New Steamship Line to Skagway

Alaska Mall Steamship Com. Big Norwegian Steamer Came Here to pany Formed to Operate On Lynn Canal.

Another steamship company has been organized to establish a service between Seattle and Skagway. The new line will be operated by the Alaska Mail Steamship company, an eastern organization which has appointed J. A. Chilberg, their Seattle agent. News was given some time ago that another company intended to enter the field, when a representative of the proposed company went to Skagway to investigate concerning the amount of business to be had by a new line of vessels. A prospectus, outlining the objects and purposes of the proposed company has been published, and circulated among the prospective shippers over the new line.

In the prospectus it was stated that a party of responsible West Virginia capitalists were the financial backers of the company. It was intended to inscorporate at \$500,000 and to immediately place on the Skagway-Seattle run at least one large and speedy steamer. The company would then build two other steamships for the line. Speed would be an objective point, and a two-days service between the Sound and Skagway was proposed.

Be Surveyed.

The Norwegian tramp steamer Horda, which was for so long engaged in carrying coal between Ladysmith and San Francisco, arrived here on Sunday to be surveyed in consequence of an accident suffered when leaving the Columbia river with a full cargo of 2,300,000 feet of lumber for Manila loaded at Portland. She bumped on the bar of the Columbia river and the seas broke over her, smashing one of her boats. It was feared that her plates had been injured as a result of her contact with the bar. An examination was made by a diver at Esquimalt yesterday, and it was then found that she had not been damaged, further than having one of her boats smashed at sea. She left for her destination last hight. It is not long since the Horda left the dry dock here, after having a number of new plates placed in her hull and others straightened—a work made necessary by striking the rock now named after her in Portier pass.


