Nova Scotia's 1896 Crops.

B. W. Chipman, Secretary for Agriculture, has issued the Provincial Government repo of 1896, of the present state and prospects of the condition of live stock, in the several The deplorable fashion of wearing wings and counties of Nova Scotia. Statistics are given in full, the substance of which is indicated in the conclusion and summary:

The agricultural year 1896 opened about the same time as in 1895, but during April and the greater part of May we have had an abundance of rain; while a little late in the western part of the province to bring the hay crop to a full average, the eastern part of the province did well, and there is a more abundant crop of hay in that section than for many years past.

How to Kill Burdock. If a burdock at any stage of growth is cut below the surface of the ground and a handful of salt thrown on the cut surface, it comcut dissolves at once the salt, and this in turn helps to rot the root below the surface. A sharp spade is best to do this. Very little salt is needed, as when rotting begins below the ground it is apt to continue until the entire root is a mass of pulp. The burdock is biennial, and not so hard to get rid of as nials which have horizontal roots ng under ground, which no application burdock is its innumerable seeds, one plant seeding making enough to plant an acre, and the seed remaining in the ground for years waiting for an opportunity to grow.
