FIFTEENTH YEAR \$200,000 BLAZE AT OTTAWA.

SEVEN ACRES OF THE CHAUDIERE LUMBER PILLS BURNED.

John W. Booth Will Lose \$150,000, and in Addition to This Six Loaded Cars, a Public School and a Bridge are Burned—A Close Call for Rochesterville Village.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 26.—A big conflagration visited Ottawa this afternoon at 5:30 p.m. a fire started in the Rochesterville, on the west side of the city, which at the same time an alarm was sounded from New Edinburgh. In the opposite direction, the New Edinburgh blaze was extinguished with a few bursts but a portion of the Rochesterville blaze was detected from reaching the Rochesterville fire until it was well under way. The fire started in the lumber belonging to John W. Booth. The fire spread rapidly and soon got entirely beyond control of the brigades. Had this not occurred the whole of Rochesterville would have run a risk of being burned.

The territory covered by the fire was about ten acres. There were between six and eight hundred feet high stacks of lumber belonging to John W. Booth, which were valued at about \$150,000. Besides this there were six railway cars with lumber, and the whole of the whole of Rochesterville would have run a risk of being burned.

The fire was the work of an incendiary. It was after 10 o'clock before the brigade had it entirely under control, and the heavy wind aided the result would be terrible, as the territory was mostly wooden houses. Mr. Booth was on the scene from the very first and worked until the fire was out.

LIBERAL COMMONERS HUFFED.

AT THE MINISTRY NOT DECLARING AN ANTI-LORDS POLICY.

Members Will Not Address Their Constituents in the Fall Campaign—Discontent Throughout the Ranks—A Discouraged Empty—A Hyde Park Demonstration Yesterday.

London, Aug. 26.—Nobody is more thankful than the Ministers that the end of the Legislative session has come. They are now hurrying off to Scotland and the Continent for a rest after the exceptional weariness of the last month. Probably each minister carries with him the feeling of having worked hard and getting little thanks even from his friends. The impartial must admit, however, that the session has been fruitful of good, despite the action of the House of Lords. Sir William Harcourt's Budget alone embodied more reform to occupy the time of a session, while the bills concerning Parish Councils and Equalization of London rates, which were enacted, are thorough and useful liberal measures. Yet everybody is in a bad temper, and blames the Ministry for its discontent. Many members of the majority of the Commons will not address their constituents in the fall campaign. Such refusals have seldom if ever been given before, for whatever the discontent in Parliament, the Ministers have not allowed it to interfere with their party duties.
