Mr. Jamieson presented his case temperately. He spoke for about three-quarters of an hour, reviewing the past action of the House on the question and especially the resolution adopted intsk by which the House committed itself to the principle of protection when the country was ready for it. He argued that the large number of petitions received this session, not only from individuals but from ecclessastical bodies, showed that popular feeling was in favor of prohibition. He held that the question was not a party one, as neither party had adopted it. Hex-ontended that the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in nearly all the counties in which it had been passed was not an indication that the people were not in favor of prohibition, but rather that they were dissatisfied with the operation of the act and would rather have had absolute prohibition.

Col. O'Brien opposed prohibition generally on the grounds that it was unscriptural, that it did not cause the increase of crime as was claimed; that a prohibitory law could not be enforced because public opinion was not in favor of it. He referred to the good which had resulted from the operations of temperance societies, and thought they could do more good by continuing those exertions instead of endeavoring to enforce prohibition.



The members who had through the kind The members who had through the Ribbert al-the Canada Life Assurance Company been al-lowed to make their observations from the tower of the building, had been unsuccessful, but the transit had been seen by Sir Adam Wilson, who presented a sketch taken at his large reflector Mr. G. H. Meldrum and Mr. Arthur Harvie also rted having observed the planet on the solar

The transit had also been observed in Hamilton by Mr. R. E. Charlton and others.
Mr. Shearman of Brantford had observed the transit successfully ma Herscheliad reflector of transit successfully in a Herscheliad reflector of 14 feet focal length.

Mr. Alex. McS.wen of Binevale had also been successful and sent a sketch of what appeared in his telescope of small aperture to be a sun spot near the limb, but was undoubtedly the planet projected on the disc.

Mr. James Warren, P.L.S., of Kincardine also sent a sketch taken at a surveyor's transit instrument, and showing the planet just after internal contact.

strument, and showing the planet just after internal contact.

Mr. J. C. Donaldson of Fergus sent a full report of all the particulars of the transit. He had observed in his 3½ inch refractor the first external contact, the internal contact and the phenomenon of the "black-drop." He had made preparations for accurate noting of the time and made the internal contact 6h 57m 45s, assuming that the timepiece employed was absolutely correct. This time agrees within a few seconds of the predicted time as deduced, with all corrections applied, from the rigorous formulæ of the Green wich Nautical Almanac, and proves that the planet's position as determined from observation agrees with the theoretical place assigned it by mathematical astronomy. by mathematical astronomy.
The paper of the evening was read by Mr. G. G. rsey on "Imponderable Matter." Several ideas mewhat new in the realm of physical thought re advanced and considerable discussion fol-The next meeting will be held at the Observa-tory, June 2.
