPOINTING.

LONDON, May 30. The British overseas trade for April was most interesting, says the report of American Chamber of Commerce, in London. The imports shrunk by £2,500,000 and exports by £2,000,000. There has been acute depression in the coal trade many pits being closed and 139,375 miners idle with the outook pointing to labor trouble when he wage agreement expires in June. The total unemployed in the country placed at 1,185,000 or 163,968 more

NTI-JAPANESE RIOTS IN SHANG-

SHANGHAI, May 30. Six persons were killed and many were reported wounded and numerous arrests were made in anti-Japanese riots here to-day. 





#### Esquimault Dock

SECOND LARGEST IN THE WORLD

Victoria, B.C.-When construction of the new Dominion Government Dry Dock at Esquimault is finished within the next few months Canada will be in a position to boast the possession of the second largest dry lock in the world, big enough to handle with ease any ship that so far has been launched.

With the commencement of the onstruction of the giant caissons that will control the sea at the mouth of the enormous basin, the final stage has been reached. The actual opening of the completed dock is scheduled to take place during the coming Fall, and will only be twenty-nine feet shorter than the Commonwealth dock at Boston, which s the largest in the world. The Esquimault basin, hewn out of solid rock, will cost approximately \$6,-000,000. The length is 1,150 feet, the width 149 feet at the top and 126 feet the bottom, with a depth of 49 feet, inches and forty feet of water on the sills at high water level.

Not only will the dry dock be big nough and equipped to handle any ship affoat, but it will be possible to divide it into two sections of 400 and 750 feet respectively. It is lined with concrete, with granite keel and bilge blocks and is fitted with four caisson berths of granite.

The dock will be operated electrically throughout and the machinery will be of such power and so delicately controlled that most of the larger operations in the dock may be performed merely by the pressing of a




