

The official crop estimates for 1894 as com-pared with 1895 are given by percentages, and are not so complete as last year, none being received from Bulgaria and several divisions of Russia. The figures for the countries outside of Europe are: India, 6. 623,000 tons of wheat, against 7,749,000 last year; United States, 390,000,000 bushels of wheat, against 382,000,000 last year; 23. 000,000 bushels of rye, against 24,000,000 last year; 1,500,000,000 bushels of corn, against 1,809,000,000 last year; Canada, 55,000,000 bushels of wheat, against 50,000,-000 last year.
