**Town and County News**

Mr. Andrew's Concert and Ball tonight.  
The County Council meets to-morrow in the Court House at 2 p.m.

In honor of St. Andrew's Day, the corbined red cross and union jack waves over the Town Hall to-day.

Mr. McCARTHY, sen., of Barrie, father of the Rev. of Orangeville, died at Barrie on Friday last, aged 68 years.

"THE ENTERPRISE" is the title of a new paper just started at Woodbridge. It is neutral in politics, but independent in tone, and being well printed on good paper, presents a neat appearance.

"TAKEN HOLD."—To-day, December 1st, the Ontario Government take full possession of the Agricultural College and Model Farm. Mr. McKellar arrived in Guelph on Saturday afternoon, and is engaged to-day in business connected with the transfer.

MISSIONARY MEETINGS.—We are requested to state that the annual Missionary meeting, in connection with the Primitive Methodist Church, Guelph, will be held on Tuesday evening in the church, commencing at 7:30. Addresses will be delivered by the Rev. J. W. Jolliffe, of Brampton, Rev. R. Hazard, of Peel, and others.

PERSONAL.—The friends of Mr. D. E. Thomson, of this town, will be pleased to know that that gentleman succeeded in taking the first year's law scholarship at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, on Friday, having obtained 276 marks out of a possible 320. This is highly creditable to Mr. Thomson, as none of the other competitors for the honour reached the minimum of 240.

Snow.—Chief Constable Kelly is determined that the snow by-law shall not remain a dead letter. A dozen inhabitants of Guelph were brought up at the Police Court to-day, and seven of them fined \$1 each for a breach of the by-law. Lay bare the boards, ye men who have not yet wielded the snow shovel in person or by deputy, else your faces will also be made to look dollarous. Be warned; be warned; and do not forget that what is worth doing at all is worth doing well.

APPOINTMENT.—We learn that Miss Mary Little, of this town, has received the appointment of teacher in School Section No. 43, Guelph Township. Miss Little is a young lady of energy and ability, and is well known and highly respected in town. She attended the Normal School during the last session of '72 and had the required practice in the Model School, which, under the New Law, is the same as three years' experience. Miss Little will make an excellent teacher and we wish her every success.

Some fun was caused amongst the boards of a well-known Guelph hotel by the circumstances of a marriage which took place there on Saturday. A Beverley couple had come to Guelph intending to have the knot tied on Monday, and wished to stay at the hotel in question until then. Finding that there was accommodation for one, but not for two, they determined to solve the difficulty by being "made one" forthwith, instead of waiting until Monday. The minister was accordingly sent for, and the couple made man and wife.

## Local and Other Items

**New Law Office.**—We understand that Mr. W. H. R. Allison, barrister, of Picton, intends establishing a new law office in Mount Forest.

**The Canadian Illustrated News,** of Nov. 29 contains portraits of Lieutenant Governor Crawford, Comte de Chambord, Mr. Blake, and several of the Virginian victims, with maps of Cuba and Ashantee, an engraving of the Virginias, &c.

Subscription lists are being circulated on behalf of the Mount Forest Central Fair, and are receiving liberal signatures. The provisional committee will meet at Nesbitt's hotel, Mount Forest, on Friday next, 5th inst.

**Fire.**—A very disastrous fire took place at Montreal, on Saturday morning, in the tobacco factory of J. Smith & Bro., on Queen Street. It was totally destroyed, but the firemen prevented the flames from extending to the adjacent Spruce Company's works. The loss is \$40,000, and is partially insured. The origin of the fire is unknown; 1,250 hands are thus thrown out of employment.

**Outrage.**—The Examiner learns that on the night of Saturday, 15th inst., some mercenary rascals descended upon a burying ground, located on lot No. 50, in the 3rd concession Normanby, belonging to several quiet and inoffensive coloured families in the township, and perpetrated a wanton and unprovoked outrage. Two of the gravestones were dragged from their bases, and one being left in the cemetery and the other carried a distance of some sixty rods and broken to atoms.

**Flattening a Bullet.**—On Thursday a large sash and planing factory was burned down in Belleville. The workmen lost all their tools, and about 30 or 40 men are thrown out of employment. The total loss is about \$17,000 or \$20,000; no insurance. After the fire some parties attempted a disturbance in the Ontario House bar-room, and attacked the bar keeper, James Fitzpatrick, who drew his revolver and shot one of his assailants in the head, the ball hitting the latter fair in the centre of his forehead, and actually flattening itself against his skull. Dr. Purdie extracted the ball from Bradford's forehead. Bradford is about as usual, and is apparently uninjured.

**Cool and Clever.**—Mr. Lafayette Badgerow, a respectable farmer residing on lot 7, 3rd Con., Scarborough, was returning home from Toronto on the 20th inst. As he was driving leisurely along, not more than half a mile east of the first toll-gate on the Don and Danforth Road, two men jumped on to the wagon rack, struck him with a bludgeon on the back of the head and pulled him backward. They continued their murderous attack, inflicting fearful contusions and open wounds on his head and face. He shouted for help, which caused them to stop for an instant. He then asked them if it was his money they wanted? They said yes; and he immediately handed them a pocket book containing some three or four dollars, when they jumped off the wagon rack. He then perceived that there was a third man at the horses' head, who, seeing that his companions had got off, struck the team, and they being spirited attempted to run away. Mr. Badgerow found that in the melee the lines had fallen to the ground; he, however, succeeded in crawling out on the tongue of the wagon, secured the lines, got back safely and finally succeeded in getting them in check, without further damage. He certainly exhibited great presence of mind throughout the encounter, as he had on his person another pocket book containing \$54. It will be some time before he will fully recover from the effects of the beating. The robbery occurred about half-past 6 o'clock in the evening—just in the gloaming.—*Markham Economist.*

Two more cases of small pox were reported in Napanee on Saturday.  
Pentecostians here is to have a new brick church in the spring.

The official board of the Wellington-st. Methodist Church, Brampton, met last week and adopted the whole Union scheme unanimously.

A telegram from Pori, Colborne says the tug Hector ran ashore at Sugar Loaf Point in a snow storm, and now lies on her beam ends and full of water.

The City Lodge of London, England, Freemasons recently had a bread and cheese banquet, having given up the more expensive form of feasting in order to present the difference (about \$300) to the charity fund of the lodge.

On Saturday, between 12 and 1 o'clock, three boys broke into the Great Western Railway ticket office at Bramford station and abstracted some money from the cash drawer. Two of them have been arrested; the other, the ringleader, has absconded.

The Examiner says that Mr. James Murdoch will be a candidate for the position of Reeve at the ensuing election. It believes that the present Reeve, Mr. McIntyre, will also offer himself for re-election. A stirring contest may therefore be anticipated.

Mr. George Staples, of Glenc, met with a serious accident last week while threshing on the farm of Mr. John McKevie, Egremont. He had the middle finger of his right hand torn off at the joint, and two others badly broken, while adjusting a belt.

Love engagements of marriage are not desirable, though an honest love may come out all golden and glorious from such a test. We hear now of perhaps of the very shortest engagement on record. In Umbagog a young man met a strange girl on a street car. He was struck with her appearance, and his first act of loving devotion was to pay her fare. This bold proof of disinterested affection so touched the susceptible heart of the damsel, that three hours afterward these new acquaintances were husband and wife.

"Hard Ale" is the name of a drink which is now a good deal imbued in Edinburgh; and sad stuff, according to the description of it, must this beverage be. The Public Health Committee have subjected it to analysis, report that it is "composed of certain vegetable extracted matter of similar origin to that found in ordinary beer in a state of decomposition." Hard ale is simply decomposed beer mixed with water. It has a bad smell; it has a bad taste; and yet there are five shillings for the sale of this "rightful" tipple in Old Town, Edinburgh. We suppose the "fanciful" qualities must be of the highest order.

**Hail, Lovely Peace!**  
**Cubans Won't Have It.**  
**Fighting in Ashantee.**

**Bombardment of Carthagena.**  
**Shot in the Stomach.**  
**Tweed and his Bucket.**

Madrid, Nov. 29.—The Spanish Cabinet has agreed to deliver to the United States Government the steamship Virginia and all persons remaining alive who were captured with her, leaving the question whether the seizure of the vessel was legal to be settled hereafter by a mixed Tribunal. The question whether damages shall be paid to the families or relatives of the prisoners who were shot is also to be settled in a similar manner. The decision was not arrived at by the Government before it had confidentially consulted with the powers of Europe, and was informed by all of them that reparation was due for the capture of the steamer and execution of the captives. The decision is also in conformity with the opinions of the leading Spanish statesmen, and of all parties to whom the question was submitted by the Government.

London, Dec. 1st, 6 a.m.—The Daily Telegraph says it would be premature to regard the Virginia difficulty as approaching a termination until the actual language used by President Grant on the subject, in his message to Congress, is known.

New York, Dec. 1st.—The pulpits generally alluded to-day to the peaceful turn in the Spanish affair.

La Cronista, the Spanish organ, here, is confident that the Spanish Cubans will disregard Castelar's orders, and are not such cravens as to surrender the Virginias.

Special despatches to the morning papers report the bombardment of Carthagena continued on Saturday. There is great distress among non-combatants, who have taken refuge in the suburbs. The city is filled with wounded. Seventeen houses and the principal hospital have been destroyed. The Government fleet remains inactive outside the harbour.

London, Dec. 1, 1:30 p.m.—Despatches from Cape Coast Castle report another encounter with the Ashantees near Danquah, in which 40 Englishmen and native auxiliaries were killed and wounded. The Ashantees boldly attacked the British position, but were driven off after an hour's fighting, with the loss of thirty men.

Berlin, Nov. 30.—Gen. Manteuffel and Count Goeber fought a duel yesterday. The affair grew out of a quarrel which began during the late war. Count Goeber was shot in the stomach and seriously wounded.

New York, Dec. 1.—Tweed was yesterday subjected to exactly the same treatment as the other convicts, being compelled to take care of his own cell—which is exactly like the others—and to remove the dirt, &c. in a bucket. The report of his being ill is denied by the head physicians.

The Tribune's Washington special says that the President will send to the Senate to-day the name of Attorney-General Williams for Chief Justice; Senator Conkling declined the offer.

**Terrible Disaster at Sea.**  
**236 Lives Lost.**

London, Dec. 1.—The steamship Ville du Havre from New York for Havre has been sunk at sea. Two hundred and twenty-six lives lost. Particulars coming. Later.—The steamship Ville du Havre left New York on the 16th of November for Havre, and was sunk after a collision with a British ship in open sea. Eighty-seven persons rescued.

**High-toned Conservatism.**  
The Elora Standard is making itself more enemies than friends at the opening of its career. This is what the Meaford Monitor says about it:—Our exchange list is extending; we have a new sheet to add to it this week—a sheet hailing from the paper-afflicted village of Elora. It is the defect (in life and creed) Times revived, somewhat swollen as to size, but in typographical appearance still as of old an eyesore to the printer. The resuscitated sheet styles itself the Standard, is set up under joint stock auspices, and starts with a screaming hurrah for the defeat of North Wellington. A wild flourish against "bribery and corruption." Such beautiful consistency is worthy of mention in other streets than those of Elora; the beauty receiving an additional lustre from the presence of the defeated of North Wellington among the joint fathers of the sheet. The get-up of the paper is wretched—couldn't well be worse—and neither in its advertising columns nor in its general appearance does it show any signs of a vigorous or lengthened existence.
